Proposition for Farmers

Mr. E. E. Van Horn, representative of the Sunbeam Creamery, will be here December the 23rd, to close a deal with the farmers of the Portales Valley, by the way of placing a bunch of fine cows with them. These cows are the best to be had for the purpose and will no doubt add material aid to the finances of the farmers. He has shipped one car load of these cows to the farmers of Ft. Sumner and one to the farmers of Arizona. These cows are to be bought and the farmer can pay for them as they like on the installment plan. According to statements from those who have them in use at this time, the cream sent to the factory will pay the installments as they come, eventually making the cow belong to the farmer without practically noticing the cost to them. This proposition should not be overlooked by a single farmer of the valley. Make this industry one that will mean much to you and the whole community.

A Good Asset

One of the best this valley has is, like most things of genuine worth, modest and unassuming. We refer to James Ryther, a lad of some 78 years young, who is raising onions of such heavy yield that they can hardly find stacking room on the plat where raised, sweet peppers so large that we hesitate at description, and celery so crisp and succulent that Avery Turner calls it "delicious". A demonstration plant with James Ryther to show'em how to plant, irrigate, cultivate and harvest the crops he so successfully raises would be worth more to this town and valley than a sugar beet factory; we are not depreciating the advantages a sugar factory offers, either. Greater acreage in the vegetables named, with success in raising, would soon bring us the sugar factory, too.

World's Fair Note

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. The Daughters of the American Revolution throughout the State of California, through their various chapters, are not only endorsing the campaign inaugurated by the school children of California to secure the Liberty Bell for the 2915 Exposition, but are planning to use their great organization to bring the priceless relic to this city during the world's fair.

Mrs. I. N. Chapman of Alameda, who is State Regent of the California Daughters of the American Revolution, and Miss Suzanne Patch, chairman of the committee on patriotic education of the organization are sending out letters to the Chapter Regents in this city and other sections of California, as follows:

"The school children in the State of California have inaugurated a campaign to bring the Liberty Bell to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, which is to be held in San Francisco in 1915.

"This petition has been signed by nearly 250,000 children in the state, and when completed is to be sent to the Mayor of the City Council of Philadelphia for consideration.

"The enclosed resolutions submitted to your chapter, with the request that they be adopted and the members be called upon to use their utmost endeavors to aid the children in their worthy campaign.

"It is also suggested that the newspapers of your city be notified of the passage of the resolutions, or similar in character, so that the widest publicity may be given to the efforts of the Daughters of the Revolution in carrying out this plan.

"Will you kindly notify me when action is taken by your chapter in this matter."

Parcels Post Rates

January 1st, 1913, the operation of the parcels post will begin. It will require special parcels post stamps to secure the benefits of this new law. These will be sold by the local post master.

The rates will vary according to distance, and we give below a few of the extreme charges, both minimum and maximum:

The distance is divided into zones, the local zone covering 50 miles from your post office, and the charge will be from 5 to 15 cents for eleven pounds, and intermediate weights being between those extremes. The one pounder rate will vary from 5 cents at your local office to 12 cents for a distance of 1800 miles or over, each zone being about one cent per pound more or less than the one next to it, and the distance for a zone being from 150 miles to 600 miles, the farther you send it the greater mileage to the zone haul. The rates of postage are greatly reduced and the application of the law will mean a saving of millions of dollars per annum to patrons of the post office. The highest charge enumerated is \$1.32 for carrying an eleven eleven pound parcel 1800 miles or more. Parcels must not be more than 72 inches in length and girth, must not contain anything that might injure any employee of the service, must not be easily destroyed, or perishable within a reasonable time.

So what has he got on me?

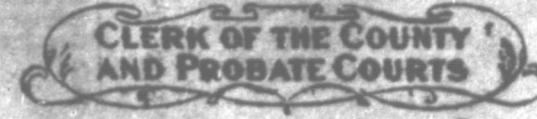
The rich man over the way can't eat—

Southern Pacific Bond Employees

Beginning with January 1 of next year, the Harriman Lines will assume all bond premiums of employees in their service, according to an announcement made at the offices of the Southern Pacific company here today. In the past, it has been the custom to require all men handling money to put up a security bond, and the premium on it has been paid by the employe, himself. After the first of the year this expense will be borne by the railroad company.

On the Pacific System of the Southern Pacific, alone, there are about 45,000 employes, and the new arrangement, it is said, will involve a heavy expenditure annually.

Alfalfa Planting

There will be considerable land seeded to alfalfa in the next few months. A few hints along the line of preparing the seed-bed help the farmer to obtain a good stand. The necessity of preparing the land properly before the seed is sown cannot be emphasized too strongly, for one should not expect to secure a good stand of alfalfa if the land is poorly leveled and the clods left unbroken. The farmer who spends time and capital in the preparation of his seed-bed is the one who will reap the greatest profit on his land.

In the first place see that the land is level; that is to say, have the field such a shape that the water when irrigating at a uniform depth over the entire plot or border. The danger of killing the alfalfa by too much water in the low places is thereby eliminated.

Have the land leveled so that the use of many cross borders will not be necessary. These are not only an annoyance in mowing but cause the mower to depreciate in value rapidly, and numerous cross borders afford a place for weeds and grasses to get a start.

There are no fixed rules to follow in leveling a piece of land for alfalfa but it has been found that by using the fresno scraper very good results can be obtained. These scrapers can be bought in various sizes and can be handled very successfully by the ordinary farm laborer.

If the land has never been in cultivation it is well to seed the land to an annual crop such as corn or wheat for the first year, and in this way determine whether or not the land is level. It will always be found that the land will need re-leveling, dragging off the high spots and filling the low ones. However, if it is essential that the alfalfa be seeded the first year, the land should be bordered before seeding and irrigated, and the levelness of the land determined. The scraper may be applied again where necessary.

After land is properly leveled before the seed is sown, consider the texture of the soil. If the soil breaks up cloddy some instrument such as the disc harrow or the clod crusher should be used to pulverize the soil thoroughly. Have the soil in such a condition that every seed that is sown will have a fine loose soil in which to send its roots. A more uniform stand of alfalfa may be secured on a well pulverized soil. Less seed per acre will be required on such a piece of land for all the seeds are in a position to take root readily and grow. On a soil that is cloddy some of the seeds will fall in cracks and others on clods. In the cracks the seeds will be piled up much thicker than necessary, while the seeds that fall on clods may not receive sufficient moisture to insure germination.—Rupert L. Stewart, Assistant in Agronomy.
