THREE HUNDRED TWENTY ACRES IRRIGABLE LAND SOLD TO ONE FARMER

Installed on Two Tracts

Planted on Another Farm

The place known as -V ranch which is located about, seventy miles west of here, has been traded for two farms, consisting of three hundred and twenty acres of land, within three miles of Portales. T.J. Whatley of Dunlap, the former owner of the -V ranch and present owner of the 320 acres of land, expects to plant some time this summer. First he has to drill wells and install a private pumping plant, but figures he can accomplish this in time to get in a crop this year. The places traded for are known as the Charley Landers and Craig farms. One piece of land is located about two miles from town, to the east, and the other farm is about three, miles east of the court house. Both are valuable places, lying well and having fertile, tillable lands. W.O.Dunlap a Portales real estate dealer, effected the trade. Mr. Whatley has not given out what crops he will plant but likely the principal crops will be alfalfa or fruit, or possibly both. This land is well adapted

Mr. Whatley is a man of means and knows what he is buying, having lived here a good while. Beside paying a handsome dividend from the beginning, these places will enhance in value in a few years until the owner acquires a nice fortune from three hundred and twenty acres of

Mr. Dunlap states that the people with whom he is interested are now preparing to begin construction, in sixty days, on railroad lands to the east of here, and as soon as the financial conditions and abundant supply of farm products are raised here, they will begin operations somewhere in the west, and possibly the lines will help out Portales.

S.R. Herdman, lately of Rocky Ford, Colorado, arrived a few weeks ago, and ever since he has gotten a breath of this ozone and has seen the large irrigation wells in operation and investigated that Portales Valley proposition he has became an untiring booster for this country. Mr. Herdman is now looking for eighty acres of land to plant in apple trees. He says that he has not found the place that just suits him. In a week or so he expects to find a place and go to planting his fruit trees.

Mr. Herdman is an old fruit man, having raised fruit in Colorado and makes the statement that a commercial fruit crop looks good to him. He says that this is a natural fruit country and than can be consumed by the local markets and some will have to be shipped to eastern cities.

Washington, D.C., May 31,1912. Mr. Thomas E. Mears,

Portales, New Mexico.

Dear sir: I am more than bleased, I even feel triumphant, to inforn you that the new homestead law has been agreed upon by the honse and senate conferences, and I doubt not it will become a law speedily.

The main points are as follows: Three year residence inseid of five, 5 months absence allowed the homesteader in every first year; one sixteenth of the homestead, whether 160 or 320 acres, required the second year, and one eight of the acreage to

Those now living on homesteads have the option to prove up under the old or the new law, Secretary of Inteaior as to resevation of timber, minerar, etc. and no resevation whatever will be required under the new law. The homesteoder, as before, gets a free simple title to his land and patent'
