NATIONAL GUARDS AT THE STATE ENCAMPMENT

All the New Mexico Companies Met at Las Vegas, New Mexico, and United in Military Maneuvers

WAS FURNISHED PRIVATE CARS BY THE GOVERNMENT

Company M Received Highest Compliments from all the Officers That Were in Command

Pursuant to the orders issued out of the office of the Secretary of War and transmitted through Adjutant General Brooks of the New Mexico National Guards, Company M, first infantry, entrained at Portales on the morning of the 15th of July and proceeded to Las Vegas to the state encampment. Company M mustered forty-three officers and enlisted men, though two of them were later excused at Las Vegas and allowed to come home on account of serious illness in their families. Each company from Eastern New Mexico was furnished with a special Pullman car together with a section of the baggage car for their equipment. While the majority of the company are business men of the town of Portales and vicinity, and also while this encampment seriously conflicted with very important business matters of their own, yet every man, when he realized that the orders for the maneuvers at the state camp were imperative and from which there was no appeal, they, to a man reported at the armory in a cheerful and patriotic spirit, donned their uniforms, fell into line and marched to the train.

Arrived at the state camp ground, Company M at once attracted the attention of soldiers, officers and visitors, alike. As a matter of fact, Portales furnished the very flower of the state constabulary. They were as fine a body of men as ever assembled on any maneuvering ground and were highly compli-

mented by those in command. Furthermore, their conduct at the camp was above reproach in every particular; not a member of Company M saw the inside of the guard house or received a reprimand from any officer.

As marksmen, they further distinguished themselves, being successful in placing three of their men on the team which will represent New Mexico at the national meet at Camp Perry, Ohio. When it is remembered that this team is composed of only fifteen men and that there are ten companies in the state, all of them older and more experienced than ours, this performance appears almost miraculous. The three qualifying were J. A. Saylor, with fourth place; Joe Beasley, with sixth and Louis Kohl with seventh.

Many amusing incidents occurred during the encampment which tended more than any other one thing to demonstrate the quality of which company M is composed, however, each one promised faithfully never to divulge these jokes.

Taken as a whole, this was the most successful meet that has ever been held in the state and there was not a company present that had anything on the Portales bunch, either in ability, appearance or gentlemanly conduct.

The company arrived home Sunday at noon on the 27th, feeling fine and some remarked that it would have been delightful if they could only have remained at Camp McDonald all summer.

Destroyed By Fire

Last Thursday night the citizens of Elida were alarmed about ten o'clock by three shots fired by Henry Rankin, which in that place is the fire alarm, and found that the Elida News Office was burning to the ground. There being no fire fighting apparatus nothing could be done but to watch the flames in their devastating work. It was but a short time until the building and contents were ashes, and danger to adjoining buildings was over.

The News building was of solid concrete walls, built of Elida cement, and had it not been for the endurance of this material much more damage would most likely have resulted. As it was there was total loss of the News plant and the building except that the walls of the building are still standing, but damaged more or less—the exact damage to this we have not learned.

The plant was owned by Morris M. Bramlett, formerly of this place, who purchased it only about three months ago. The building was owned by J. E. Darnell. The plant and stock invoiced about \$2500 and was insured for \$1650. The building was insured for the sum of \$1900, and it cost in the neighborhood of two thousand dollars when erected a couple of years ago.

The Elida News is a paying proposition to its proprietor and Mr. Bramlett says he expects to continue its publication, and while arrangements are being made for another plant he expects to get the paper out either at Portales or Clovis.

Prof. J. S. Long, superintendent of the Portales High School for the ensuing year, arrived this week from Chicago, where he has been in attendance for the summer course at the Chicago University. Prof. Long comes to us very highly recommended, and with years of successful teaching to back that reputation up. From what the Herald can learn we feel that the Board of Education has chosen wisely. Mrs. Long and son will arrive from Lake Arthur, New Mexico, within the next few days.

Mac Duncan, formerly an employee of the Portales water and light plant, arrived this week from a six months stay in Texas. Mac says that things are pretty hard looking in the part of Texas where he has been located, and also in that part which he traversed in returning to Portales. He thinks that things around Portales are in very prosperous condition and that we have right to be thankful for our present outlook.

Jeff Hightower returned Saturday from Canyon City, Texas, being accompanied by his mother and brother. Mrs. Hightower has been quite sick and was brought here with the hopes that the change would prove beneficial to her. She was doing nicely at last report.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Puckett returned Monday afternoon from Amarillo, Texas, where Mr. Puckett had been detained in the hospital on account of an operation for appendicitis. He is doing nicely now and says he feels like a new man.

County Fair

The board of directors of the Roosevelt county fair association met Tuesday morning for the purpose of setting the time for holding the fair this fall and transacting other business. The fair will be held Thursday and Friday, October 2nd and 3rd. This will give ample time to get some of our best exhibits to the State Fair at Albuquerque, that opens October 6th. Please bear in mind the date and begin now to have in shape for exhibit anything you have in the agricultural, horticultural arts or livestock line that has especial merit.

The list of prizes to be awarded was deferred until a full board of directors could be present. It is the intention of the board to cover as large a field as their funds will permit, so watch these columns for the list.

There is no reason why we could have one of the best County Fairs in New Mexico and capture our usual lion's share of prizes at the State Fair.

City Manager Reports

The city fathers are this week having the manager of the light and water department compile a complete report of all water and light connections. This is a right kind of a step, and will enable the council to know exactly upon what basis they are operating. The financial end of the town government is always a difficult matter, and every one should lend all assistance possible. If as a result of this compilation, which is being done by a house to house canvass so that it will be perfectly accurate, you have to pay for one light extra, for which you have heretofore not been charged, don't cuss the council—let the other fellow do that.

Reagan Connally brought in some cantaloupes this week from the Connally farms. These are the first home grown of the season so far as known to the Herald. They were not very large ones but were delicious in flavor. The large ones will be ripe within the next few days when the shipping will begin.

R. A. Deen who has been suffering from hay fever was brought into town Saturday from his farm, near Delphos where he has been recuperating for the summer, for treatment. Mr. Deen's eyes have given him serious trouble, but he is not getting along nicely.

A number of Portales citizens have during the last few days taken occasion to drive out to the Dunlap pasture, just beyond the stock pens, for the purpose of inspecting the herd of buffalo which Buffalo Jones is pasturing there.

George Williamson and Jim Stone attended the Masonic banquet at Elida Saturday evening. They report a splendid time and are loud in their praise of the team work of Elida Lodge No. 81.

BUFFALO JONES WILL VISIT WILDS OF AFRICA

Offered Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars by Sells-Floto Circus for Live Adult Gorilla

MOST REMARKABLE CONTRACT EVER MADE IN THE WORLD

Conceded by Naturalists Generally That Animal Must be Roped and Tied—Only Practical Method

Buffalo Jones was a visitor in Portales this week and while here announced that within a short time he would leave for the wilds of Africa. His mission will be an endeavor to win the large sum of money that has recently been offered him for the capture of a live and mature gorilla. Of this the Denver Post in a recent issue, says:

The most remarkable contract that was ever made in the world was entered into today by "Buffalo" Jones and Messrs. Tammen and Bonfils of the Sells-Floto circus.

Buffalo Jones is the man who went to Africa in 1910 and captured alive by means of the lasso, all the big African animals, including giraffes, rhinoceroses, lions, zebras, etc. And he is going this fall to Africa to capture a full-grown adult gorilla for Messrs. Tammen and Bonfils for the Sells-Floto shows, they having agreed today to pay "Buffa-

lo" Jones the sum of \$250,000 in cash for the delivery to them in New York, in sound, first-class condition a full-grown adult gorilla.

There has never been a mature gorilla in captivity. They have been killed and upon one or two occasions a young gorilla has been captured, but soon died.

It is conceded by naturalists generally that the only way this most vicious of all animals can be captured is by the method employed by "Buffalo" Jones, by roping and tying the animal, caging it and then bringing it to civilization. This is the largest sum ever offered for any animal of any kind in the history of the world. At first an offer of \$100,000 was made, which "Buffalo" Jones immediately turned down and finally he agreed to undertake the task with the understanding that he will be paid \$250,000 if successful.

Installed as Grand Master

It is announced by the Roswell Daily Record that C. C. Hill, County School Superintendent of Chaves County, was installed as Grand Master of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for the State of New Mexico at a special session of the Grand Lodge held at Roswell on July 24th. Brother Hill, who has heretofore been Deputy Grand Master, succeeds Grand Master Sherwood whose position was made vacant by reason of his having removed from the State.

Brother Hill is a man who is well known throughout the State, and his earnest and zealous work in behalf of the Order merits him the exalted position to which he has been elevated.

Ordinance No. 48

An ordinance providing for the levying of a tax upon the taxable property of the town of Portales, New Mexico, for the year of 1913, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. That a tax of twenty-five mills on the dollar upon the assessed value of all taxable property within the limits of the town Portales, New Mexico, be and the same is hereby levied for the year of 1913, which said tax shall be for the following purposes, to wit:

Twenty mills of said tax is levied for the purpose of paying interest on outstanding bonds of said town issued for the construction of sewers, waterworks and the improvement of streets; and five mills of said tax is levied for the purpose of defraying the general expense of said town in the administration of its government.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, and due publication. Passed and approved this the 22nd day of July, 1913.

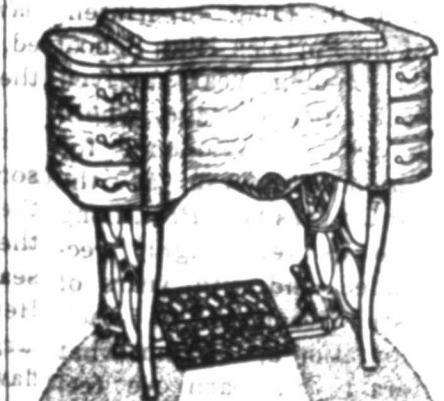
