Several talks and papers were well worth the time of all present and professor Lugibihl of Silver City gave an interesting talk Friday night. Sessions of the Association this year have been exceptionally good and much praise must be given the president, R. A. Deen. The standard of the teachers of the county have been raised and we challenge any county in the state to produce a better class of teachers than we now have.

One of the most interesting educational meetings that has been held in the county in a long time was held at Benson last Sunday. Myron R. Lugibihl of Silver City was the leading speaker. Dinner was served on the ground and Coe Howard and some of the other candidates express it that "most to eat that was ever in the whole world was set before them." The candidates for county superintendent spoke in the afternoon as well as Mr. Lugibihl. There were about twenty-five of thirty present from Portales.

A copy of the President's proclamation creating the Bandler national monument was received by Register Delgado and Receiver Vigil of the United States land office at Santa Fe.

Governor McDonald notified the Secretary of War at Washington that the National Guard of New Mexico, consisting of sixty-one officers and 877 men, was ready for service on short notice.

Ada Brown, colored, of Raton, has pleaded guilty to robbing an Italian miner of some \$750 in East Raton. The woman implicated George Wyatt, now in custody, and William Thomas, who is said to have the currency.

District Judge Edmund C. Abbott at Santa Fe sentenced Celso Roybal to serve from fifty to seventy-five years at hard labor in the state penitentiary for murdering Alejandro Maestas near Espanola on Feb. 29.

Alamogordo voters will be called upon to decide whether the town shall issue bonds in the sum of \$275,000 or less for acquiring the city water system, and in the sum of \$25,000 for acquiring a municipal electric plant at the general election, April 4.

George Woodhouse has been named chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of Colfax county, to succeed Rev. Harvey M. Shields, who died in a Texas hospital. A successor to Dr. Shields will be appointed by Governor McDonald.

Thomas D. Burns, a pioneer settler of northern New Mexico, veteran politician and legislator and owner of numerous valuable mercantile establishments in Rio Arriba county, New Mexico, and southern Colorado, passed away at his home at Tierra Amarilla.

COMING EVENTS.

Tucumcari citizens are engineering a grain elevator scheme.

Clovis, which voted out the saloons Jan. 31, is now a dry town.

The smallpox epidemic at Clovis has assumed serious proportions.

Ten natives and three Indians have died from scarlet fever at Espanola.

The contract for the Santa Fe round house and shops at Gallup has been let.

Luna county has a school where, of the nineteen students attending, but one is a girl.

Nara Visa was the scene of a disastrous fire when seven buildings were destroyed.

Sweet potato growers around Portales are shipping out their product, stored since last fall.

The Santa Fe county grand jury concluded its work with the return of fourteen indictments.

The recent fire on the Gonzalitos mesa partly destroyed the timber and damaged the range extensively.

Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Otosen Drug Company's store in Willard, Amin Bros.' store and one residence.

The 1916 motor vehicle licenses issued total 4,940, or only 60 less than the number issued during the whole of 1915.

Ralph W. Enos of Silver City will represent the Indian factory in the Albuquerque-Phoenix motorcycle race late in May.

The fire limits of the city of Gallup, in which no frame building can be erected, were extended to cover eight additional blocks.

The principal speaker at the commencement exercises of the Santa Rosa High school, on May 19, will be Chief Justice Clarence J. Roberts.

The Silver City council has formally accepted the paving on Bullard and Broadway streets, recently completed, at a cost of \$20,000.

H. F. Coggeshall has been appointed Indian agent at Shiprock, succeeding W. T. Shelton, who founded the San Juan school and agency twenty-two years ago.

Incorporation papers for the Gold Bell Mining Company were filed with the State Corporation Commission, the authorized capital of the concern being \$100,000.

The Roswell city council has passed an ordinance creating the Roswell Cemetery Association which will hereafter have the control of the Roswell cemetery.

The tennis players of New Mexico will meet in state tournament in Roswell this fall for third successive year. The tournament will be staged Sept. 4, 5, 6 and 7.

State land brought almost a record price at the sale at Carlsbad when Capt. Fritz Muller sold 2,000 acres to various parties. One parcel brought \$25 an acre.

A total of \$994,500 will be spent on roads and bridges in New Mexico during the present year, according to an estimate issued by State Engineer James Adams French.

More than a million acres of pasture were swept by a prairie fire that started near Obar and burned for forty miles through the northern portion of Quay county.

Mrs. S. J. Kenady read an excellent paper on "Some Factors of the Growth of the Elementary Teacher." J. R. Shock gave us a paper on the "Value of Psychology to the Teacher in the Lower Grades." Miss Annie Thomas gave a comprehensive paper on "What Rural Schools of Massachusetts are doing." Miss Kennamore then stated a few facts about Rural Schools of Mississippi the subject being further discussed by Edwin G. Taylor. The next on the program was an excellent paper by R. A. Deen on "Standardization of Rural Schools of Roosevelt county." S. J. Stinnett gave an able discussion on the same subject; after which the meeting adjourned until seven thirty that evening.

The evening session was called to order by the president after which we heard a short announcement from several candidates for the various county offices, then Prof. Myrom R. Luginbihl of the Silver City Normal gave a very able and instructive address on "The Education of Personality."

Saturday morning the program was finished as follows, "Amusing Experiences of School Life," by Miss Zehira Shaw and others. Fred L. Ohr then read an interesting paper on "Best Method of Consolidation for Rural School," after which Supt. Long, R. A. Deen, Miss S. G. Bryant, S. J. Stinnett, J. W. Russell and others gave excellent talks and submitted various plans for the consolidation of Rural Schools.

R. P. Connally then gave us a clear insight as to what "The Rural Schools of Indiana are doing and suggested ways by which we might profit by their experience. J. W. Russell read us from the Manuel of San Bernardino county, California, some of the things which Rural Schools of California are doing. Miss S. G. Bryant then gave an excellent talk on "Best Method of Consolidation for the Rural Schools of Roosevelt county." D. F. De LaMater then discussed "Teaching the Lesson of a Real Literary Selection." After the business session in which was discussed the Summer County Institute, the resolutions read and passed on the meeting adjourned.

We, your committee on resolutions beg to submit the following:

1. That we express to the people of Elida our appreciative thanks for their hospitality during our stay with them.
2. That we thank Mr. Luginbihl of the Silver City Normal for his presence among us and especially for his very able and in-

structive address.

3. That we favor the passage of a State Teachers' Pension Law and recommend to our legislature that they give favorable consideration to such a measure, also,
4. That a portion of the Public land of the State be donated for public school purposes.
5. That we recommend the consolidation of the rural schools of Roosevelt county on the most feasible plan.
