### George Carleton

Sunday morning Nov. 24, 1912, George Carleton, son of Rev. L. W. Carleton, died at the family residence seven miles north of Portales.

While in Roswell last summer he contracted typhoid fever and a long illness followed. He apparently recovered during the summer, but about one month ago a complication of troubles developed and although the recipient of constant and loving care by the family, grew worse until death relieved his sufferings.

He was born in Texas about 25 years ago, and came with the family to this community in the fall of 1907. George was a young man of clean, Christian life and habits, a consistent member of the M. E. church, and his genial disposition won him a host of friends wherever he was known, and his early death is regretted.

His parents and a large family of brothers and sisters survive him, all except one sister, Mrs. Lon Beatty, of Hico, Texas, being present when the end came.

Funeral services were conducted at the cemetery Sunday afternoon by Rev. Seba Kirkpatrick, of the M. E. church.

We extend to the family our sincere sympathy in this sore bereavement and trust that they may all meet George in heaven.

### World's Fair Note

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. The Daughters of the American Revolution throughout the State of California, through their various chapters, are not only endorsing the campaign inaugurated by the school children of California to secure the Liberty Bell for the 2915 Exposition, but are planning to use their great organization to bring the priceless relic to this city during the world's fair.

Mrs. I. N. Chapman of Alameda, who is State Regent of the California Daughters of the American Revolution, and Miss Suzanne Patch, chairman of the committee on patriotic education of the organization are sending out letters to the Chapter Regents in this city and other sections of California, as follows:

"The school children in the State of California have inaugurated a campaign to bring the Liberty Bell to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, which is to be held in San Francisco in 1915.

"This petition has been signed by nearly 250,000 children in the state, and when completed is to be sent to the Mayor of the City Council of Philadelphia for consideration.

"The enclosed resolutions submitted to your chapter, with the request that they be adopted and the members be called upon to use their utmost endeavors to aid the children in their worthy campaign.

"It is also suggested that the newspapers of your city be notified of the passage of the resolutions, or similar in character, so that the widest publicity may be given to the efforts of the Daughters of the Revolution in carrying out this plan.

"Will you kindly notify me when action is taken by your chapter in this matter."
