



Every farmer owning. or buying, a farm of eighty acres owns the pump and motor upon it. No land is offered for sale without pump or motor. Every person who lives in town, or with in eighteen miles of town, may have on his place electricity for heat, light, and power. He may run his laundry, sewing machine, cream separator, or any other machine on the place, even curl milady's hair, with it. Indeed, this company offers settlers all the conveniences of the city,electric light, kitchen heat, and telephone, even telegraph by long distance; all by the central power station. All pump equipment is in dupliacte, and a farmer only has to telephone for repairs to be made to hore The headwaters of the Brazos river, which flows southeasterly across Texas into the Gulf of Mexico, lie buried in this Valley.
