Library gets \$90,000 gift

Castro County will receive a new library with its own separate building, thanks to a \$90,000 gift this week by Mrs. Tyline Perry of Plainview, member of a pioneer Castro County family.

MRS. PERRY owns the Nanny Farms near Hart, plus farmland south of Dimmitt. She has been a contributor to the Castro County Library for many years.

She said she is making her \$90,000 gift in memory of her grandparents, Morton G. and Lucy Rhoads, and her uncles, Rufus and Morgan Rhoads, all early day pioneers and landowners in this county.

The new library's name will be the Morton G. Rhoads Memorial Library.

MRS. PERRY'S large endowment is to be used as a building fund for construction of the new library building. Local library officials indicated this week they would like to seek state and federal matching funds to make it a top-rated library, and a spokesman for Mrs. Perry said she is agreeable to the idea of securing matching funds.

Mrs. Perry made her contribution through the Perry Foundation of Denver, which she chartered and serves as president.

"It has been my desire for some time that the Perry Foundation make a gift or contribution to the library at Dimmitt, since most of my property and lands

School now GED test center; equivalency tests available

If you did not receive a high school diploma, you can now take the tests for a high school equivalency certificate through a new service of Dimmitt Public Schools.

Supt. Charlie White announced this week that interested persons may take the General Educational Development (GED) tests through the local school system.

WELDON Skinner, curriculum director, will administer the first GED tests here next week, starting at 6 p.m. May 29 and continuing at 8 a.m. May 30. The test takes 10 hours, and will be given at South Elementary School.

Skinner has been designated as a chief examiner for the GED tests by the Texas Education Agency, and the local school has been officially named a GED test center.

A \$10 fee will be charged for the complete battery of five tests, to cover costs of materials. A person failing one or more of the tests may be retested at a later date at \$2 per test.

The five testing areas are (1) correctness and effectiveness of the expression (English usage), (2) social studies, (3) natural science, (4) interpretation of literary ma-

Population set at 10,292

The Census Bureau district office this week set Castro County's preliminary 1970 population at 10,292.

THIS IS an increase of 1,369, or 15 percent, over the county's official 1960 population of 8,923.

District Manager Robert L. Butler said the Census Bureau will begin this fall publishing official population figures for counties, cities, towns and villages.

The Census Bureau already has released preliminary population and has drawn fire from officials of Amarillo, Lubbock and other cities who feel the population count in their cities was not complete.

Born April 1, 1918, in Indianapolis, Ind., Mr. Hamilton had been a resident of Dimmitt 13 years. He was an accountant with the firm of Schaeffer & Ratcliff, and formerly was the bookkeeper for Farmers Supply of Dimmitt.

HE HAD been attending West Texas State University as a part-time student for eight years, and was to have received his bachelor's degree in accounting this month.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Hamilton was secretary of the Dimmitt Lions Club and a member of St. Anthony Catholic Church.

He is survived by his wife, Loranell; three daughters, Sheila Ann, Jeanmarie and Mary Kathleen; his mother, Mrs. Helen Hamilton of Kalamazoo, Mich.; a sister, Mrs. Max Dadds of Kalamazoo, Mich.; and a brother, Michael, of Groton, Conn.

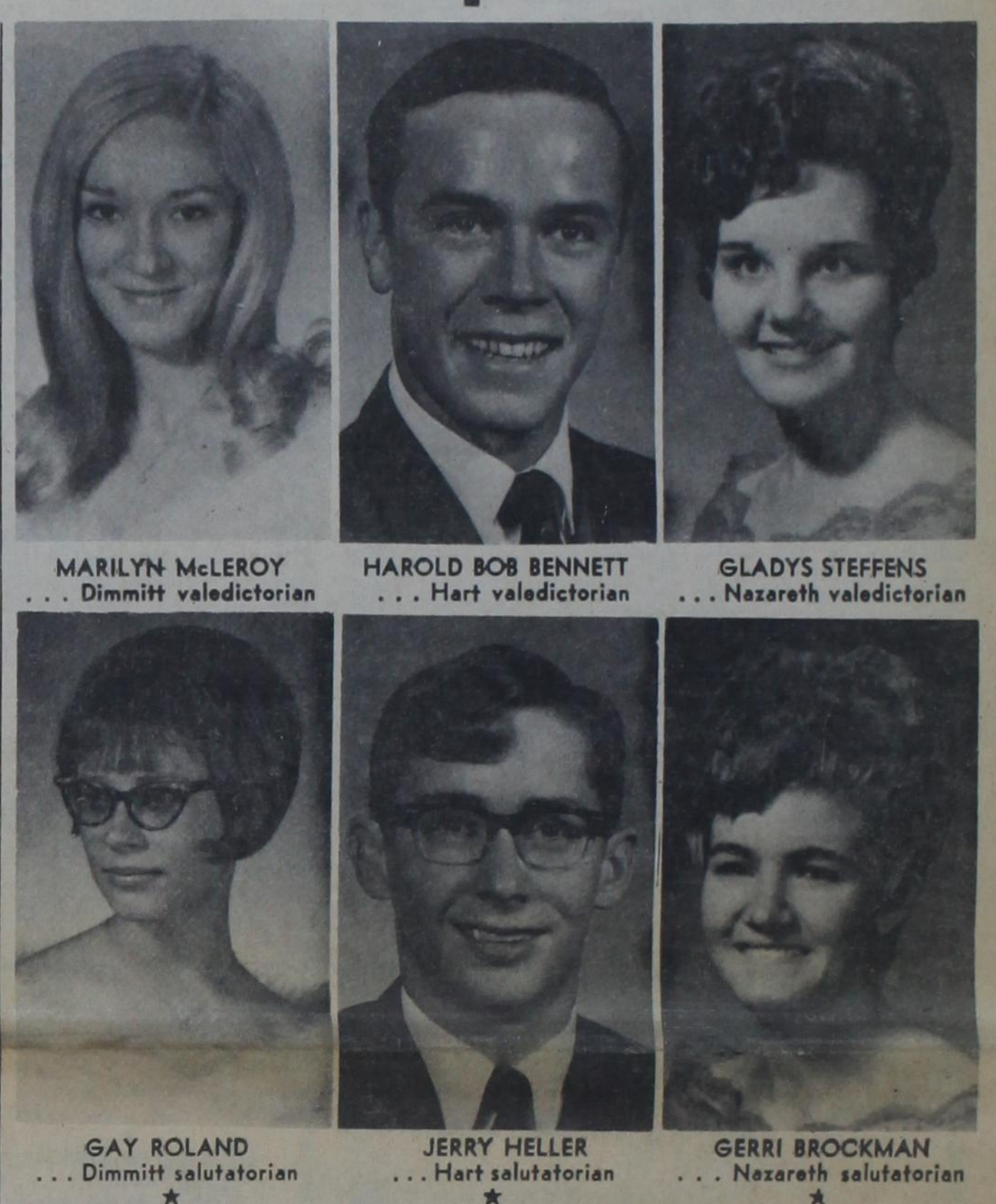
Mrs. Maxie Horton and Andrea George will play the processional and recessional music for both the baccalaureate and commencement services at Dimmitt High.

Top scholars announced

With a four-year grade average of 92.67, Marilyn McLeRoy is the valedictorian of Dimmitt High School's Class of 1970.

GAY ROLAND, just half a point behind Miss McLeRoy with a 92.18 grade average, was announced this week as the salutatorian of the DHS graduating class.

Six of Dimmitt High School's 92 graduates posted honor grade averages higher than 90 during their four years of high school — and all are girls. The graduating class's four other top scholars are Barbara Hansen (91.77), Delores Wilke (91.56), Kathy Markley (91.37) and Rita Dowse (90.36).

Miss McLeRoy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edd McLeRoy, 710 W. Halsell St., has earned honors in many fields besides scholarship. She was selected an "Outstanding Teenager of America" this year, was named the school's "Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow," and was chosen as the Dimmitt Young Homemakers' "Little Sister" for 1970.

THE DHS valedictorian won the scholastic art award this year, and during her past two years she was the winner of the school's awards in American and world history.

Miss McLeRoy is president of the National Honor Society chapter, editor of the school year book "The Bobcat," yearbook chairman of Future Teachers of America, president of the DHS Art Club, and is a member of the Bobcat Band, Lyre Club and Future Homemakers of America.

Born in Canyon, Miss McLeRoy has attended Dimmitt Public Schools since the first grade. She plans to attend Texas Tech.

MISS ROLAND, whose preferred name of Gay is a contraction of her full name, Gabrielle, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert T. Roland of Route 4.

Miss Roland transferred to Dimmitt High School at the beginning of the current school year after attending Tulia High School three years.

The DHS salutatorian is secretary of the school's library club and was a delegate to the district Library Club convention this year. She also is a member of the Future Homemakers of America, National Honor Society, DHS Drama Club and National Thespians. At Tulia High, she was a member of the Library Club three years, and as a freshman was a delegate to the district Library Clubs convention.

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Gilliland earns state citation

An official State Health Dept. citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Clifford L. Gilliland, water superintendent for the city of Dimmitt.

SIGNED by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

STATE LAW requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Gilliland's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

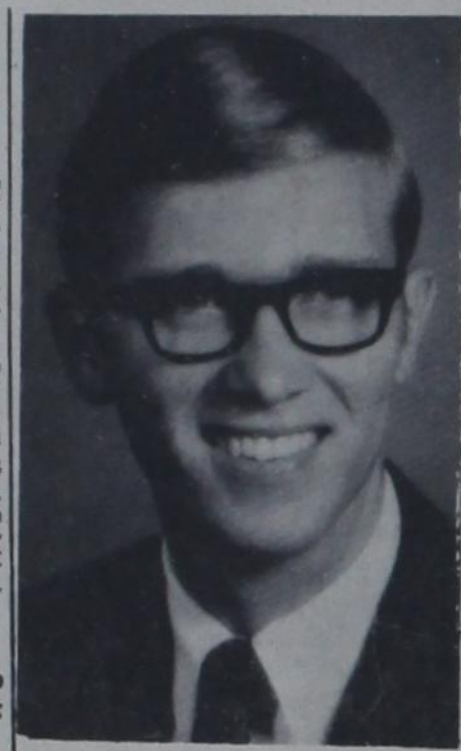

Make sure your land complies before certifying your crops

Castro County farmers who are taking part in the feed grain, wheat and cotton programs are being reminded that early compliance and early certification will mean early payments this year.

JIM ELDER, chairman of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said that while farmers should certify compliance as soon as possible, they also must understand that acreage certifications are not to be made until they know they are in compliance with all program regulations.

When a participant in a 1970 farm program certifies compliance, he certifies accurately to acreages in the program crops and to diverted acreage. He also certifies that he has complied with conserving base provisions, with regulations that apply if he has an interest in more than one farm, that the diverted acres on his farm are devoted to an approved conserving use, and that all other program requirements have been met.

As soon as a program participant certifies, the county ASCS office begins processing papers for his full payment for 1970 program participation. Payments to producers will begin soon after July 1 and are expected to be completed by the end of August — the earliest date ever set for completion of program payments.

AFTER A farm has been certified to be in compliance with farm programs, it may be checked at any time to determine if any errors were made in certification. If errors are found, the producer will be determined to have not fully complied and may lose some or all of his farm program payments.

Elder said the county ASCS office has received instructions to keep up to date on farm control checks.

A substantial number of farms in the county will be selected at random for these checks. Also, every farm in which an ASCS official has an interest will be checked.

Generally, the percentage of errors found is quite small and usually the result of carelessness or misunderstanding. We hope this year to find fewer certification mistakes than ever before," Elder said.

Monitor program on insecticides planned by TDA

An intensified pesticide monitoring program to define any existing problems in Texas caused by the use of chemicals in agricultural production is being developed by the Texas Department of Agriculture, Commissioner John C. White reports.

BROOKE Tidswell III, a graduate of the College of Agriculture and Environmental Science at Rutgers University, is helping initiate the program.

In the program, TDA also began operating its new Pesticide Residue Laboratory in Brenham in October, 1969, with the primary purpose of testing crops for harmful residue. White's agency also operates a mobile pesticide residue testing laboratory seasonally in vegetable production areas of Texas.

Other functions of the developing program on agricultural environmental matters, Commissioner White said, will include a study of ways to prevent and reduce pollution caused by animal wastes.

Tidswell, a native of Mount Holly, N.J., and a Navy veteran, came to TDA early this year as an administrative technician in environmental studies. He was discharged from the Navy in 1969 as a lieutenant (jg.).

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What does a college man think while taking part in protest?

(Editor's Note: The invasion of Cambodia by US forces touched off a new wave of protest on the nation's campuses against our government's policy in Southeast Asia. Then the deaths of four students at Kent State University catalyzed student dissent to the point that many campuses have been closed. But violence is not the only trademark of this latest protest movement, nor is radicalism its only parents. These new dissenters are students whom we have not heard from before — they do not all wear the badge of long hair; few of them are aligned with the SDS; most of them don't want violence; many of them have expressed a desire to work within the system for change. What are these students' thoughts on this issue which threatens to split the Nixon Administration? Bob Bradford of Dimmitt, a senior psychology student at the University of Missouri at Columbia, penned his views while taking part in a peaceful demonstration on his campus May 11. This newspaper is committed to the free market of ideas, one of the basics of our democracy, so we are glad to provide the forum for Bob's thoughts here. We welcome your views, also.)

A lot has been happening lately, hasn't it?

THIS CAMPUS has been relatively calm, up to today. Last Friday night I went to a rally on the quadrangle. There were two to three thousand students there, including speakers consisting of Marvin Kalb, Harry Reasoner and Dr. Cavanah. Each spoke against the administration policy in Southeast Asia, and for the right and productivity of student dissent.

There have been no classes to speak of since the killings at Kent State last Monday, except in the Agriculture, Engineering and Medical Schools.

About 20 minutes ago, more than 2,000 students occupied Jesse Hall and are sitting peacefully, waiting for the chancellor to come and talk to them. I am in that group now, writing this.

IT IS STRANGE that there are relatively few hippies in this group. (In fact, there seem to be more state police than hippies). Most of us are very peaceable middle-class students who are completely fed up with the Nixon Administration in general and his for-

ign policy in particular. (Nixon and Agnew were burned in effigy last Thursday night, with their ashes in black coffins placed before the ROTC Building — again, all very peacefully. In fact, there was barely a sound during the whole proceeding.)

I have always been against the war, but never so much as now, and I have been taking an active part in most of the demonstrations.

Nixon predates his power on the people being silent. It is very ironic that the only majority Nixon could come up with was a "silent" majority. In essence, it makes no difference if these silent people are for or against policy — all that is important as far as Nixon is concerned is that they remain silent. As long as these people do not speak out, Nixon can call them to his side.

TO GIVE Nixon credit, it is one of the biggest bluffs pulled on the American people in a long time. It is also very ironic that the phrase, "Great Silent Majority," first came from Homer, who was referring to the dead.

From this imagined silent mass, Nixon has assumed a mandate for this policy in Southeast Asia. He even went so far as to use this theatrical backing to launch an invasion of a neutral country without either the consent of Congress or of the country involved — an act which in itself is a violation of the Constitution.

Thus, the invasion of Cambodia was not only in violation of the Constitution but was based on a mandate that does not in reality exist. It is also very ironic here that Nixon, who was elected (by a minority) on his promise to end the war, can then turn and use a nonexistent majority and expand the war. Not only that, but he purposely and consciously, through his vice-president, alienates and belittles a large segment of his ablest and most intelligent constituents.

AT THIS point, you might ask why Nixon is intent upon alienating the student population. Nixon was beginning to see that much of the country was becoming impatient with his foreign policy, so he made his speech appealing to his silent majority (a term which excludes students by the very fact that we are not silent).

In the same speech, he implied that if there were a concerted effort on the part of the American people behind his policy, the war

would end sooner. In this one speech he not only alienated the student population from public voice, but turned the country against the students by insinuating that they were "radicals," and not a part of American society.

Nixon was thus turning public animosity away from the war toward the student population — a maneuver that worked very well for a while, and is still working in some areas, as evidenced by the march of the construction workers in New York City. These workers are not for the war; they are simply against students — an indication of how politically effective Nixon can be.

BUT NIXON made a great mistake in invading Cambodia. Again, he called on the backing of his "silent majority," but to his dismay there were few who were silent, and even fewer who agreed with his policy. His logic is un-sound, and at times even absurd. He made the mistake of acting without the consent or even the prior knowledge of Congress which threw much of that body against him. He ignored the advice of many of his cabinet and top officials, thus causing resignations and reprisals (Secretary of Interior Hickel, for example).

By already alienating the student population, he had also alienated much of the college administration and faculty. Many of his "silent majority" began writing to their congressmen, demanding action.

In summary, Nixon (1) violated the Constitution by means of a nonexistent majority mandate; (2) has, through emotional rather than rational appeals, segregated a large segment of the American population who believe in this country strongly (i.e., students); (3) has, in effect, lied to the American people by expanding rather than ending the war; (4) has jeopardized the future of the Republican Party in an election year and has done perhaps the only thing possible to solidify the rival party; (5) has, by abandoning sound logic and reason, pulled a mammoth bluff on his constituency; and (6) has jeopardized the economic future of this country by continuing a war which it can no longer afford to support.

LET'S LOOK at this economic aspect for a moment.

Nixon is pouring billions upon billions of dollars into Vietnam with no thought of ever getting any of that money back. This coun-

try made a profit off of both World War I and World War II by turning to a war economy and acting accordingly. But since this war is an undeclared war, it must be supported by a peacetime economy — a situation that can only lead to continued inflation and perhaps even recession.

Nixon is giving, not selling, just giving everything we have to the Vietnamese. Just how long does he think any organization can remain solvent when it purposely gives away all its assets with no hope of return? (Also ironic here is that we will sell to Israel, but give to Vietnam.)

AS A result of this charity, there is little money left for the maintenance of the country. The effects: continually increased cost of living, continued increase in interest rates, continued increase in college tuitions and fees, decreased money available for education.

This college must run on less money than it had last year. There are 200 applicants for each teaching job in St. Louis. Columbia schools desperately need 50 new teachers next year, but they have the money to hire only four. Gov. Hearnes announced last week that unless new revenue is forthcoming the state of Missouri will be down to its last \$500,000 by the end of the year, yet the people refuse to increase any form of tax since their cost of living is so high already. Graduate stipends this year have been cut by three-fourths. National Science Foundation fellowships were cut by one-half. Government research grants were cut drastically, releasing many PhD's to find nonexistent jobs. Graduate enrollment has been cut by at least one-half in all colleges and universities. Etcetera, etcetera.

Most of these examples concern education, because that is what I know most about, but I am sure you will have no trouble finding examples of tight money in your own situation.

THE SOONER people realize that this war is ruining this country socially, politically and economically, the sooner we will get out of Southeast Asia and the sooner we can start getting back on our feet.

So in light of all this, it is senseless to talk of the war in terms of winning or losing. The US cannot win this war in any sense of the word, and the longer we

stay over there the more certain our eventual defeat from within. In this case, either the hawks or the doves are correct — we must either revert to a war economy and end this thing, or we must pull out and try to re-establish peaceful parity.

To Nixon, the war has become some sort of ego game, dealt with in terms of victory or defeat — an attitude that is totally unrealistic and ultimately disastrous not only to the country but to society at large.

The state police have just entered and started arresting people. More later...

Late afternoon

THE POLICE have backed off now and all is again peaceful. About 30 students in all were arrested and taken to the police station, but since they had broken no laws, no charges were filed and they were released. Most are back here.

I must say the arresting procedure was very efficient, and there was no resistance. Most of the arrested students walked to the bus by themselves, much to the consternation of the police, who were in full riot gear and prepared for what looked like a Russian invasion.

But all is peaceful now; the police are standing around the perimeter and we are singing and talking. No one has even feared at the police — that is not what we are here for.

WE ARE not interrupting university functions, we are not being destructive in any sense, we even have squads to keep the quadrangle clean. All we want is for this war to end with the resultant effect that armed force will be removed from the campuses and no more students will be killed.

We are Americans first. We sincerely want what is best for this country and for this reason we must speak out. But we are also students, basically intelligent, reasonable, and nonviolent, who want nothing more than to remove the chance that curses us, and to get back to our study to better prepare ourselves for the job of preserving this country that we so dearly love.

I have not touched on the college turmoil as such, since it is difficult for anyone not within the college community to understand it, much as it is difficult for us to understand the inside workings of your city government, for example.

BUT I DO think that the welfare of the country must come first, for both students and the community at large. I hope this letter will in some small way illustrate what we think and feel

on a typical university campus, our companions home. I leave you with this thought which I saw printed on a classroom blackboard: "Are we in Vietnam because of too much learning?"

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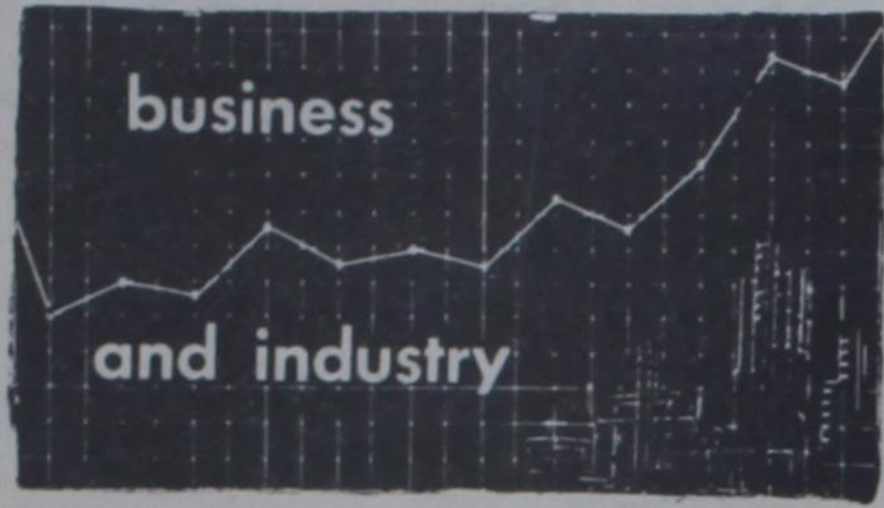
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Salvation Army names field rep

June 30 target date is set on county food stamp programs

Major expansion of the Food Stamp Program announced in January has affected Texas. Latest figures show that food stamps valuing more than \$2.5 million are spent by Texas limited-income households monthly.

THE PROGRAM has been implemented in 11 counties, and 20 more are in the process of establishing a food stamp program. Castro County officials are working to establish a food stamp program here.

The families buy a certain amount of federal food coupons (food stamps) each month. The US Department of Agriculture then provides additional coupons to increase the family's food buying power. About 75 percent of the coupons are free.

All Texas counties should have food stamp or donated food programs by June 30, according to State Department of Public Welfare officials, who administer the distribution of both programs.

THE TEXAS Agricultural Extension Service coordinates county educational programs to help commodity foods to provide nutritionally adequate meals. These families are among those enrolled in Extension's Expanded Nutrition Program.

The Texas State Nutrition Council asked the Extension Service to act as county coordinator of the educational programs in wise use of donated foods and food stamps. Home demonstration agents were asked to work with other agencies and groups on these programs.

Agents train leaders to work with the families. Mrs. Florence Low, assistant director for home economics, said. Leaders learn to give food demonstrations, conduct workshops and group meetings and make home visits. The leaders then work with families in the two programs.

FOOD STAMPS are used like cash in local stores authorized to accept them. They can be used only to purchase food.

Five Texas Counties — Montgomery, Chambers, Parker, Wharton and Brazoria — soon will establish the program. The Food Stamps Program now operates in areas of Houston, San Antonio, Bryan, Fort Worth, El Paso and Big Bend of West Texas.

In the commodity food program, low income persons receive about \$14 a month worth of food such as flour, cornmeal, canned juice, cheese and canned meat.

According to existing plans, the Food Stamp Program will replace donated foods, said E. W. Kuykendall, assistant director for Commodity Distribution Division, Austin.

THE SECOND Texas Conference on Commercial Gamebird Management will be held May 27 in Texas A&M University Memorial Student Center, according to Ben Wormeli Extension poultry specialist. All good food isn't expensive

When pennies count, consider thrifty trades. One of the first targets in a family economy drive often is the food budget, reached without sacrificing either good food or good nutrition.

THAT TAKES a keen sense of healthful food values in relation to food costs, plus good judgment. Basically, it calls for choices made from each of the four food groups — meat-eggs; milk-cheese; vegetable-fruit; and bread-cereals.

For a starter, Gwendolyn Clycott, Extension consumer marketing specialist suggests the following:

High cost — calves liver, frozen halibut steaks, prime rib beef roast, porterhouse steak, ground sirloin, canned red salmon, sweetbreads, center sliced ham, fresh orange juice, wheat flakes, whole milk, fancy sweet rolls, soft drinks.

MODERATE cost — beef liver, frozen cod or haddock, rump roast, rib steak, ground beef, corned pink salmon, tongue, ham shank, frozen orange juice, shredded wheat, evaporated milk, raisin bread, canned fruit juices.

Low cost — pork liver, frozen ocean perch, chuck roast, cube steak, hamburger, canned mackerel, heart, canned luncheon meat, canned orange juice, cooked whole wheat cereal, dry milk solids, cinnamon toast, lemonade from canned juice.

H-D Notes

State Fair premium list now available

By IRENE KEATING
I have received a supply of the 1970 State Fair of Texas women's department premium lists. If any of you are interested in entering call or come by for the information.

IT IS hard to realize that school is nearly over for another year. I know everyone is looking forward to an enjoyable summer. I hope that all of you will have a summer that will revitalize you for living. Being out of doors a lot and getting fresh air and sunshine helps us to have better health. Summer is a natural time for good exercise and for doing all the yard work we planned during our winter confinements.

HERE IS our May garden calendar to help get those outside jobs done.

1. Fertilize the lawn in early May using 5 pounds of ammonium sulfate or three pounds of ammonium nitrate per 1000 square feet. Heavier applications can burn the grass and may also cause heavy growth and require frequent mowing. Water the lawn thoroughly after applying the fertilizer.

2. Inspect lawns at regular intervals for diseases. Consult extension bulletin L-732 "Control Diseases in the Home Lawn" for description of symptoms and control measures to use.

3. A good mulch will eliminate the need for cultivation as well as conserve moisture and reduce weeds. Material that can be used as a mulch include pine bark, pine straw, redwood bark, sugar cane pulp, chopped straw, etc.

4. CONTINUE to watch for aphids, thrip, red spider mites, caterpillars, white fly leaf rollers and scale. Consult L-199 for control measures to use.

5. Provide supplemental irrigation as needed. Deeper root penetration can be obtained by allowing soil to become moderately dry before watering.

6. Make cuttings of your favorite chrysanthemums and root them in a mixture of clean sand and peat moss.

7. Prune climbing roses after they complete blooming to insure a supply of new growth for next year's flower production.

8. Continue to spray roses for blackspot control.

9. FERTILIZE and water rose beds for continued growth and bloom.

10. Pinch back leggy annuals to encourage branching.

11. Fertilize dahlias every four to six weeks.

12. Plant Caladium Tubers in shaded areas for colorful summer foliage. Soil temperature should be at least 70 degrees before planting.

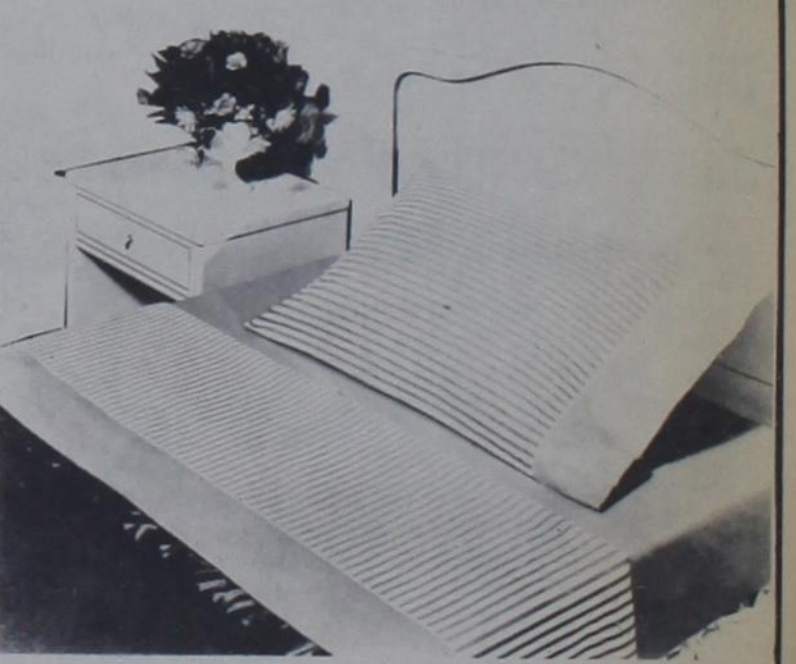

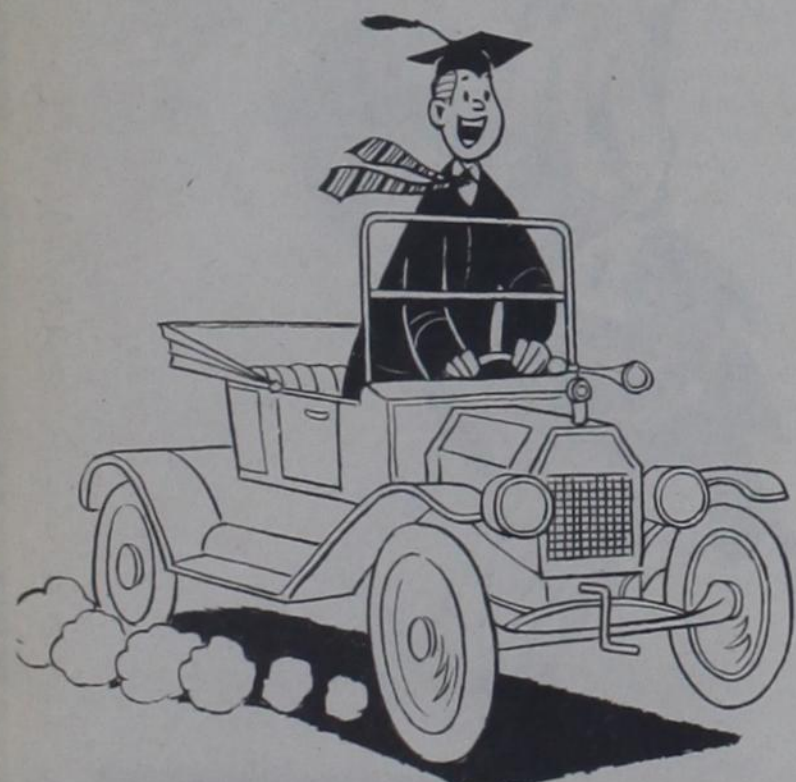

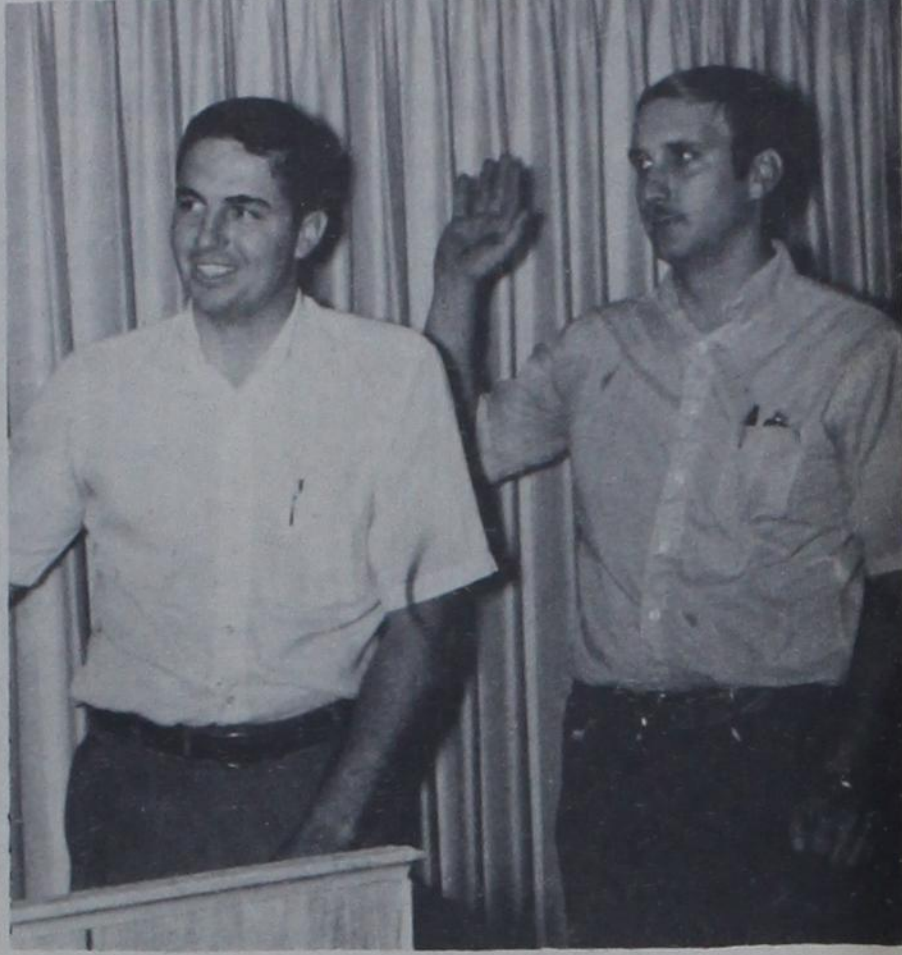

Tractor course planned for boys

State Capitol Highlights

Replacement is hired for bank commissioner

In the space of less than an hour, the State Finance Commission accepted the retirement of "Mr. Banking" himself — State Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner; named a new banking commissioner; fired State Consumer Credit Commissioner Francis A. Miskell; and named a new credit commissioner.

These actions brought to an end long-time controversies over Falkner's replacement and Miskell's position. Commissioner Falkner, who has been with the banking department nearly 50 years (23 as commissioner), has been wanting to retire for some time, but the Finance Commission could not agree on someone to take his place. Falkner wanted his deputy commissioner (since 1965), Robert E. Stewart, to fill the post, but there was dissension on the board. However, the problems were worked out before the meeting, and Stewart was picked unanimously. In a surprise move, Commission voted 6-2 to discharge Commissioner Miskell and named Asst. Atty. Gen. Sam Kelley to succeed him immediately.

Miskell weathered one storm threat early this year, when it was rumored segments of the loan industry were out to "get him" because of administrative actions against them. After stern talk, Commission refused to accept Miskell's resignation in February. There was no warning in this latest round. Commission members blamed administrative differences and the fact that four

key agency staff positions had not been filled. **AG RULES**
A member of the legislature cannot be paid from funds appropriated by the legislature for goods or services the lawmaker or firm of which he is a member sells the state, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin said in a recent ruling. Opinion concluded that whether the corporation in which a legislator owns stock is precluded from contracting with the state or county must be determined on the basis of each individual case. In another ruling, Martin said state agencies may sponsor seminars on appropriate matters and charge registration fees to defray expenses. State employees and officials may be reimbursed for registration expense.

CHEMICALS
Agricultural chemicals containing DDT will not be accepted for registration by the Texas Department of Agriculture until a study on their effect is completed, Commissioner John C. White announced. Suspension of registration "does not mean that any ill effects from

the agricultural use of DDT compounds have been reported or found," White said. He added that household products containing DDT will continue to be registered for use. Governor Smith has appointed an advisory committee to study the use and effects of DDT and other pesticides. It will report its findings, probably before the end of August, White said. **TAXES**
Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has released his end-of-April state-

ment on state income and outgo, comparing income with the same eight months (September through April) of the previous state fiscal year. Report shows that inflation and retail sales are continuing to grow. In addition, the new fiscal year includes a 0.25 percent increase in the state general sales tax. But even without the increase, the gain from last year's \$22.9 million to this year's \$29.5 million would show an increase in sales

and retail prices. Car and truck sales are rising, since the tax take rose from \$54 to \$62 million. Net value of auto sales rose from \$2.1 billion to \$2.35 billion. **MASSIVE DISASTER**
Acting Gov. Ben Barnes immediately called up state agencies for emergency duty in Lubbock following the devastating tornado which struck there May 11. Clean-up and security details were coordinated by the State Defense Council.

An estimated 3,000 are homeless. Death toll is figured at 23 and injuries at 500. Property damage, highest in state history from a tornado, may reach \$200 million. President Nixon declared the battered and bruised South Plains City a disaster area. He also applied the same designation to Hockley, Hale, Briscoe, Donley, Swisher, Gray, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer Counties which were hit by storms April 17-18.

Football squad picks captains

Dimmitt High School's football squad elected Mark Wohlgenuth and Andrew Garza co-captains for next season at a squad meeting Tuesday. **WOHLGEMUTH** will be a senior quarterback next year, and Garza will be a senior center. A third co-captain will be elected before the first district game next season, Head Coach Brown L. Smith said. **WHEN NEWCOMERS** want to buy or rent a home, they look first at the classified ads!

A young Dimmitt father was arrested by city police Tuesday and charged with indecent exposure to a child, a felony. The 21-year-old man, father of two, was placed in Castro County jail under \$2,500 bond. **POLICE Chief W. W. Jones** said the man was arrested as the result of several incidents involving different children in recent weeks. If convicted, the man would face a maximum sentence of 15 years' imprisonment.

The youth received emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital, then was transferred to the intensive care unit of Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Maples said the accident occurred at approximately 11:15 p.m. Monday. Although there were no witnesses to the wreck, the patrolman said Hoelting's 1961 Chevrolet apparently rolled three times, coming to rest on its top. Hoelting was driving west toward Nazareth when the accident occurred, Maples said.

Officers attend narcotics school

VA hospitals aren't adequate

By Sen. Ralph Yarborough (D-Texas)
Let us examine the situation of veterans hospitalization. We have 27 million veterans in the country, more than \$1,350,000 of them in Texas.

THE FAILURE of the nation to provide adequate medical care for its veterans who need medical care is a national disgrace.

On April 2 of this year, the President announced that he was asking for an increase of \$50 million in the budget of the Veterans Administration for 1972. This additional money is to be spent for medical care for veterans. The President also said that he would seek an additional \$15 million for veterans medical care in this fiscal year.

The President is to be commended for this action, but it is little and it is late. It is just a first step and a very little first step in meeting the medical needs of our veterans.

EVERY week more than 500 more Americans are wounded in Vietnam. About 12½ percent of these wounded veterans of this war are permanently and totally disabled. The percentage of men who have been permanently and totally disabled in this war in Vietnam is three times the percentage we have suffered in any other war. And so many more veterans will require long periods of hospitalization and intensive medical treatment and care.

There is a serious shortage of adequate medical facilities for veterans in Texas. We have only nine veterans hospitals in Texas. These are in Amarillo, Big Spring, Bonham, Dallas, Houston, Kerrville, Marlin, Temple and Waco. In addition, there are veteran's out-patient clinics in Lubbock and San Antonio.

These hospitals were short — you might say short-changed — \$3.6 million in fiscal year 1970, which will end June 30 of this year, in just providing minimum care. These nine hospitals need 2,700 more staff personnel to give our veterans the first class medical care they are entitled to under the law.

TO MEET some of these needs, the Congress has approved funds to modernize and air condition the Veterans Hospital in Waco. It has been long overdue. People have appealed to me from the Veterans Hospital in Waco for years for this air conditioning and modernization. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I have fought to get that done.

I got the money appropriated this year. But the Administration has frozen these funds and is refusing to go ahead with this greatly needed construction at the Waco Veterans Hospital.

The Administration has also refused to spend the \$27 million which the Congress voted to construct the great, modern 760-bed South Texas Veterans Hospital in San Antonio. I have worked for the South Texas Veterans Hospital for 13 years. I got the money for it in the Appropriations Bill. Now the Administration has frozen that money and says we cannot build that veterans hospital.

As chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee which approves the Veterans Administration Budget, I shall be pushing for more money for veterans medical care. I will also be working to get the funds already appropriated and approved for veterans hospitals in Texas released and work started. We must not fail to meet our obligation to our nation's veterans.
