

#### Little Stories Made Larger

(T. J. Mabery in Clovis Journal-Santa Fe, the capital of New Mexico, it is said by everybody living in Santa Fe, and a few outside of the city limits, is the oldest permanent stopping place of the white man in the United States. The considerable number of folks in this country not included in the above group admit, if ressed closely for a commital, that they have learned from history and story writers that it is at least the second oldest, St. Augustine, Fla., having to justify herself for first place. Anyway, Santa Fe is a very old city, with many interesting items for the tourists' note book and camera, besides curio shops, heartless inn keepsrs, politicians and ex-gover-Once upon a time the writer counted one governor and six "exes" grouped within the area of a city block and he didn't have to turn and describe more than a half circle to accomplish the feat either. Not all of the ex-governors whom we saw that day live in Santa Fe permanently, but most of them did. The first newspaper published at Santa Fe was in 1834 on a press brought from Mexico City. The paper was named La Verdad, and perhaps was the best paper published here until Bronson Cutting and Theodore Roosevelt started in 1912 the Progressive Santa Fe New Mexican which was to help Democrats to office in New Mexico and extinguish stand-pat Republicans, grafters in high places as well as the bunny-hug and other immoral rags practiced in Santa Fe's high society, and expostulate upon the virtues of large families and the many causes of the high cost of this present day living.

Santa Fe also has a Catholic schools and hospitals all of which are worthy institutions and ported by the funds of the state because the constitution says it's the right thing to do.

Santa Fe has one railroad coming within eighteen miles. This is the much advertised A. T. & S. F. which runs from Chicago to Los Angles via Kansas City and Lamy, and it is the source of much profit for its stock holders and the Indian souvenir venders and the eighteen miles of short line narrow gauge which connects the capital city with the rest of the world Santa Fe also is in direct touch with Denver by via of the wireless and the "Chili Line." The "Chili Line" is the narrow gage steampassinger and freight carrier which hauls pass-engers for accommodation and 5 cents

Then the New Mexico Central is the name of the misfit that Delegate Bull Andrews of congressional fame imposed upon the Ancient City and the Estancia Valley, and which it is predicted will some day be a real live and commercialized institution. It costs only seven and one half cents per mile to ride on this road now, if you are traveling with light baggage.


