It was decided by the board to enforce the law rigidly concernng the payment of road taxes. At the request of the board, Judge G. L. Reese rendered an opinion showing that under the law all able bodied men between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years must pay a road tax of \$3 per year or labor in lieu thereof, and that there is no way to avoid the payment or working out of these taxes. This law applies to cities, towns and villages as well
