Mr. Jackson came to Portales three years ago from Missouri and bought what was then called the Sands place near the Hranch. Since that time he has had some discouragements such as insect pests, sand storms etc., to contend with but through it all has worked on cheerfully and now he has one of the best crops in the country. He has been shipping green beans for some time and now has onions and cantaloupes of exceptional quality on the market.
