"Sunny Jim" Sherman is Dead

Vice President James Schoolcraft Sherman died at his home in Utica, New York, Wednesday night, of uremic poison, after a lingering illness. While his disease was an incurable one, the direct cause of his demise at this time was due to his exertions in behalf of his party in the present campaign. Mr. Sherman had been member of congress before his election to the vice presidency, and was the only man ever selected the second time for that position.

His successor will be selected by the senate, Secretary Knox, of the state department, falling heir temporarily to the place under the constitution. Mr. Knox will also figure as a presidential possibility if the election is thrown into the house by the lack of a majority for any set of electors next Tuesday. The sunshiny disposition of Mr. Sherman had one for his the sobriquet of "Sunny Jim," and his memoirs will be the sincere regret of his countrymen.

Change The Constitution.

We believe in the principle of local option, and so believing, we favor the language amendment to our constitution. If Valencia county sends men to the legislature who speak only Spanish, it is her business and her misfortune, just as it is your own affair whom you select to represent Roosevelt county. George Welton Broocke

George Welton Broocke was born 24 years ago last July at Nat Bush, Tenn., and died at Portales, N. M., Oct 23d, 1912, at the home of his father, Peter Broocke.

The Broocke family moved from Haywood county, Tenn., when young George was but two years old and came to Nocono, Texas, where the family lived for about ten years. when they moved to Portales and settled where they now live. This was something near eleven years ago. Young George was therefore only a boy of 13 when they came to Portales and has grown up around here. He is one of five brothers and four sisters,—two of the brothers in the family died when they were young. So that the going of George leaves the father and mother, two brothers and four sisters in the family.

For some time, almost three years, George has lived at Nocono, the old home in Texas, and in Donley county. Last February, he came home a very sick and broken man, but did not take his bed for some time. He suffered from a dead liver and some kind of internal abscesses. The abscess trouble grew gradually worse until two weeks ago the doctor performed a drainage operation, but this seemed to weaken him and only afford temporary relief. The end came suddenly and unexpectedly and while he was sitting up talking to his doctor. He appeared to strangle suddenly and choked and passed away without warning.

He was buried in the Portales cemetery after appropriate exercises at the home.—A friend.

Prominent Railroaders Here.

Mr. Fox came on business of special importance to the people of the town—to make arrangements for the construction of a more commodious depot. Election Proclamation

Proceedings of the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, at a call session thereof held in the court house in Portales, New Mexico, on the 19th day of October, 1912. Present: C. V. Harris, chairman; S. E. Johnston, commissioner; D. K. Smith, commissioner; C. F. Mitchell, clerk.

The law requiring election proclamation to be issued before each general election the following proclamation was uttered, to wit:

ELECTION PROCLAMATION

By the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico: Whereas, by section 1, chapter 105, laws of 1909, it is made the duty of the board of county commissioners of each county in the state of New Mexico to proclaim the elections that are to be held in the respective counties for the purpose of voting for candidates for the different offices and other matters, and to do so ten days before the election by public proclamation and by publication in each of the two leading newspapers published in each county; and

Whereas, it is further made the duty of said boards of county commissioners to give public notice of the object of the election, the officials to be voted for, questions to be voted on, the names of the candidates for each of said offices, as the same are on file in the office of the county clerk and ex-officio recorder, and the post office address of each of the said candidates and the place where the election is to be held in each precinct in each county; and

Whereas, it is required by said section 1, chapter 105, laws of 1909, that the said notice be inserted in daily newspapers six times prior to the day when the election is to be held, but when there is no daily newspaper published in such county, such notice may be inserted in weekly newspapers, in two issues thereof, prior to the date when the election is to be held; and

Therefore, the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, in session held at Portales, New Mexico, on the 19th day of October, A. D. 1912, have ordered as follows, to wit:

That the object of the election which is to be held on the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912, as already proclaimed by the governor of the state, is to elect one representative in congress and three presidential electors and to vote, also, on a proposed amendment to the state constitution, as provided by joint resolution No. 6, passed by the first state legislature and filed in the office of the secretary of state, as approved on the 29th day of May, A. D. 1912. Also for the purpose of voting on a proposed "State Highway Bond Issue of \$500,000.00," as provided by chapter 58 of the acts of the first state legislative assembly, approved June 10th, A. D. 1912.

The names of the candidates for each of the said offices to be voted for on the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912, as the same are on file in the office of the

county clerk and ex-officio recorder of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, and the post office address of each of said candidates is as follows, to wit:

Fergusson by 3,000

The Albuquerque Morning Journal, after a careful estimate from "undoctored" reports, makes the following election prognostication.

Majorities for Fergusson in the committies given, San Juan 300; Colfax, 175; Union, 350; Curry, 700; Roosevelt, 659; Chaves, 775; Eddy, 900; Otero, 150; Dona Ana, 356; Grant, 509; Luna, 425; Sierra, 200; Bernalillo, 400, total, 6,525. Majorities for Jaffa in the counties given—Rio Arriba, 500; Taos, 200; Mora, 250; San Miguel, 800; Santa Fe, 300; Torrance, 100; Valencia, 900; McKinley, 150; Sandoval, 75; total, 3,450.

This gives Mr. Fergusson a net majority of 3,075. Both parties are claiming several counties the majorities claimed by each

being about the same. The Journal gives Lincoln to Jaffa by 75, making their estimate as above. Both sides claim Socorro by 200.

The Herald is of the opinion that Valencia is rated too low in the Jaffa column by about 300 votes. Luna has a registration of just about 1,000, but will not poll over half of them, they are going to the democrats except about 100 votes divided between Jaffa and Marcos de Baca.

Proposed Bond Issue For Construction and Maintenance of State Highways in New Mexico as Provided in Chapter 58 of Acts of 1912

CHAPTER 58
AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS BY THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING AND MAINTAINING A SYSTEM OF STATE HIGHWAYS.
Amend. S. B. No. 161: Approved June 10, 1912.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing payment of the cost of the construction and maintenance of a system of state highways, the State of New Mexico is hereby authorized to incur an indebtedness in the manner provided by this Act, in the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.

Section 2. Immediately after the issue of the proclamation of the Governor as provided in Section 8 of this Act, the State Treasurer shall prepare five hundred suitable bonds of the State of New Mexico in the denomination of one thousand dollars each to be numbered from one to five hundred inclusively, and bear the date of July 1, 1913. The total issue of said bonds shall not exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars and they shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum from the date of issuance thereof. Said bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value at the office of the State Treasurer, at the times and in the manner following, to-wit: The first twenty of said bonds shall be due and payable on the first day of January, 1919, and twenty of said bonds in consecutive numerical order shall be due and payable on the first day of July in each and every year thereafter until and including the first day of July, 1942. The interest accruing on all of said bonds that shall be sold shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the State or elsewhere on the first day of July and the first day of January of each and every year after sale of the same. The interest on all bonds issued and sold shall cease on the day of their maturity and the said bonds so issued and sold shall on the day of their maturity be paid as herein provided, and cancelled by the State Treasurer. All bonds remaining unsold shall at the date of maturity thereof be by the Treasurer of the

State cancelled and destroyed. All bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall be signed by the Governor, countersigned by the Auditor and indorsed by the State Treasurer in office on the first day of July, 1913, and each of said bonds shall have the great seal of the State of New Mexico impressed thereon. The said bonds signed, countersigned, endorsed and sealed as herein provided, when sold shall be and constitute a valid and binding obligation upon the State of New Mexico, although the sale thereof be made at a date or dates after the persons so signing, countersigning and endorsing same shall have ceased to be the incumbents of their respective offices.

Section 3. Appended to each of said bonds there shall be interest coupons so attached that the same may be detached without injury to or mutilation of the bond to which same are attached. The said coupons shall be consecutively numbered and shall bear the lithographic signature of the State Treasurer. No interest shall be paid on any such bond for such time as may intervene between the date thereof and the date of sale of same, unless such accrued interest shall have been by the purchaser of said bond paid to the State at the time of such sale.

Expenses incurred by the Treasurer in the preparation of said bonds and in the advertising of the sale thereof, as in this Act provided, shall be paid by the State Highway Commission upon warrant to the State Treasurer on funds available in the State Road Fund.

Section 4. When the bonds authorized by this Act to be issued, shall have been signed, countersigned, endorsed and sealed as in this Act provided, the State Treasurer shall sell the same in such parcels and numbers as the Governor shall direct, to the highest bidder for cash. The Governor of the State shall issue such direction to the Treasurer immediately after being requested so to do through and by resolution duly adopted and passed by a majority vote of the State Highway Commission. Said resolution shall specify the amount of money which in the judgement of said Highway Commission shall be required at such time, and the Governor shall direct the Treasurer to sell such number of bonds as may be required to raise the amount of money so specified. Said bonds shall be sold in consecutive numerical order, commencing with the first twenty thereof. The

Treasurer shall not accept any bid which is less than the par value of the bond, plus the interest which has accrued thereon between the date of sale and the last preceding interest maturity date. The Treasurer, at the time and place fixed by him for said sale, may continue such sale as to the whole or any part of the bonds offered to such time and place as he may designate at the time of such continuance. Before offering any of such bonds for sale, the Treasurer shall detach therefrom all coupons which have matured or will mature before the date fixed for such sale. He shall publish notice of the time and place of sale in one of the newspaper published at Santa Fe, New Mexico, and in one newspaper published at Albuquerque, New Mexico, and in one newspaper published in each of the cities of New York, Chicago and Kansas City, once a week for four successive weeks next preceding the date fixed for such sale. In addition to the notice last above provided for, the Treasurer may give such further notice as he may deem advisable, but the expenses of such additional notice shall not exceed the sum of one hundred dollars for each sale so advertised. Immediately after such sale of bonds, the Treasurer shall pay into the state treasury and cause to be placed in the State Road Fund the total amount received for said bonds, except such amounts as may have been paid as accrued interest thereon. The moneys placed in the State Road Fund pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be used exclusively for the construction and maintenance of said system of state highways. Provided: that the expenditures of the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds shall be annually apportioned among the several counties of the State upon the basis of the amount annually contributed by each county to the State Road Fund as proceeds of the 1-mill levy required by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Thirty-eighth Legislative Assembly of New Mexico.

Section 5. There is hereby appropriated from the Road Fund in the state treasury such sum annually as shall be necessary to pay the principal and the interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this Act, as said interest and principal become due and payable. The Treasurer shall, on the first day of January and on the first day of July of each year, transfer from the Road Fund to the Interest Fund such amount of the money by this Act appropriated as shall be required to pay accrued

interest on the bonds theretofore sold until the interest on all of such bonds so sold shall have been paid or shall have become due in accordance with the provisions of this Act. There is hereby created in the state treasury a fund to be known and designated as the State Highway Sinking Fund. The Treasurer of the State shall on the first day of January, 1919, and on the first day of January each and every year thereafter in which a parcel of the bonds sold pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall become due, transfer from the Road Fund of the state treasury to the said State Highway Sinking Fund such an amount of the moneys appropriated by this Act as may be required to pay the principal of the bonds so becoming due and payable in such years. Provided, however, that at any time when there shall be an insufficient amount in said Road Fund to pay the principal and interest on the bonds as aforesaid, then and in that event a special levy shall be made to provide for the payment of the said principal and interest as same become due and payable. It is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the levy and collection of said revenue to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

Section 6. As the same becomes due, the principal of all of such bonds shall be paid from the State Highway Sinking Fund, and as the same becomes due, the interest on all bonds sold shall be paid from the Interest Fund. Both principal and interest shall be so paid upon warrants duly drawn by the Auditor upon the Treasurer, and the faith of the State of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the payment of the principal of said bonds so sold and the interest accruing thereon.

Section 7. This Act shall be submitted to the people of the State of New Mexico for their ratification at the next general election to be held in the month of November, 1912, and all ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and at the end thereof the words, "For the State Highway Bond Issue," and in a separate line under the same, the words "Against the State Highway Bond Issue." Opposite said lines there shall be a square in which the voters may make or stamp a cross to indicate whether they vote for or against said bond issue, and those voting for said bond issue shall do so by placing a cross

in the square opposite the words "For the State Highway Bond Issue," and those voting against the said bond issue shall do so by placing a cross in the square opposite the words "Against the Highway Bond Issue."

Section 8. The votes cast for and against said bond issue shall be counted, returned, canvassed and declared in the same manner and subject to the same rules as votes cast for state officers, and if it appears that this Act shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as hereinbefore provided, and shall be irrevocable until the principle and interest of liabilities for the creation of which provision is herein made, shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall accordingly make proclamation thereof. But if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid shall be against said bond issue then this Act shall be and become void.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of state to have this Act published once a week in one newspaper in each county, if one be published therein, throughout this state, for four weeks next preceding the general election to be held in the month of November 1912. The cost of publication shall be paid out of the Road Fund.

Section 10. This Act shall be known and cited as the State Highway Bond Act.

Section 11. All acts and parts of acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Resolution for Enforcement of Gambling Ordinance.

At a meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Portales, N. M., held on Thursday, October 24th, 1912, the following Resolution was presented by the Mayor:

WHEREAS, the attention of the Town Board has been called to the fact that gambling games are being conducted in various places in the Town of Portales, and Whereas, the Town Board has been advised that the gamblers have determined to operate games of chance in our town, and have been advised by attorney that they have a legal right to do so, and, Whereas, Ordinance No. 34, passed and approved the 23rd. day of June, 1911, prohibiting gaming and the operation of gaming in the Town of Portales, and which Ordinance is still in force and effect, having never been repealed, and, Whereas, it is the desire of this Town Board to give to the citizens of Portales a good, clean administration and prevent, so

far as in their power, any infraction of the law: it is the sense of the Town Board, that the town marshal shall proceed to enforce said Ordinance No. 34, and all other ordinances of the Town of Portales, N. M., and bring the offenders before the proper tribunal for punishment.

Upon motion of Mr. E. B. Hawkins, and seconded by Mr. D. Hardy, the Mayor instructed the Clerk to call the roll and received the vote. Those voting Aye were:

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.
PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENT OF SECTION (5) ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE (XXI) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

H. Sub. S. J. R. No. 3. Filed May 29, 1912.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

That Section Five (5) of Article Twenty-one (21) of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, to-wit: "This state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude; and in compliance with the requirements of the said act of Congress, it is hereby provided that ability to read, write, speak and understand the English language sufficiently well to conduct the duties of the office without the aid of an interpreter, shall be a necessary qualification for all state officers and members of the state legislature."

ARTICLE XXI.

Section 5. This state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.
