Doctor Roberts Gives Great Address-Response By Supt. White

Dr. Roberts, president of the State Normal at Las Vegas said in part: "I have been coming to Portales for the past four years and this is the first time I have had the pleasure of speaking to the school. This affords me great pleasure. I will give you a motto. A motto you know is something for us to square our lives by. I have a motto. ## REV. STROUD MAKES GOOD MONEY

Roosevelt County a Great Poultry country for The Farmer

Rev. G. W. Stroud, who has lived in the Arch community for some time, was a pleasant caller at the Herald-Times office Thursday. Rev. Stroud has a choice 50 acre tract of land on which he grows vegetables, fruits, chickens etc, when not preaching.

Rev. Stroud says that from an investment of about \$17 in chickens he realized \$100 to say nothing of the chickens and eggs consumed at home. Feed fed to his chickens netted him about \$1.60 per hundred pounds when he could have gotten but 75 cents for it on the market.

Said Rev. Stroud, "I have never been troubled with disease or any kind of insects among my chickens out here. I think poultry is the best paying proposition going for the money invested."

## WHAT A FARMER CAN DO

Add Hobbs Makes Good In The Portales Valley On a Farm

## COME HERE WITH ONLY FOUR-BITS

Mr. Hobbs Came Here Broke But Has Forged to The Front

The Development Department is in receipt of some interesting facts as instance of farm success from Add Hobbs, who has home-stead near Cromer.

G. A. Hobbs had made his filing, when he was forced to earn some money during the six months prior to making occupancy and he found himself a 'busted' institution in Oklahoma where he had returned to find employment.

Besides broke, Add was sick, and upon the advice of an old friend who offered to stake him to the price of car fare back to his claim, Hobbs took the advice but didn't require the proffered cash. Arriving at his claim he had "four bits" left, plus ambition and determination. Add secured the loan of a team of mules from his neighbor, J. L. Swafford.

breaking land for various farmers in his neighborhood, dividing the proceeds with Swafford. Hobbs had spent a number of years as a cowboy; so during his leave of absence from his claim he would get employment on the Slaughter and Yellow House ranches located in Texas near the New Mexico line and about 65 miles distant, this being convenient to go to and from his claim.

In December 1909, Mr. Hobbs married Miss Lee Swafford, daughter of his neighbor J. L. Swafford. Having put energy and good management into the work, Add Hobbs is now cultivating about a hundred acres, using the remainder for pasture. The crops consist of Indian corn, milo maize broom corn and sorghum. A number of head of cows and horses besides hogs and chickens raising more than enough feed, selling the surplus has put him on the road to independence and is an example of what a man who will try, can accomplish with only "four-bits" in capital. In four years he has first and last of all a good wife and fine boy, one-half section of good land that he is stocking and improving. There are thousands more acres in Portales Valley waiting the occupancy of men like G. A. Hobbs, of Cromer.

This normal will begin July 13, this paper for announcements of the instructors and other matters pertaining to this school.

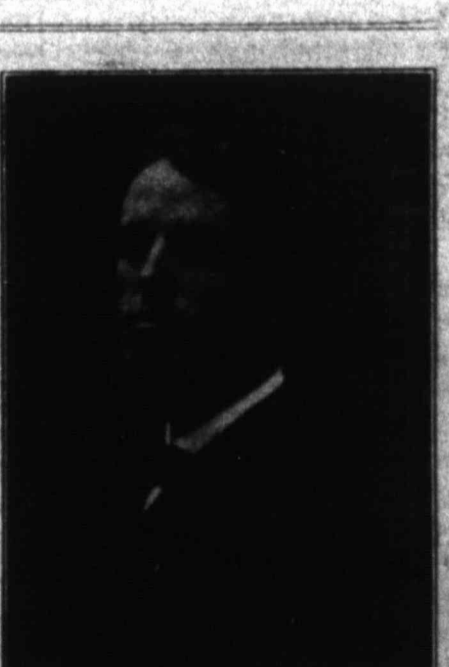

Easter

Easter is a church festival commemorating Christ's resurrection. It is of purely human origin, yet it celebrates a fact an obstinate fact, one that has encountered the hostility of suspicion, derision and denial. A fact that has brought more real good cheer into the world than any other one fact. Every recurring Lord's day asserts the resurrection of Jesus Christ and Easter emphasizes in a special way this best proved fact of history, and the most momentous also, save its two co-ordinate, the incarnation and the crucifixion.

The key of the observance of this day of religious jubilation is set in the exultant strain of Paul "Now is Christ Risen." We need not worry our minds over the historic vindication of this day, nor see through timorous eyes an ever-renewing ecstasiasism in the tendency to make it a feast of universal gladness. It is not necessary that we should know the season which it grew, the want from which it was plucked to enjoy the fragrance and beauty of the flower that a friend has placed in our hands.

Three voices speak and should sound their harmony on Easter Sunday: hope, faith and love. The hope of immortality should stir us with its onward property. To that level and that vision of the soul there is but one answer: Faith. It is the bridge of the divine answer.

Faith adds its song of trust to the yearning of hope. Faith if imperceptible will take immortality for granted. Let one raise its voice on Easter Sunday day. It has laid up its treasures in the past. Our thoughts of immortality take a deeper tinge when we think of those who have blessed our lives then gone up higher. Life here and hereafter is worth more because of them. We cannot be satisfied with an immortality of solitude. We long for the companionship of those who have blessed us in the flesh. We trust also that the souls who have blessed us in this life, may bless us in the ages to come, that the orbit of our love in another life may be even greater than it is here.

Last week we called attention to the result getting advertising campaign of the Silver City Chamber of Commerce, a campaign which cost but a few hundred dollars and which so crowded the Grant county town with people of a desirable character that it had to be stopped until the town could catch up with house room. Today we wish to bring to the attention of those who doubt the wisdom of advertising Albuquerque, the case of Las Cruces. The Elephant Butte Water Users' association, which means the business community of Las Cruces recently employed a high class publicity expert, a man trained in one of the great advertising agencies of the country; supplied him with money and told him to go to work.

He has done so. The result is astonishing. "But where is Albuquerque to get such a man?" you ask. Give the Commercial club's advertising committee the money it is asking for, and we will get

such a man. The woods are full of them. They cost money. So does anything else in the city building line that gets results.

Las Cruces this month has the half of a magazine of 30,000 circulation. There are stories about Las Cruces in newspapers all over the United States. Near by newspapers are kept "filled up" with Las Cruces "dope." From a recognized "dead one" it has jumped to first place among recognized live ones. — Albuquerque Herald.

The resurrection of Christ is the great central truth of the Christian religion, the joy of the church, the comfort of the sorrowful and the hope of the dying. By our Lord the tomb has been forever sanctified, the valley of the shadow of death becomes the valley of the opening of life. Death, instead of being the jailor of hell and the grave, becomes the porter of paradise. In completing the 1000-car quota, these 250 men handle a total of 500 tons of materials. This quantity is made up of 4000 tires, 1000 gallons of gasoline, 1000 pints of oil, 5000 pounds of grease, 3000 gallons of water in cars radiators, 2000 springs, 5000 lamps, 48,000 wheel spokes and no less than 200,000 cotter pins.

It takes the combined outputs of the five next largest motor car manufacturers in this country to equal Ford sales.

There are three Ford factories. The parent factory, which is the largest is located at Highland park, Michigan, the other two are located at Ford, Ontario, and Manchester, England.

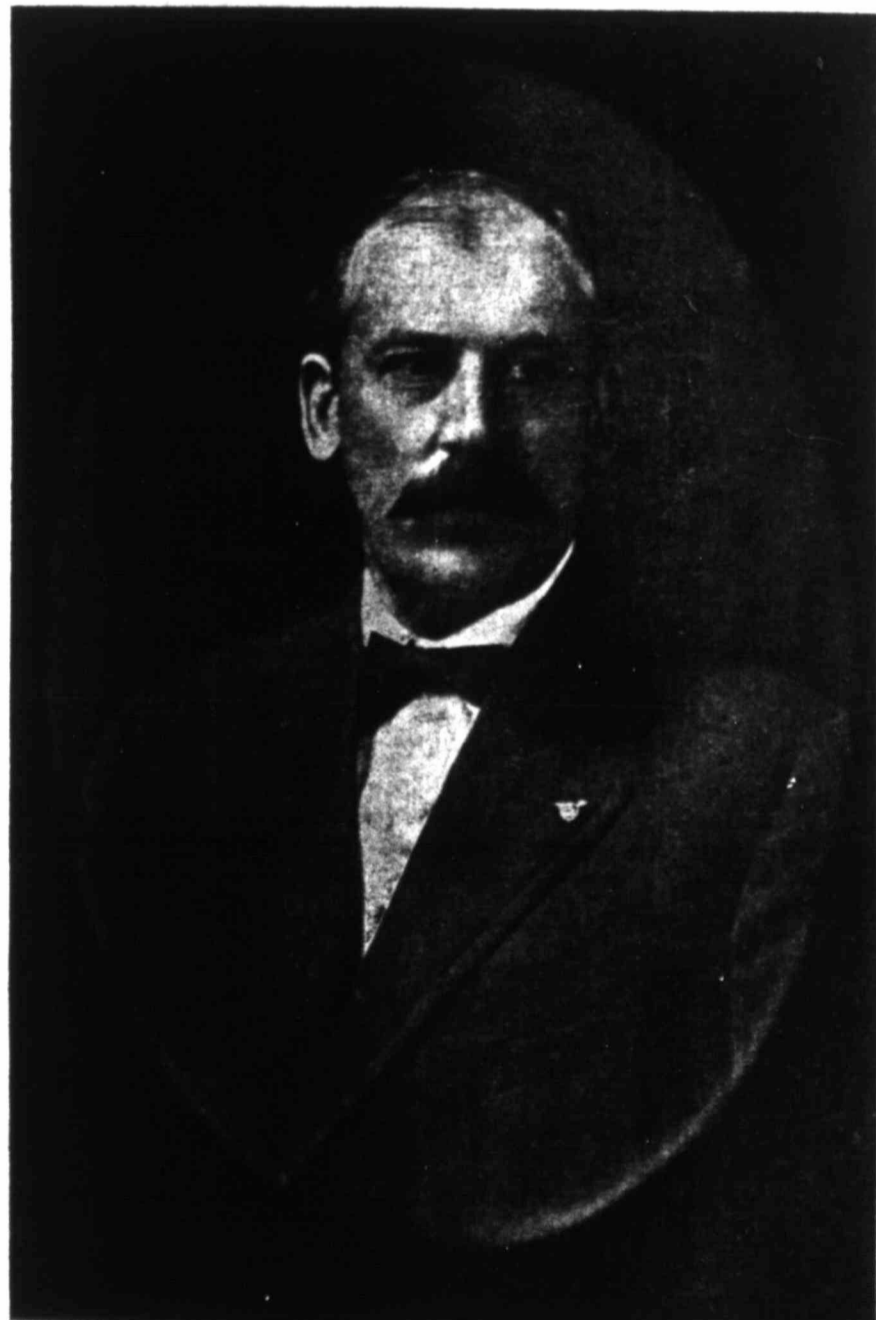

**Two Unusual Happenings**

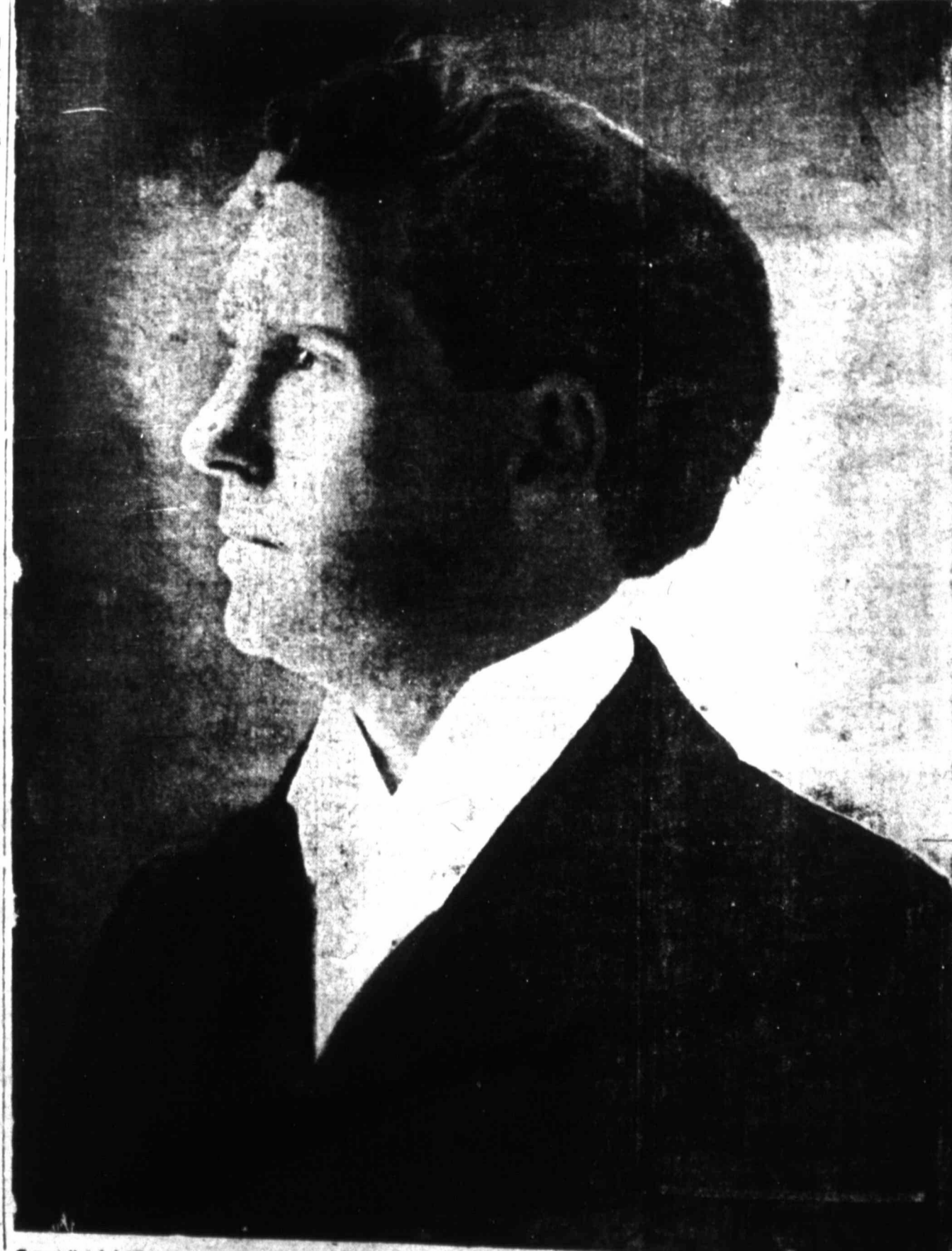
