## Board okays two changes

The Dimmitt Board of Adjustment met Monday night and approved two requests for exceptions to the city's zoning ordinances.

A variance for a retail business in a single-family dwelling zone was granted to Mr. and Mrs. Gene Heath for the operation of a day care center at 614 W. Andrews.

Members of the board noted that the business would provide a "needed service." The Heaths noted that members of the neighborhood who were contacted were not against the change.

City attorney Jack Edwards advised the board to consider carefully before setting a precedent.

The board also granted a variance for construction of a carport at 703 Stinson, the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Kenworthy. The partially completed structure was

In a \$50 million deal, the Dimmitt Amstar Plant is being purchased by an Alabama-based company that is aggressively seeking to expand both its production and its share of the growing high-fructose corn syrup market.

American Fructose Corp. announced here Friday that it has signed a letter of intent with the Amstar Corp. to acquire the Dimmitt Corn Division, and said it intends to market the Dimmitt plant's products in the Sun Belt region stretching from Texas to California.

American Fructose Corp. (AFC) is a production-arm subsidiary of American Maize-Products Co., which operates AFC's plants and markets its products.

Here Friday to announce the transaction to employees of the Dimmitt Amstar Plant were Doug Lapins, vice-president of Amstar's Spreckels Sugar Division and former general manager of the local plant, and pat McLaughlin of Hammond, Ind., president of American Maize-Products Co.'s Corn Processing Division.

Lapins and McLaughlin said the purchase is expected to take "at least two months," and is subject to approval by the boards of directors of both corporations.

Operation of the Dimmitt plant under its new ownership will be "business as usual," McLaughlin said.

"We don't anticipate any changes in management or personnel . . . and we hope to maintain the relationship between the plant here and Dimmitt Agri Industries, which we understand has been good on both sides," McLaughlin added.

AFC operates a high fructose plant in Decatur, Ala., that is

similar to the Dimmitt plant. The Decatur plant produces 400 million pounds (dry basis) of high fructose corn syrup per year (compared with the Dimmitt plant's 300 million pounds). However, the Decatur plant is being enlarged to increase its annual production to 550 million pounds per year, and future expansion of the Dimmitt plant by AFC is a definite possibility.

"One of the things we looked at very closely in buying the Dimmitt plant was room for expansion, although I don't want anyone to think we'll be building something next week," McLaughlin said. "In the longer term, we foresee a bigger market for 55 fructose syrup into Texas and California."

AMPCO concentrates on the Sun Belt — the southern one-third of the US — in marketing its high-fructose corn syrup. McLaughlin said the Alabama plant's products have been marketed coast-to-coast, but will go mainly to the states stretching east from Texas, while syrup from the Dimmitt plant will go mainly into the Texas-to-California markets.

The Sun Belt, he explained, is the nation's fastest-growing market for high fructose corn syrup, which is now the main sweetener used by most major soft-drink manufacturers.

With the purchase of the Dimmitt plant and expansion of its Decatur plant, American Fructose expects to replace Heinz as the nation's fifth largest supplier of high-fructose corn syrup. AFC currently is in sixth place, just ahead of Amstar — whose only high-fructose production comes from the Dimmitt plant.

## Effective tax rates increase for county

Castro County Chief Appraiser Jerry Heller recently announced the effective tax rate for all taxing entities in the county and most of them showed a slight increase.

Heller said that part of the increase needed for the county, the City of Dimmitt and the Dimmitt schools came about because of a reduction in value of the tax base.

"Amstar reduced its inventory by right at \$7 million," Heller noted, adding that the taxes previously received on that amount must now be raised elsewhere if those taxing entities are to remain at the same level of revenue as last year.

The effective tax rate is the rate of tax per \$100 of property valuation needed to produce the same amount of operating revenue a taxing jurisdiction levied last year, plus enough additional revenue to meet debt service requirements.

The rate for the coming tax year must be figured on the same properties that were taxed last year.

The highest increase locally is for the Nazareth schools. The rate last year was \$1.0950, while this year it must go up to \$1.1323 to maintain the same level of income. The second highest increase is for the Dimmitt schools. Last year's rate of \$.8184 must be changed to \$.8414 to maintain revenue and debt service.

The county road fund rate will

change from last year's \$.0875 up to \$.10. The City of Hart has a rate of \$.4883, up from the \$.48 set last year. The rate for the City of Dimmitt went up to \$.2973, a little over the \$.2804 set last year. For the county general fund, the new rate is \$.1424, compared with last year's rate of \$.1395. The Castro County Hospital District shows the lowest increase in the rate, with \$.0920 for this year, compared with \$.0901 for last year.

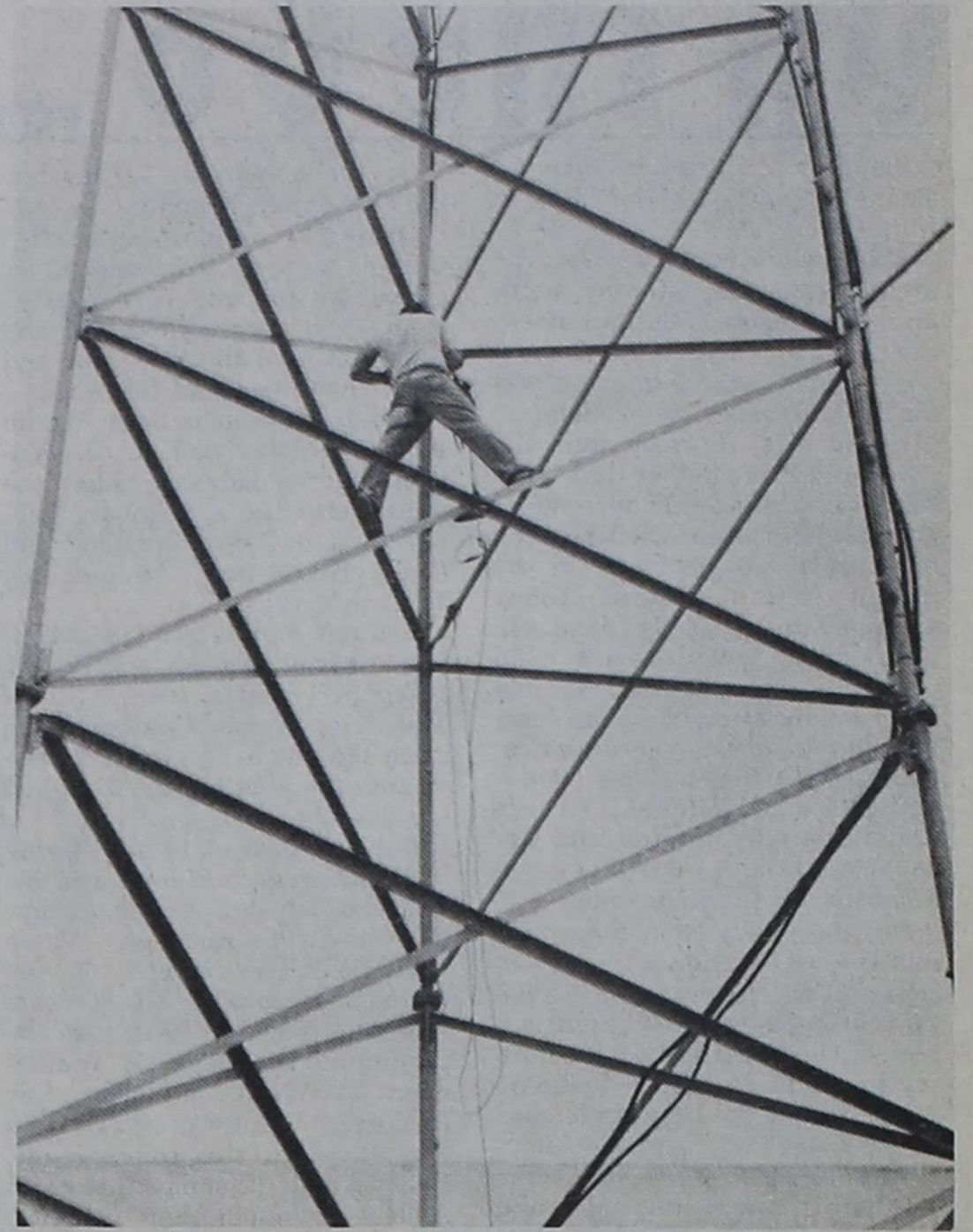
While the rate for the City of Nazareth was computed at the same \$.2391 as last year, the rates went down for the Hart schools from the \$.78 set last year to \$.7748 for this year.

Heller said he felt that some of the taxing entities may not use the new effective tax rate, choosing to remain with last year's rate, which would bring in less income for most.

"It is still up to each taxing jurisdiction to set the rate they feel is needed. These figures are just a legal guideline," Heller noted.

State law sets out procedures for jurisdictions to follow if the tax rate they feel is needed is more than 3% above the established effective tax rate.

Public notice must be given and hearings held. In cases where the increase would be more than 8% above the effective rate, voters could petition for a roll-back election.

Additionally, \$698 worth of agricultural chemicals were taken.

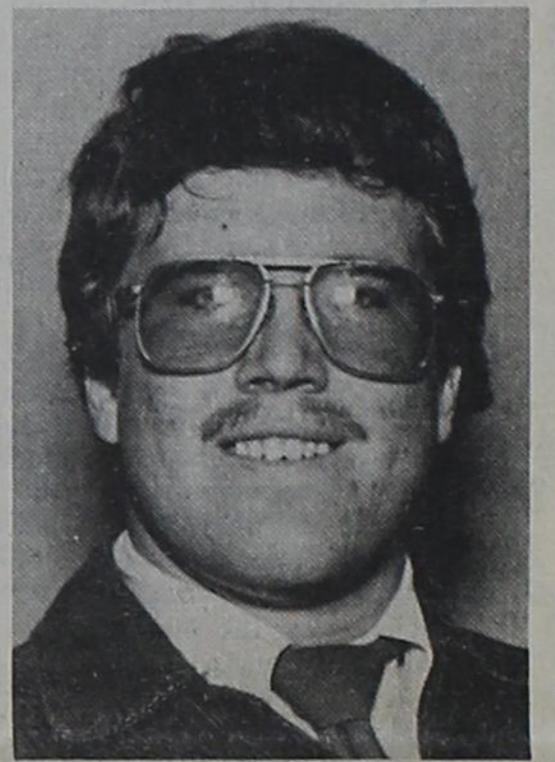

## Police calls

Local law enforcement officials arrested 13 juveniles and one adult Monday in connection with three cases.

Two juveniles were taken into custody and were charged with the burglary of a habitation stemming from the July 20 break-in at the home of Florene Leinen. According to police, the youths cut a screen and entered the house through an open window while the owner was at work. Approximately \$100 in currency was taken from the residence, according to authorities. The car was recovered by the Dimmitt Police Dept. within hours after the break-in was discovered.

[Continued from Page 1] There was speculation that Amstar needed to sell the Dimmitt plant to gain cash after buying back enough of its stock to successfully fend off a leveraged buyout attempt against the company during the past year. Amstar and AMPCO executives said only that the Dimmitt plant's sale is a good deal for both companies.

"Amstar came to Dimmitt to learn how to make fructose," Lapins said. "We were going to build a second plant, but that never came off. Our primary purpose, however, is to produce sugar. I think it's a matter of basic business lines — the Dimmitt plant fits their basic business line better than it does ours."

"American Fructose is delighted," McLaughlin said of the transaction. "We think the Dimmitt plant is a good 'fit' and will be a good facility for both Dimmitt and American Fructose." H. B. Wentz Jr., president of the Amstar Corp., said, "I believe this transaction will be beneficial to the employees, customers and suppliers of the Dimmitt Corn Division."

William Ziegler, chairman and chief executive officer of the American Fructose Corp., noted that the Dimmitt plant will increase AFC's current high-fructose corn syrup capacity by 75%.

## Medical fund law is passed

President Reagan recently signed into law a proposal from US Senator Lloyd Bentsen and the Senate Finance Committee which will disregard medical crisis funds as income in determining federal benefits for needy families.

Testimony was received from a family whose benefits had been cut off because of funds received from friends and neighbors to pay medical expenses.

"Now when a family receives contributions to help with a medical crisis, the gifts will not affect

federal benefits as long as they are used to pay medical expenses," Sen. Bentsen said.

Formerly, the Dept. of Health and Human Services had the discretion in deciding whether such contributions should be considered income.

Sen. Bentsen said that officials of the department agreed that such gifts should not be counted as income. The new law was included in the deficit reduction package recently signed by the President.

## DPS is seeking trooper-trainees

The Texas Department of Public Safety is now accepting applications for the position of Trooper-Trainee. The 18-week recruit school is scheduled to begin in January of 1985 with training to be at the DPS Academy in Austin.

Major V. J. Cawthon, Commander for Region 5, said, "The basic requirements for the position of Trooper-Trainee are: You must be of excellent health, be between 20 and 35 years old and have at least 60 semester hours of college. Two

years law enforcement or military experience may be substituted for the educational requirements. Additional requirements are: Your weight must be proportionate to your height; for men, 2 to 3 pounds per inch of height and for women, 1 1/4 to 2 1/2 pounds per inch of height. You must be a US citizen and have a valid Texas drivers license. Your eyesight must be no worse than 20/200 correctable to 20/30. Severe color deficiency in your eyesight will be a disqualification."

Major Cawthon also stated that testing will be conducted in Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls on every Tuesday and Thursday, except holidays. Testing will start at 9 a.m. each day of the test. The testing period will be from Aug. 16 to Oct. 11. For additional information contact any DPS Trooper.

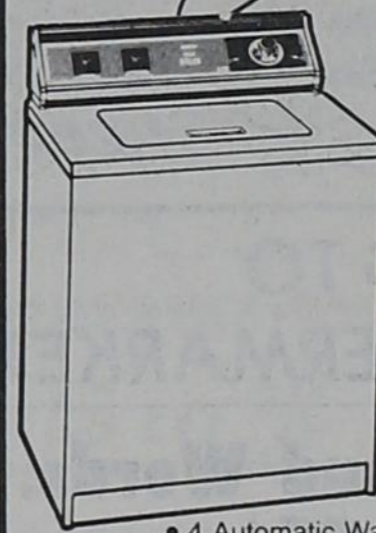

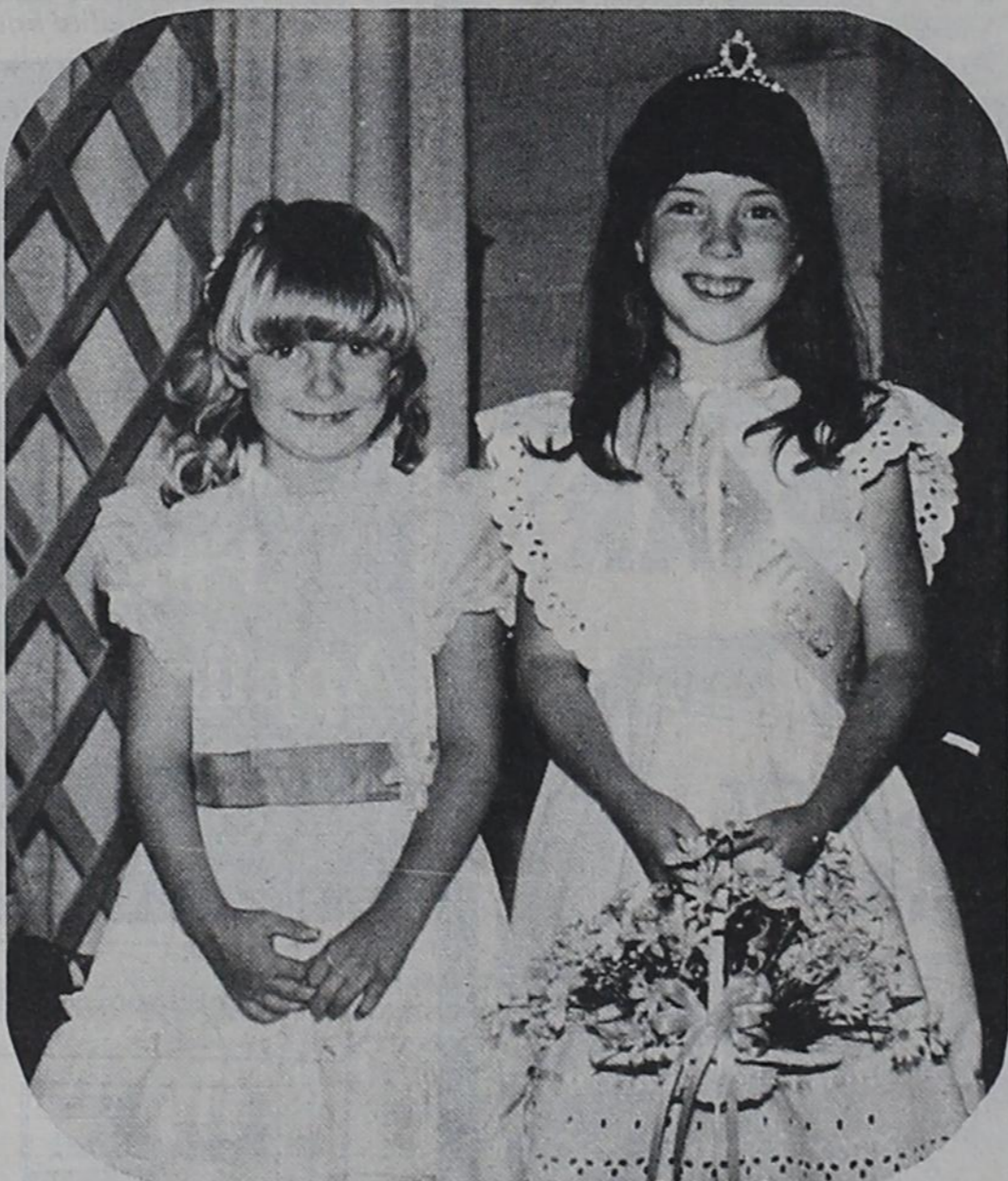

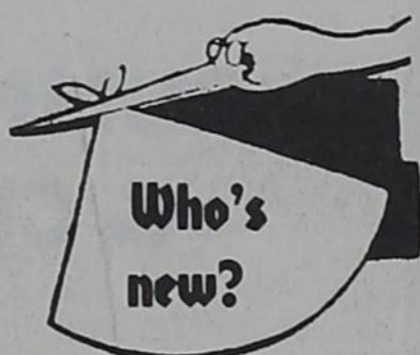

"I am concerned that this extremely important position does not receive the attention it deserves by the voter," Judge Mulanax told his audience in the Dimmitt city hall auditorium. "This is our state's highest court for appeal of criminal cases, yet many voters go to the polls without knowledge of the candidates."

"My opponent's name is Sam Houston Clinton," he noted. "The catchy name has lured the uninformed voter in this low visibility race. This name appears to be my opponent's greatest asset. I suppose some Texans feel they have been good citizens when they cast their vote for this good Texas name. How else could a former American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) lawyer with a record of voting for the criminal be elected in Texas?"

Judge Mulanax is only the second Republican in recent history to campaign for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. By his campaign, Judge Mulanax hopes to give voters in the general election "a conservative option," he said.

"My opponent says he rejects the characterization that he is a liberal who finds ways to reverse criminal cases on a technicality," said Judge Mulanax. "However, Texas Monthly magazine reports that Clinton has voted to reverse two of every three cases in which a written opinion is given. This

record seems to support his characterization as a liberal."

Judge Mulanax, 46, has served since January 1975 as 115th District Court judge in Upshur and Marion Counties.

Members of this year's freshman class may receive up to full tuition in scholarship funds through their participation in the program.

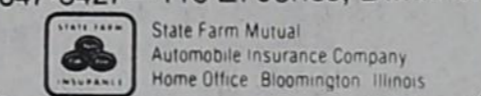

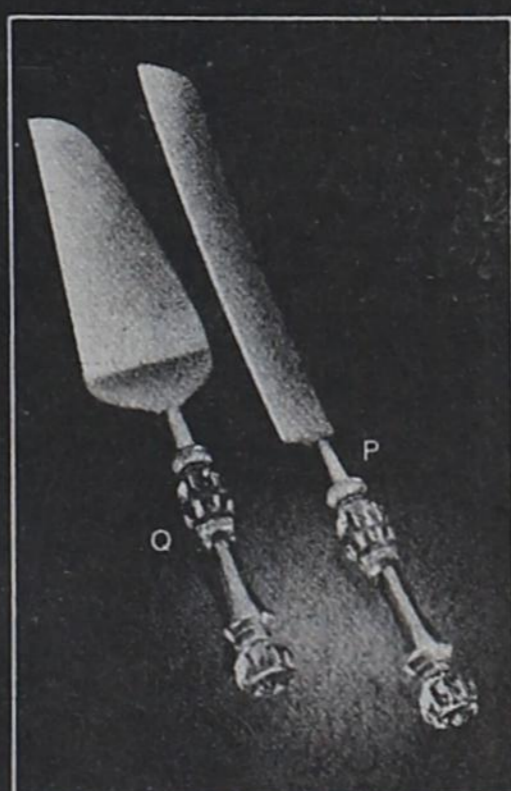
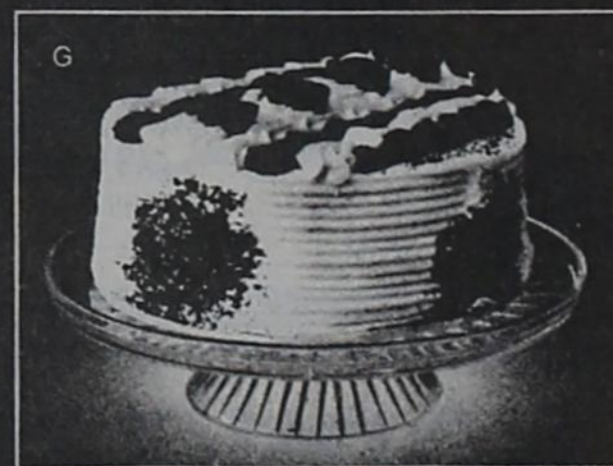
