STATE LAND LEASES ENORMOUS

Schools and State Institutions Greatly Benefited By This Increase

There has been turned over to the state treasurer during the past year, over one-half million dollars.

. The growth of the state land business has been enormous, and the increase in the past three years seems almost increditable. The balance of \$710-621.84 in the hands of the commissioner at the end of the fiscal year is made up, almost entirely, of the money deposited by those who have made applications for purchases of state land. A deposit of 10 per cent of the minimum purchas price is required to accompany ev ery application. The money is held on deposit until the lands ap plied for are clear listed and sold when it is applied on the purchase price and turned into the state treasury to be crredited to the permanent funds of the common schools or state institutions.

In addition to the \$398,646.18 transerred by the state land of fice to the credit of schools and institutions, the sum of \$29,983, 44 was on September 30, last, turned back from the maintenance fund of the office, and later was apporrtioned to the schools and the various state institutions. This made the total for schools and institutions in the year \$428, 629.57.

ACCIDENTS SURE TO OCCUR

willy to Put Things Right When They Go Wrong Is the Test of the Chauffeur-Hest Thing to Do When Brekes Are Dis-

Accidents will happen, even to the best built, best cared-for and most carefully operated automobiles. Following are a few ideas that may help someone out in a tight place. No matter what happens, there is almost al ways some way out of it. If brakes burn or are disabled and there are long steep hills to descend, there are two things that may be done. First, the motor may be driven by the car by leaving the clutch in and throwing in low gear. This provides a powerful brake. Of course the spark must be off. Though it may seem queer, there will be more resistance if the relief cocks are left open. If they are kept closed the power that goes to compress air in the cylinders is given back on the expansion stroke, while if the cocks are open the motor has to pull air in and then drive it out, which takes power. Try it some time. Second, a small tree can be lashed to the rear axle to act as a drag. The two ideas might, on occasion, be used in

Batteries of the dry type can be given new life, for a short time, by punching them full of holes and soaking them in water. This will enable the car to go several miles farther and may save—and often has saved much trouble. Using the engine as a brake on long hills not only cools it, but saves the brake lining, which suffers very severely in long steep descents. Low gear may be too powerful a brake for an ordinary hill. Prac-

When a car has to be towed, never hitch your rope or chain to the center of the axle. Hitch it at the point where the springs are attached, or to the ends of the springs themselves. Center attachment puts a great deal of unnecessary strain on the axle. If you can't get up a hill on your lowest gear, try backing up. The reverse gear often is lower than the low forward gear, which is an advantage in such a case.—Howard Greene in Orange Judd Farmer.

SHIELD ON STEERING WHEEL

Contrivance Protects the Eyes of Driver From the Glare of Lamps of Approaching Car.

A new attachment for automobiles is a light shield supported on the column of the steering wheel in such a position as to protect the eyes of the driver from the glare of the headlights of an approaching car. This shield consists of a series of screens separated by narrow vertical openings. It is

At night the man whose car is not equipped with an electric trouble lamp will find a mirror most useful. With it the light from a street lamp or from one of the side lamps can be reflected into many places about the motor, and the danger attending the use of a match or any other open flame is done away

Watch for Valve Leakage. Leakage of valves in automobile tires, an ofttimes bothersome and undetected source of trouble, may be easily and conveniently tested by moving the wheel until the valve to be Then place the valve in a glass of water. Bubbles indicate leakage.

Matter Too Important for Hasty Judgment.

Conditions When the European War is Ended May Demand a Readjustment of Schedules or It May Be Unnecessary.

Like all other instructors in the protectionist school, our neighbor the Sun believes that there is only one way to revise the tariff, which is upward, and only one acceptable time, which is now. No matter if all industrial Europe is at war and is doomed to remain so, perhaps, for two years more, there will be peace eventually, and then "our manufacturers, merchants and workers will be at the mercy of the most skillful and desperate competition the world has ever known."

Probably no well-informed person will deny that after the close of the war there will arise economic conditions in Europe that may demand important changes in our tariff. Good reasons may appear for increasing some of the schedules, but it is quite as likely that common sense will dictate decreases in others. With due respect to the protectionist school, it must be said that the American tariff is going to be adjusted to revenue as well as protection for many a day.

Existing customs duties have failed as revenue-producers because the war has reduced imports. The war, therefore, has given most of our manufacturers and merchants the advantage that they would hope for under a prohibitive tariff. To increase rates upon a traffic that does not exist would be useless, and experimentation in other directions, except for the one object of revenue, would only invite jobbery

and disaster. It is not in the mind of any disinterested man to say precisely what kind of tariff we shall need when Europe relinquishes the sword. But the very worst of all tariffs in that emergency would be one under which a few favored interests could perpetuate in time of peace the obstructions from which we have suffered in time of war.-New York World.



M. to brush foreign matter, such as dirt. dust, and the like into the pail during milking, particularly when the tail is filled with the filth of the yard or pasture. The invention prevents such milk contamination.
