A major breakthrough in Dimmitt's desperate housing shortage seemed to be in the offing at Monday night's city commission meeting.

BUILDERS and developers presented plats for three new residential subdivisions in total lots for new homes at first and would provide for 143 more lots in the future.

All three proposed new subdivisions are along the south side of FM 3215, the "cutoff road" that connects State 86 west with US 385 south.

The commission and city engineer are now studying the three proposals, which will require extensions of utilities and paving across FM 3215, plus annexation of all the properties

VIRGIL Justice of Justice Real Estate presented plans for a subdivision that could eventually grow to 80 lots with three new east-west streets. His proposed subdivision is located just east of the Joe Buter home on FM 3215, and Justice said he had options for further expansion to 130 or store planned nore lots.

State renews 55-mph limit

The Texas Highway Commis-sion has officially extended the 55-miles-per-hour speed limit for Texas Highways as provided by action of the legislature and the governor.

THE legislature passed the extension on March 26 and the measure was signed by the governor March 27. The act gives the Texas Highway Commission authority to impose the 55-mph limit as long as federal legislation continues in force.

The federal law was passed in late 1973 at the beginning of the energy shortage. It threatens the loss of federal aid highway funds to any state which does not impose the 55mph speed limit. The original authority given the Highway Commission to set lower statewide speed limits was conferred by the legislature in December 1973. That authority would have expired on April 1.

State to begin monthly rebate of sales taxes

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday that monthly ebates of city sales taxes will tart April 15.

THIS FIRST-ever monthly payment will replace the old quarterly payment system with ts 90-day lag time which had been in effect since the city sales tax was passed in 1967. Bullock said that junking the

quarterly system "means we've quit burying the cities' money in the backyard in fruit jars for three months at a time.

"Now it will be interesting to see what the cities do with it," Bullock said. "Like Franklin said, a dollar invested is a dollar earned-or at least seven percent.'

PAYMENTS to 800 towns nd cities which have the one percent tax total more than 200 million a year.

The April 15 payments will over taxes collected by the comptroller between Feb. 17, the cutoff date for the last payment, and April 4. Future monthly payments will be made at mid-month, Bullock said.




