Many Qualify For Social Security

Last week, November 4 and Last week, November 4 and 5, many people across the nation received their first social security benefit checks -- checks made possible for the first time by the 1960 amendments to the social security laws, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abliene District Manager for the Social Security Administration. Receiving Administration. Receiving checks for the first time were working people and their depen-dents (and also some survivors of workers who have died) who became eligible for benefits. The amount of social security credits required was reduced by about one-third, Tuley said. early childhood.

Also receiving benefits for the first time were some widows whose husbands died after Mar. 31, 1838, with at least 1½ years of social security credits. Before the changes in the law enacted in September, no monthly bene-fits were payable to the survi-vors of any person dying before 1940.

If you believe you qualify for benefits under the amended law, it is still not too late for you to apply, and receive benefits dating back to the month of October. Additional information about specific cases can be ob-tained by asking your Abilene social security office. For gen-eral information on the 1960 amendments, ask the Abilene of fice for the new leaflet on the 1960 changes.
