EVANS BROTHERS' RANCH

Will Build Large Silo and Fill it For Future Use on Their Ranch

SELLS CREAM AND RAISES HOGS

Roosevelt County has the Best Feed For Cattle Raising Possibilities

Evans brothers, located about 22 miles southwest of Portales, are more of our dry landers who have taken to the stock farming proposition and are making good.

Beginning with five cows three years ago and later purchasing twenty more, the herd now numbers seventy-five. They sell the young steers and replace them with heifers.

Seventeen cows are being milked and money is derived from the selling of cream to pay expenses. Good calves are raised by feeding them the whole milk and the skimmed milk fed to hogs.

They have eighty acres of crop which is looking fine and will probably yield enough for two years use on the farm. It is the intention to build a seventy-five ton silo this fall. These men own three sections of land and have control of several more.

They raise enough corn for the stock and plenty to make meal for home use, also cane from which a bountiful supply of syrup is made. Six each row 75 feet in length yielded a wagon load full of Irish potatoes. The poultry proposition is not being overlooked for we found 100 fine White Leghorn chickens.

State of New Mexico

County of Roosevelt (ss) C. P. "There is more dirt in a certain ring in the democratic region of Portales Roosevelt county official graft farm than would stalk a convict farm with short horns galore, but keep still do not let the people know." "The Portales ring is the outcome of that system, the general cussedness and filthy outcome of continued party power and natural dishonest rank and file of the ring, they are to lazy to get out and combat in the ranks of the yeomen for an honest living but rather swipe the other fellows hard earnings under cover, with the better prospects of dodging the pen."

Further affiant sayeth not.

Carl A. Johnson Announces

Carl Johnson came to Roosevelt county, New Mexico, three years ago, and bought a farm seven miles northwest of Portales, where he and his brother, Dr. C. E. Johnson of Gainesville, Texas, have been actively engaged in farming and stock raising during that time.

Mr. Johnson fled on a homestead in Quay county, New Mexico, eight years ago, where he resided for five years.

His eight years residence upon a farm in this state has acquainted him with all the conditions of the farmers and their needs in the way of legislation. He was born and raised in Cook county, Texas, and educated in the public and high schools of Gainesville.

He has made a splendid success with his farming interests in Roosevelt county. He moved upon this place three years ago, which was then raw and unimproved, and he now has 120 acres in a high state of cultivation, and his farm is one of the "Show Places" of the county.

Mr. Johnson is thirty-one years of age and has an estimable wife and four children who live with him upon his farm.

He was born, and has been raised a Democrat, and his father who lives with him is an ex-confederate soldier who served four years under General Price in the Confederate army.

He has a high standing as a citizen and a Democrat and no one has ever questioned his party loyalty.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY PEACHES

W. A. Swearingen Has One of the Best Peach Orchards in County

THINKS THIS GOOD PEACH COUNTRY

Expect to Give His Orchard More Attention Than Farming

A visit to the farm of W. A. Swearingen who lives about 25 miles southwest of Portales demonstrates the possibilities of fruit raising in this county. It shows that it is possible for our stock farmers to have an orchard and raise fruit for home use as well as to sell.

Mr. Swearingen was raised in Ohio a fruit country and understands the business, but of course finds the methods different here from those of his native state. His experience here is that an orchard should be properly cultivated, plowed shallow and no weeds allowed to grow.

On this farm the Herald man saw peaches as large as a tea cup measuring from seven to nine inches in diameter, some of which we have on exhibition at this office. One limb a foot long and its twigs held twenty-two peaches. This orchard which is of the Elberta Triumph Carmen variety has been bearing for four years and each year has yielded a good crop.

Three acres have been planted in cherries and plums this year and some of the trees have made a growth of two and one half feet without water except what nature has supplied. Next year an addition of seven or eight acres will be made.

We also found a small patch of good sized blackberries the flavor of which cannot be beaten no matter where they are grown.

This man is one of the farmers who sees the possibilities of stock raising in connection with his farming and fruit growing and is going to buy a small herd.

PROSPERITY AT JUDSON

Farmers Are Turning Their Attention to Dairying and Stock Farming

CHAS. H. RADCLIFF MAKES GOOD

Raises Feed on His Farm and Feeds it to His Dairy Cattle

Charles Radcliff, postmaster and merchant at Judson in the southwestern part of this county is another of our successful stock farmers. He has found out from experience that more money can be made, and made more easily by feeding the crop to cattle and hogs than by selling it.

Starting two years ago with fifteen head of cattle he has now increased his herd to sixty-five. Sixteen of these are milked and eight dollars worth of cream per week is sold. This may seem small but the calves are fed whole milk and the separated milk fed to a fine bunch of thoroughbred Poland China hogs.

Mr. Radcliff has farmed in this county for nine years, has sold perhaps as much grain as any man in the country, and this year has the best crop ever, but even this does not prevent him from turning his attention to stock and hogs and consuming it on the farm.

The eighty acres he has planted in corn, maize and feterita looks good enough to be on a Mississippi river bottom. Not a weed is allowed to go to seed, consequently they are not much trouble.

He does not believe in cutting roughness and putting it up when grain is plenty and we have such a growth of grass as we have this year. However, he is watching the silo proposition and giving it careful consideration.

The little things that help on a stock farm have not been overlooked for a garden of one acre is being cultivated, which may be irrigated from the windmill, and in the poultry yard is a bunch of 100 fine Plymouth Rock chickens.

Leased Grazing Land

K. K. Runnels, of Texico, this week leased for a period of ten years about 2500 acres of government land in the north eastern part of this county for grazing purposes. This is a fine ranch proposition and will be stocked with cattle. Fred Meuller of the land office at Santa Fe leased the land to the highest bidder.

Answers Open Letter of Jas. A. Hall

July, 27th, 1914.
Mr. Jas. A. Hall,
Portales, N. M.

Dear Sir:—
Replying to your letter, which was published in the Portales Valley News, and being read on the streets of Portales, before I received the copy you mailed me, will say, that it would not appear that it was necessary for you to be "pulled" into this race; but that you went into it voluntarily, as is evidenced by the fact that as soon as it was known that Mr. L. W. Carleton had withdrawn from the race against me, you in company with your friend, H. B. Ryther, who is an owner and the party who does the writing for the "Portales Valley News", though it purports to be edited and published by one, J. E. Henderson, and he being the same H. B. Ryther who was one of the main parties, putting this \$412.23 tax list printing deal over on Roosevelt county, got in to an automobile and went out to try to get another party in the race against me.

I assume that you admit that the county commissioners paid \$412.23 for the printing of this tax list and that it was illegal.

I assume that you admit that all this money, except about \$1200 was paid while C. V. Harris, Dr. Montgomery and "Uncle" Cal Price, were commissioners and that the other \$1200.00 was not paid until after D. K. Smith and Ed Johnson had gone on the board in the place of Dr. Montgomery and "Uncle" Cal Price, C. V. Harris, still remaining Chairman of the board.

I assume that you admit that after I had stirred this matter up and was telling the people about it that the grand jury indicted Ryther and Darnell at the March term of court, 1912. Ryther being tried and the case against Darnell being dismissed.

I assume that you admit that you were Assistant District Attorney and residing in Roosevelt county, during all the time and remained such until you were let out by Mr. Scott about Jan. 1st, this year.

I assume that you admit that the act of the county commissioners in this matter was illegal and that you never at any time took any legal steps against them, and I further assume that you admit that you took no legal steps to recover any of this money for Roosevelt county, prior to the filing of the suit by Mr. Scott in July, 1912, although it was paid out long prior to the March term of the court 1912, by the county commissioners and when you were the legal adviser of the county commissioners, by virtue of your office.

Such a long time passed after this matter had been fully known and no action taken to recover this money, until I, with other citizens, concluded that the people had to act in the matter, and I got up a subscription, including my own, to the amount of two hundred dollars, and retained Judge Dye of Roswell to bring all necessary suits, he saying the suit could be easily sustained.

On Judge Dye's return to Roswell, he conferred with Mr. Scott about getting his consent to

PLATFORM OF CARL JOHNSON

To the Democratic Voters of Roosevelt county.
In announcing my candidacy for representative in the legislature for Roosevelt County, I desire to state, briefly, my position upon matters of public interest and concern:

bring the suit, and I am informed that Mr. Scott told Mr. Dye that he had been too busy to bring the suit; but that he intended to and didn't want others to interfere with him. This was somewhere about the first of June, 1912.

I understood that Mr. Scott immediately telegraphed you, Mr. Hall, as the Assistant District Attorney to come to Portales at once and see about bringing this action and advise me that the District Attorney's office would attend to it. I did not get to see you; but ask that you be as frank with me as I am with you and publish this telegram, I mention.

I saw Mr. Scott in Roswell soon after this and he told me that his office would properly attend to the matter, and upon this assurance, I stood aside to see it done.

I understood Mr. Scott did file the suit on July, 6th, 1912, to recover the whole amount of this money, \$4128.23.

I later saw Mr. Scott in Portales and he ask me what I thought of your agreement as Assistant District Attorney to compromise the case, saying that you had agreed to do so for some seven hundred dollars. I replied that I was looking to him for a proper settlement and not you.

He said, "Of course I won't stand for it and I have told Jim I wouldn't". I understood later that the matter was compromised by the county commissioners agreeing to take a thousand dollars in full settlement of the matter, and take it out in printing, and doubt if Mr. Scott would have done this, except upon the advice of the commission-

Joint Resolution No. 12

Joint resolution providing for the amendment of article VIII of the constitution of the state of New Mexico entitled "taxation and revenue" S. Sub. B. J. R. No. 12; Filed March, 15 1913.

RE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, That article VIII of the constitution of the state of New Mexico, entitled "taxation and revenue," be and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE VIII TAXATION AND REVENUE. Section 1. Taxes levied upon tangible property shall be in proportion to the value thereof, and taxes shall be equal and uniform upon subjects of taxation of the same class. Sec 2. Taxes levied upon real or personal property for state revenue shall not exceed four mills annually on each dollar of the assessed valuation thereof except for the support of the educational, penal and charitable institutions of the state, payment of the state debt and interest thereon; and the total annual tax levy upon such property for all state purposes exclusive of necessary levies for the state debt shall not exceed ten mills. Sec 3. The property of the United States, the state and all counties, towns, cities and school districts, and other municipal corporations, public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, all church property, all property used for educational or charitable purposes all cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, and all bonds of the state of New Mexico, and of counties, municipalities and districts thereof shall be exempt from taxation. Sec 4. Any public officer making any profit out of public monies or using the same for any purpose not authorized by law, shall be deemed guilty of a felony and shall be punished as provided by law, and shall be disqualified to hold public office. All public monies not invested in interest bearing securities shall be deposited in national banks in this state or in banks of trust companies incorporated under the laws of the state, and the interests derived therefrom shall be applied in the manner prescribed by law. Sec 5. The Legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of a family to the amount of two hundred dollars. Sec 6. Lands held in large tracts shall not be assessed for taxation at any lower value per acre than [than] lands of the same character or quality and similarly situated, held in smaller tracts. The plowing of lands shall not be considered as adding value thereunto for the purposes of taxation. Sec 7. No execution shall issue upon any judgment rendered against the board of county commissioners of any county, or against any incorporated city, town or village, school district, or board of education; or against any officer of any county or against any incorporated city, town or village, school district or board of education, upon any judgment covered against him in his official capacity and for which the county, incorporated city, town or village, school district or board of education, is liable, but the same shall be paid out of the proceeds of a tax levied on other liabilities, of counties, incorporated cities, towns or villages, school districts or boards of education, and when so collected shall be paid by the county treasurer to the judgment creditor.

Dear Sir:

Are you surprised that a life long democrat, one who has always supported the nominees of his party, should see his endeavors to see that a democrat should run in the primaries? Are you surprised that the democratic voters of this country are averse to the candidacy of one who will run for an office, and then when defeated in the primaries plays the part of a traitor by supporting the socialist nominee instead of his successful democratic opponent? 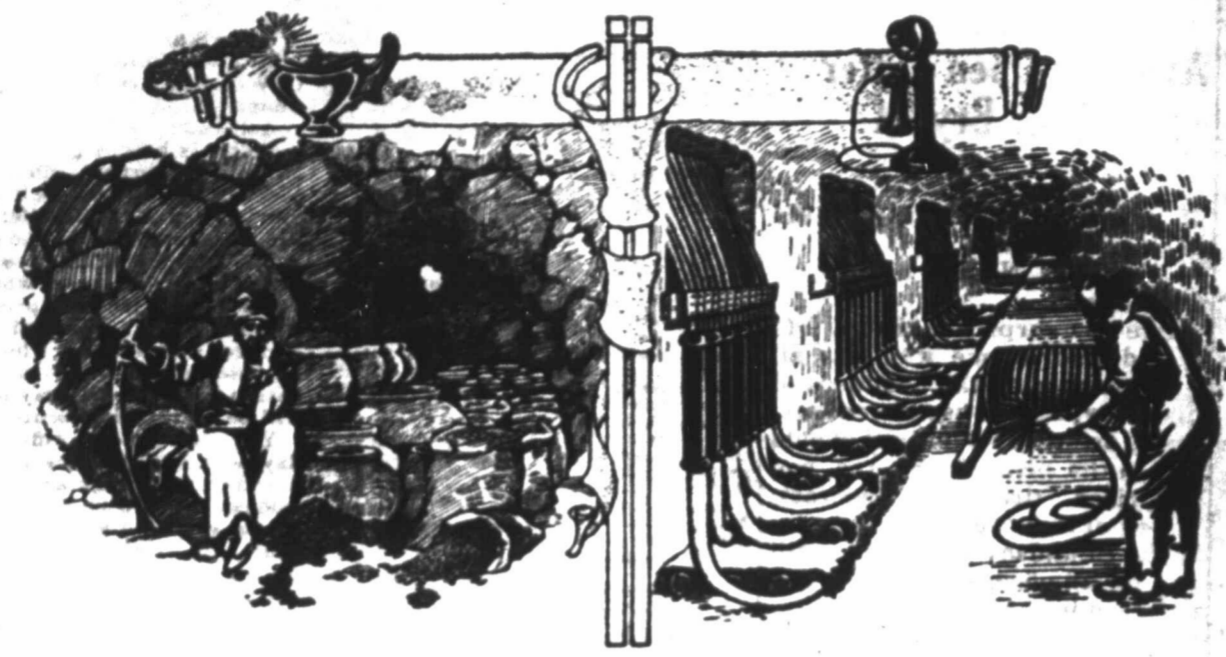

Halls Reply to Bryant

Darnell was indicted for the same offense, and therefore after the jury had acquitted Mr. Ryther the Darnell indictment was dismissed, thereby saving to the county the expense of a fruitless trial. So far as I know you had nothing whatever to do with these cases, and the records do not show that you ever appeared as a witness in behalf of the state. I should like you to offer some proof of your activities, if you have any.

Doubtless you are aware of the fact that the district attorney's office arranged to have a settlement of this over payment at the April meeting of the commissioners, but because of the heavy criminal docket in Eddy county it was impossible for any representative of the district attorney's office to be in Portales at that time, and consequently it was then arranged to have the adjustment at the next meeting which was in July, 1912. Doubtless having learned of this arrangement you arranged your grand stand play in order to further your political ambitions. You should also be aware of the fact, if you are as thoroughly conversant with the facts as you claim to be, that computation of the overcharge was made on July 24 while the county commissioners were in public session, and that on the following day I transmitted to Mr. Scott, the district attorney, a complete report, together with prepared complaints to be filed in a suit against Darnell and Ryther, then doing business as the Herald Printing company, and requested Mr. Scott to file the suit promptly. You state in your letter that this suit was filed on the sixth day of that month, or in other words just three days after I made the report to Mr. Scott. It is not also so a fact that you could have been present during the computation of the amount of this overcharge, since the meetings of the board are public, but that you were not on hand to protect the interests of the "dear people." Yes, I received a telegram from Mr. Scott on June 21st, 1912, long after the date for settlement had been arranged, asking that I go to Portales and investigate the matter, and advise you and others that the district attorney's office would care for that matter. You had nothing to do with the fixing of the date for the adjustment, neither do you have anything to do with the adjustment, so far as I am informed or can learn. Under the settlement that was made the county recovered back more than could ever have been recovered in any lawsuit, and at the same time secured a reduction in the fees for the next publication, and notwithstanding that this was done at a public meeting of the board of commissioners, you were absent and not participating.

With reference to your statement that Mr. Scott told you certain things, it is only necessary for me to say that no such conversation ever occurred between Mr. Scott and myself, and I am quite confident that he never made such a statement to you.

No, thank you, I shall not contribute to the socialist campaign fund by publishing your answer at my expense. If you are proud of your effort and think it worthy of distribution you might call on the socialist local for the expense money.

In your reply to me it is very noticeable that a large number of the paragraphs begin with the words, "I assume that," it seems that you assume a great deal. In fact you assume entirely too much. Aside from these violent assumptions there isn't a full and complete answer to any single question that was propounded by me, neither have you affirmed or denied that you made the charges alleged, or that you are in anyway responsible for them. I had hoped that you would answer some of these questions, yes or no, but you have seen fit to deal in vague and indefinite assumptions, which to the exclusion of things definite. Respectfully,
