However, the Decatur plant is being enlarged to increase its annual production to 550 million pounds per year, and future expansion of the Dimmitt plant by AFC is a definite possibi-

"One of the things we looked at very closely in buying the Dimmitt plant was room for expansion, although I don't want anyone to think we'll be building something next week," McLaughlin said. "In the longer term, we foresee a bigger market for 55 fructose syrup into Texas and California.'

AMPCO concentrates on the transaction to employees of the Sun Belt - the southern one-third of the US - in marketing its highfructose corn syrup. McLaughlin said the Alabama plant's products have been marketed coast-tocoast, but will go mainly to the states stretching east from Texas, while syrup from the Dimmitt plant will go mainly into the Texas-to-California markets.

Castro County Chief Appraiser Jerry Heller recently announced the effective tax rate for all taxing entities in the county and most of them showed a slight increase.

Heller said that part of the increase needed for the county, the City of Dimmitt and the Dimmitt schools came about because of a reduction in value of the tax base. 'Amstar reduced its inventory

by right at \$7 million," Heller noted, adding that the taxes previously received on that amount must now be raised elsewhere if those taxing entities are to remain at the same level of revenue as last

The effective tax rate is the rate of tax per \$100 of property valuation needed to produce the same amount of operating revenue a taxing jurisdiction levied last year, plus enough additional revenue to meet debt service requirements.

The rate for the coming tax year must be figured on the same properties that were taxed last

The highest increase locally is for the Nazareth schools. The rate last year was \$1.0950, while this year it must go up to \$1.1323 to maintain the same level of income. The second highest increase is for the Dimmitt schools. Last year's rate of \$.8184 must be changed to \$.8414 to maintain revenue and debt service.

change from last year's \$.0875 up to \$.10. The City of Hart has a rate of \$.4883, up from the \$.48 set last year. The rate for the City of Dimmitt went up to \$.2973, a little over the \$.2804 set last year. For the county general fund, the new rate is \$.1424, compared with last year's rate of \$.1395. The Castro County Hospital District shows the lowest increase in the rate, with \$.0920 for this year, compared with \$.0901 for last year.


While the rate for the City of Nazareth was computed at the same \$.2391 as last year, the rates went down for the Hart schools from the \$.78 set last year to \$.7748 for this year.

Heller said he felt that some of the taxing entities may not use the new effective tax rate, choosing to remain with last year's rate, which would bring in less income for

"It is still up to each taxing jurisdiction to set the rate they feel is needed. These figures are just a legal guideline," Heller noted.

State law sets out procedures for jurisdictions to follow if the tax rate they feel is needed is more than 3% above the established effective




## NHS grad gets top scholarship

## **Police** calls

Local law enforcement officials arrested 13 juveniles and one adult Monday in connection with three

There was speculation that Amstar needed to sell the Dimmitt plant to gain cash after buying back enough of its stock to succesfully fend off a leveraged buyout attempt against the company during the past year. 'Amstar came to Dimmitt to learn how to make fructose,' Lapins said. "We were going to build a second plant, but that never came off. Our primary purpose, however, is to produce sugar. ## Medical fund law is passed

President Reagan recently signed into law a proposal from US Senator Lloyd Bentsen and the Senate Finance Committee which will disregard medical crisis funds as income in determining federal benefits for needy families.

Testimony was received from a family whose benefits had been cut off because of funds received from friends and neighbors to pay medical expenses.

"Now when a family receives contributions to help with a medical crisis, the gifts will not affect recently signed by the President.

federal benefits as long as they are used to pay medical expenses,' Sen. Bentsen said.

Formerly, the Dept. of Health and Human Services had the discretion in deciding whether such contributions should be considered income.

Sen. Bentsen said that officials of the department agreed that such gifts should not be counted as income. The new law was included in the deficit reduction package

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
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
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
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


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## Sunnyside



A Dimmitt student has been named recipient of the Pioneer Scholar Award at Wayland Baptist University for outstanding academic achievement.





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
