MEAT CREAM BUSINESS

Over Thousand Dollars For Cream In Month of June is Great

HELP TO DRYLAND FARMERS

Roosevelt County Farmers Are Getting in Good Shape Financially

Cream! Cream!! Cream!!! The cream in Roosevelt county flowed about as abundantly as the rain last month. Both were in abundance, and both are tremendous values to the county. We get the following data from Carl Moss, the general representative of the Wichita Creamery Co.

As usual we have to give Elida, the Cream City, the blue ribbon in this cream game. Not only does Elida lead any town in the county in amount of cream shipped, but it leads the entire county by 145 cans. Elida shipped last month 1082 cans. The cans averaged \$5.28 each, which means that virtually \$185 per day was turned loose there for cream or \$5450 during the month.

Portales comes next with 447 cans. Which was nearly \$180 per day, or \$2,235 for the month.

Elida shipped 190 cans; Tular 100 cans; and Talaba 50. This makes a grand total of 1819 cans of cream shipped from Roosevelt county during the month of June at an average of \$5.28 per can which would be \$9,604 paid to the farmers of this county for cream in one month. What better proposition for the farmers of this county?

It has been said that the cream business is the salvation of the unirrigable sections of Roosevelt county. Doubtless this is, in a measure, true. It has enabled many a settler to stay by his claim, accumulated a little bunch of stock, make some substantial improvements around the "home place," and, as cash is paid for this cream, it has enabled the settler to adopt, very largely, the "pay as you go" plan, which is better for both farmer and merchant.

Not only has the cream business been the salvation of the unirrigable portion, but it has been a blessing to the irrigated, and in fact, every section of Roosevelt county. It would be hard to find a greater dairy country than this. The range is fine, cattle practically free from disease, and the climate almost ideal. Mr. Moss states that the cream from this section brings better prices than the cream around Wichita, Kansas, owing to the climatic conditions here which enables us to keep the cream in such excellent condition.

The figures given above do not include the "by-products." The monetary value of the skimmed milk when fed to calves, hogs and chickens can not be tabulated. Some claim that this is virtually worth as much as the cream itself.

Civic Attractiveness

There is a movement on foot by some of our citizens, who want to see the town attractive as well as beautiful, to cut the weeds. Now is the time before they go to seed. The city favors the move and it is anticipated Mayor E. B. Hawkins when he returns from Kansas will set a day to begin the work.

Fourth of July Celebration

There was a big crowd out to the picnic at the H bar ranch and everybody seemed to have a good time. There were many strange faces in the crowd; people coming from outside the county. This is an ideal place for a picnic; plenty of shade and water and grounds for holding the different contents. Jupiter Pluvius was not in harmony with the celebration and about two o'clock a good shower fell. This did not seem to bother the picnickers and as soon as it was over the contests were started.

One of the features of the day was the calf branding contest in which 21 were entered. First and second prizes were both captured by young men; the veterans were slow and seemed afraid to take the risks on the slippery ground.

Joe Lang Jr. contesting for the Herald-Times won first prize, time 47 seconds, purse \$25; Sam Byars second, time 50 seconds, purse \$10; John Tyson third, time 57 seconds, purse \$5. Several of the contestants failed to catch their calves but they were afterwards caught and branded.

In the free for all pony race Wylie Jones won first, and the purse was \$5. Clarence Keen was second. On account of wet grounds many of the amusements had to be omitted, including the ball game.

The necessary money to defray the expenses of this picnic was contributed by the business men of Portales. The committee on amusements inform us that there is considerable surplus and that it will be spent dragging the streets and putting them in better shape. This is a very good purpose. The members of this committee are R. K. Pucket, Jeff Hightower, C. S. Hart, John Tyson and Geo. Deen.

MADE A SUCCESS FARMING

T. H. Longs Has Made Good As a Farmer-Merchant at Longs

HAS BUILT NICE COUNTRY HOME

Shade trees and other Shrubbery Add Value and comfort to home

T. H. Long and son R. F. Long have certainly fully refuted any impression that a man can't build an attractive home place in the unirrigated section of Roosevelt county and make good financially at the same time.

Seven years ago these gentlemen opened a store about 25 miles a little east of south of Portales and named it "Longs." They have a neat little store and postoffice, and it appears they are doing well in the mercantile line. They buy the cream of that section and are paying about \$180 per week to the farmers of the community for it.

We stopped at Longs for a short time one day this week, and "the old gentleman" kindly showed us over his place. It's a dandy. There is an acre or two in locust trees, making all but a dense shade. This is fenced with hog wire and the fine ewes have a "hog killing time" in that grove the hottest days that come.

At this time there are eight fine porkers, two sows and six as fine pigs as you ever saw, also a couple of shoats. That's not a bad prospect for ham and ham gravy. But the Longs' are fixed already on this line. We were allowed to peep into a real old fashion smoke house that has home cured ham, bacon and shoulders hanging all about. Mr. Longs has not only raised enough meat to do him each year since coming to Roosevelt county, but he has sold some every year. These hogs are costing him practically nothing now as he is keeping them growing on skimmed milk and waste matter from the house. "I would have to pour this skimmed milk out if it were not for these hogs."

Mr. Long has a bunch of exceptionally fine calves. The Longs are milking fourteen cows, and while they separate the cream from the milk, it is evident they do not separate the calves, altogether, from the milk. They have some good barns and sheds and plenty of good grain in the way of maize for the stock. Mr. Long claims to raise feed every year and is of the impression that others can do as well if they try right.

The orchard of apples, peaches, plums, pears and grapes, with a bunch of shade trees are flourishing in yard around this beautiful home. The trees are all thrifty and make a beautiful yard and furnish a delightful shade during the summer months. All these trees and crops are grown without irrigation and show conclusively that a man can have a delightful home with and shade trees, and shrubbery in the unirrigable section of Roosevelt county if he will make the effort.

The fruit was cut short at Long this year owing to the frost, yet there are a few peaches, quite a lot of apples and a goodly amount of grapes. And we understand the Longs are eating canned peaches put up last year. All this grows on the trees in the. The crop, for the most part, on the Longs farm shows up fine, evidencing that it has been well cultivated. Mr. Longs tried to get us to bring a lot of fresh beans and beets along with us, grown in his garden, but as we happened to be "batching" just at this time, we declined.

The Tax Question

Owing to the fact there is considerable discussion regarding taxes a little information along that might be of interest to tax payers and others. Our taxes are higher than in Texas which is reasonable. A state is like a corporation, the larger it is the more cheaply it can be run in proportion and again we have no such an income from school land as has the great state of Texas. The taxes for 1912 on a 14 section of dry land without improvements were \$11.40 and on the same land for 1913 were \$8.26 a considerable decrease. The state rate for 1913 was 12 6-10 mills and for 1914 is limited to 10 mills by the constitution so if we do not get a raise in valuation by the state board taxes will be less this year. Under the law in New Mexico all heads of families residing in the same county as their property is situated are entitled to \$200 from the full amount, which is in favor of the light tax payers and the taxes assessed on 1-3 valuation.

Now suppose that the taxes for 1913 had been assessed on the full amount including exemption the levy would have compared favorably with other states

Reply to Open Letter

Mr. Lane: I take pleasure in answering your letter, because I am not afraid for anyone to know how I stand.

First: I will say that certainly the bill that Governor McDonald favored for salaries is high enough. I would not support a higher one, and in many instances, I think that was too high. You and everybody else know that the amount the people will have to pay in taxes depends largely upon the salaries fixed for the officers. If these salaries are twice as high as they should be, we have to pay two dollars in taxes in that respect where we should pay but one.

I am in favor of revising the taxing system, both as to method and as to rate. All property should be taxed equally and uniformly, and the expenses of the state and county governments should be cut down so that the rate can be reduced. The tax books should be arranged so that anybody can find by looking them over what his taxes are and how they happen to be that much. Now you have to get the collector or an expert to tell you.

year enough salary for the clerk and treasurer of any county when you take into consideration that the necessary deputies are paid by the counties and it does not come out of the officer. The sheriff might be paid a little more than this because frequently he has to arrest bad men and his risk is greater than that of the others; though the amount [\$2250] as fixed by the governor's bill, is ample. \$1500. I think would be fair for the assessor, as he doesn't have to leave his office \$100. per month is enough for the county school superintendent. Under present conditions \$400 each for county commissioners and probate judge is enough. District judges should be reduced from \$4500 to \$3000. The average monthly balance of Roosevelt county funds kept in the banks for the year 1913 was \$39,842.50. If interest had been paid on this fund by the banks as I have been fighting for during the past three years, you can see that it would have helped us wonderfully in reducing the rate of taxes.
