## DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

**T. E. Mears and A. A. Beeman Elected State Central Committee**

## W. H. BRALEY COUNTY CHAIRMAN

### Plans and Arrangements For Success of State Ticket This Fall

At the convention held Saturday, in the court house, the Democratic county committee elected permanent officers and made other arrangements to carry on the campaign this fall. W. H. Braley was elected county chairman and A. F. Jones, secretary.

W. H. Braley, while practically a new man in Portales, is held in high esteem as a business man and was elected city clerk at the last election without opposition. He is a life long Democrat and took an active part in the affairs of the party in what was formerly Indian Territory where he lived before coming here. Mr. Braley is a willing and untiring worker and will always be alive to the best interest of the party.

The chairman and different members of the committee made talks and plans and preparations were made for carrying on the campaign this fall. It is not anticipated that there will be any contest so far as Roosevelt county is concerned but it is a matter of getting out the vote that this county may take her usual place in support of the state ticket.

On motion of Geo. Robertson of Elida, A. A. Beeman and T. E. Mears were elected members of the State Central committee. At the last primary in Taiban precinct number 10, where there was a tie between J. H. Cheshire and C. P. Stone for precinct committeeman it was decided by the convention to let the present committeeman W. M. Wilson hold over.

### Gets Mare

A. B. Hale, the popular cashier at the local Santa Fe depot, a few days ago recovered a sorrel mare which disappeared from his ranch near Ft. Sumner more than four years ago. He recognized the animal on the streets of Portales about a month ago and as she was branded in several places had little trouble in making the identification. The mare is none the worse for her long absence except of course four years has been added to her age. A team of mules which disappeared at the same time has not yet been recovered.

## Burton's Ranch

The success attained by Jim Burton whose ranch is eight miles north and one west of Elida shows what a hustler can do in the stock business in Roosevelt county.

He owns 1800 acres of fine grazing land and 10 sections under control. On this ranch is a good house, shade trees and it is otherwise well improved. This year he has 50 acres feed for winter use. Mr. Burton is a believer in the silo and in Sudan grass. On his ranch are 125 head of white-face cows and room for many more.

When Jim Burton came to this country about eight years ago he had \$800 and since that time has accumulated stock and property that he refused \$10,000 for recently.

## PORTALES VALLEY ONIONS

**Bountiful Yield Equal to Imported Denias Grown Here**

## MAY HAVE BIG ACREAGE NEXT YEAR

### Now is Time to Get Ready For Next Year's Crop

Great success can be made in the Portales Valley raising onions and many have been raised this year. Among the enthusiastic onion raisers are C. L. Sanders and W. F. Jernigan whose places join the town on the southwest.

Mr. Sanders has raised five-eighths of an acre which produced the enormous yield of 10,000 pounds. Mr. Jernigan raised practically the same amount on the same amount of land. This is their first experience in raising onions in this Valley and next year each expects to plant an acre and make it produce 20,000 pounds.

These onions will now sell at 3 cents per pound and later may bring more; even at this price there is good money in the proposition. One advantage about onions is that they are not perishable and when well matured will keep all winter.

Mr. Sanders received recently from E. P. Kuhl, who is now at his home at Gridley, Illinois, pre-

paring to bring his family here, a specimen of Denia onions imported from Spain and which taste so much like the Portales Valley onions that he cannot tell the difference. The Denia onions are retailing for seven cents per pound at Gridley. Three onlops raised by Mr. Sanders weighed one pound and fifteen ounces while the same number of Denias weighed four ounces less so it is readily seen that our onions are larger than those being sold on the Illinois market.

Mr. Kuhl is very enthusiastic over the onion proposition in the Valley and expects to go strong on them next year providing he can get others interested in the proposition that a sufficient amount may be raised to be marketed to an advantage.

Now is the time to get busy for next years crop. The seed should be planted soon for next year. This looks like a good proposition and if each farmer in this Valley would make preparations to grow next year at least one acre of onions they will produce more money perhaps than any other one thing that can be grown in a like area. Denia onion seed is difficult to obtain but Gibraltar seed is plentiful.

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## SUCCESSFUL HOG RAISING

**More Than Thirty Cars Will Be Shipped This Year**

## IS NO LONGER AN EXPERIMENT

### Hog Business In Valley is Established on Substantial Basis


The hog, "Mortgage Lifter," is a familiar term to the majority of the farmers now in the Portales Valley. Nowhere is the term more applicable than in this Valley. The people now composing the class called farmers in the Valley are pioneers. They have come into a new country, they are new to each other and conditions have been practically in every respect different to what they were "Back Home." We can truthfully say that our pioneers, no less than our forefathers who pioneered in the countries now known to us as "Old," were up against a proposition and one that must be worked out by experience before they could realize to the fullest extent the just returns for the labor and time expended.

The Portales Valley is past the experimental stage. The farmers and experimenters have passed through the fires and as in olden times come out as pure gold. They have proven beyond a doubt, even to the most doubtful, that Portales Valley swine are "Mortgage Lifters" and that the hog business of the Valley is now established on a substantial basis and furthermore the bankers of the Valley are more than glad to let the hogmen have money on paper signed by them. This in itself being substantial evidence that the business is a success.

The present estimate, made by those persons deemed capable of making such, of the number of cars of hogs that will go out of the Valley this year places the number at from twenty to thirty more if the dry land farmers decide to feed their thousands upon thousands of bushels of grain instead of holding and selling it. The above number will go beyond a doubt as they are now on the farms around Portales and some already in the finishing pens.

To those not familiar with the conditions of the valley and who might ask what is fed the hogs the following may be of interest. Beginning with the brood sow, the first of January she is carried through on maize and a small amount of cut alfalfa hay up to and including the first of April, the cut alfalfa is then discontinued as is also the maize, except for a few bites now and then, and the sow is placed on the green alfalfa field where her litter comes about the first of May and in fine condition from the well balanced rations and the month's good exercise of the sow on the green pasture. The pigs are turned loose with the sow in the field and left to practically take care of themselves, aside from being looked after each night until they are old enough to keep from being laid on or hurt by the older hogs. By they time the little fellows are three weeks old they will



### SUDAN GRASS.

(From The Clovis Journal.)  
So much has been written about this wonderful grass that we will not pretend to give its origin or history, but will give a few facts about it from observation in Curry County.

The attention of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce was called to this grass through numerous newspaper articles; and, desiring to assist all they could in bettering conditions on the farm, the Chamber of Commerce bought 65 pounds of this grass seed, paying \$1.75 and \$2.00 per pound for it. One hundred packages of a half pound each were placed with as many farmers over the county, under contract to return to the Chamber of Commerce one-fifth of all seed raised. Five pounds were placed with Liebelt Bros., five pounds with Dock Sparks and five pounds with I. T. Moore. The Liebelt Bros. have threshed from the five pounds planted 1500 pounds, or three hundred times as much as planted. From one of the half pound packages 215 pounds were threshed, so that a very conservative estimate places the amount of seed that will be threshed from the 65 pounds put out by the Chamber of Commerce, at 20,000 pounds. Individual farmers bought and planted about 85 pounds. Flueger this will yield in the same proportion, Curry County will produce 45,000 to 50,000 pounds of seed this year.

Besides the seed about two ton of straw is obtained per acre. This straw is a splendid feed for any kind of stock. Much better for horses than millet or sorghum, and should be worth from \$8 to \$10 per ton. After seed crop is taken off there should be a cutting of hay from a ton to a ton and a half per acre.

This seed will retail this year at \$1 per pound. It will be no trouble to find a market for it, as every farmer in Curry County will want to plant from 10 to 20 pounds, and inquiries are coming in from almost every county in New Mexico; as well as from Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado. The Chamber of Commerce, of Clovis, will handle the seed raised by the farmers of this county, and can furnish seed to anyone wanting it, at \$1 per pound.

There are three distinct kinds of this grass, all good, and farmers should bear this in mind that the black cap, the red cap, or the cream color all should be saved. We mention this as we heard of one farmer who pulled out all the black and red caps. Save it all plant more next year, and tell your neighbors about it. Even should the price go as low as 25c a pound next year—which we doubt very much—your Sudan crop would still be worth from \$100 to \$150 per acre, and this year it will be worth better than \$500 per acre. The Clovis Chamber of Commerce did Curry County a great service when they succeeded in getting more than 100 farmers to try Sudan Grass this year.

### THE PANHANDLE STATE FAIR.

Elsewhere in this issue appears an announcement of the Second Annual Exhibition of the Panhandle State Fair. Every resident of Northwest Texas should take an interest in this great enterprise. It is a movement on the part of all of us to bring to the notice of the outside world the unexcelled agricultural possibilities of our section of the Southwest. Our own county and every other Panhandle and South Plains country should be represented at this Fair. Our people should arrange to attend the Fair in large numbers. The Fair which means an interest and red which might contribute to our entertainment, instruction and comfort. Let us respond to the hearty invitation and contribute our full share toward the success of this laudable enterprise.

### PERSIAN SHEEP.

The arrival of two of the choicest products from the ranch of Buffalo Jones, near Portales, N. M., caused excitement at the stock yards yesterday morning.

Six hundred of the famous fat-tailed sheep—the royal sheep of Persia—found only on the ranch of Buffalo Jones, in this country, were brought in. The other "product" was a charming young woman, Mrs. Olive Jones Whitmer, daughter of Buffalo Jones.

"I am much interested in this brand of sheep," she said.

"You see, they were an experiment with us for some years and we are just beginning to convince people they are a good investment."

"They are the royal sheep of Persia. About ten years ago the shah of Persia gave the American ambassador two of them. He sent them to my father. Previous to that none had been allowed to go out of the country."

"We thought they could be raised in this country, and they can. We now have 1,800 Persian sheep, part pure blooded and the rest cross-breeds, all descendants of the original pair."

These sheep have large, full tails, whence their name. Their wool is much finer than that of the ordinary sheep, and their meat is said to lack the usual "mutton" taste. They were purchased by the W. M. Litch Sheep company in the Live Stock Exchange building.—K. C. Post.

### THIRTY MILLION ACRES ARE STILL OPEN TO ENTRY

Santa Fe, Aug. 22.—Slightly more than 38 per cent of the area of New Mexico, or to be exact, 30,104,843 acres, remain public domain subject to entry under the federal land laws. This is the statement of the general land office for the fiscal year ending June 30, just received by the land office here. Incidentally, that is the earliest in the year that these statistics have ever been received in Santa Fe.

True, thirty million acres is a nice-sized kingdom, an area greater than the entire state of Pennsylvania or New York, yet, it is what remains after picking the best lands out of 78,000,000 acres and is fifty per cent less than the area of the public domain ten years ago. Of those 30,000,000 acres, one-third still remains to be officially surveyed.

Public Domain Dwindling.

How the public area is dwindling and how crowded New Mexico is already becoming is more apparent in some sections than others. In the Clayton land district, for instance, only 767,100 acres remain open to entry and that means that the Clayton land office will be closed within the next few years. In the Tucumcari land district, only 418,500 acres are public domain and that office, too, will soon be consolidated with another office.

It also means that the growth of the dry farming section in northeastern New Mexico from homesteading, has practically ceased. The Fort Sumner district still has 1,910,451 acres and the Roswell district 7,531,257 acres, but the Lea-Croce district has 11,624,465 acres of public domain or more than the Clayton, Fort Sumner, Tucumcari and Roswell districts taken together, while the Santa Fe district has 7,852,320 acres, so that two-thirds of the public domain is in western New Mexico and only one-third remains in the eastern portion of the state.

WHEAT SEEDING.

We know that early deep preparation of land for wheat is advisable. Ground that has been well plowed or harrowed in July or early August, and properly cared for after that time, will show a better yield than land prepared later than the dates mentioned.

Time for Seeding: The time for seeding wheat must necessarily vary according to the season and location. For Kansas and Oklahoma conditions, the best wheat crops usually come from sowing from September 15 to October 15, provided that the seasons are favorable.

Quantity of Seed to Sow: Wheat raisers continue to make the mistake of sowing too much seed. For Kansas and Oklahoma conditions 45 pounds of seed per acre is usually sufficient, provided that the wheat is sown in season in well prepared ground.

Treatment for Smut: It is a good plan to treat all seed wheat for smut, whether the seed appears to be free from it or not. The "Formalin Treatment," as set out in the following, is considered most reliable.

To sprinkle, prepare a clean place on a canvas or smooth floor, and thoroughly sprinkle the space to be occupied by the wheat with the solution, before the seed is emptied upon it.

Place the dried into sacks that have been dipped in the solution, and it will be found a good plan to sprinkle the grain drill with the liquid before putting the seed into it.

Sowing: Sow all wheat with some good, reliable grain drill and cover with a press wheel attachment if possible. This press wheel attachment "firms" the ground above and immediately around the seed, and insures a better stand.

Wheat Acreage: It is far better to sow a smaller acreage, and do the work right, than to sow twice as many acres on ground that has been but half prepared.

The Santa Fe will build an \$18,000 depot at Silver City.

The Charles Springer ranch at Springer shipped 100 bulls to Lander, Wyo.

Alamogordo is making heavy shipments of early peaches to El Paso and Oklahoma.

Fourteen or fifteen cars of honey will be shipped from the Pecos Valley this season.

New Mexico will have a display of gems of the value of \$25,000 at the San Diego exposition.

A number of farmers on the plains claim they harvested thirty bushels of wheat to the acre.

A number of lawyers of the state are up for disbarment for practice unbecoming their profession.

The department of public instruction has granted state aid to district 42, San Miguel county, for \$350.

Attorney J. H. Crist, of Santa Fe has received notice of his appointment as United States attorney for the Pueblo Indians, succeeding Francis C. Wilson who resigned the office recently.

More and more the farmers of the Pecos Valley are realizing that it is profitable to feed their hay and grain to the stock, instead of shipping it out, and at the same time paying the freight, besides paying freight on the cream of the land to ship it out.

Don W. Lusk, formerly connected with the Albuquerque Morning Journal, and until recently with the El Paso, Texas, Herald, has taken up his residence in Silver City, with a view to making it his home. He has taken the position on The Independent made vacant several months ago by the appointment of E. M. Brumback to the postmastership.

Not all of the wool crop of eastern New Mexico has been sold. There are yet in storage in the Roswell Wool and Hide company warehouse, 225,000 pounds of the fleecy crop. All of it is in small crops, and got in too late to be included in the two big sales the company pulled off early in the season.

Rev. Henry Van Valkenburg, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Roswell has been appointed for another year. This will make five years of pastoral work at that place.

There will be fourteen meets during the state fair at Albuquerque which alone bring a total of 1300 people. These conventions include the State Federation of Labor, the Knights of Columbus, the Knights of Pythias, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the National Mohair Growers' association, the State Undertakers' and Embalmers' association, the New Mexico Dairyman's association, the New Mexico Poultry Growers' association, the New Mexico Sheep Growers' association, and several other smaller meetings such as the State Medical society, all of which have attendance of from 25 to 50 delegates each. In addition to these, a considerable number of Elks will be attracted to Albuquerque by the visit of the Grand Exalted Ruler of that order, and the Shriner from all parts of the state will gather in ceremonial session on October 7th to welcome the Imperial Potentate of the Shrine.

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
