Vice President James Schoolcraft Sherman died at his home in Utica, New York, Wednesday William H, Taft. Backed by the night, of uremic poison, after a lingering illness. ELECTION PROCLAMATION

By the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico: Whereas, by section 1, chapter 105, laws of 1909, it is made the duty of the board of county commissioners of each county in the state of New Mexico to proclaim the elections that are to be held in the respective counties for the purpose of voting for candidates for the different offices and other matters, father and mother, two brothers and to do so ten days before the election by public proclamation and by publication in each of the two leading newspapers published in each county.
