

An ordinance providing for the levying of a tax upon the taxable property of the town of Portales, New Mexico, for the year of 1913, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the town of Portales, New Maxico:

Section 1. That a tax of twenty-five mills on the dollar upon the assessed value of all taxable property within the limits of the town Portales, New Mexico, be and the same is hereby levied for the year of 1913. which said tax shall be for the following purposes, to wit:




