

Ordinance No. 58

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. It shall be, and is hereby made, the duty of every owner, agent, or occupant of any building or buildings situated on any lot or lots of land adjoining or abutting on any street or alley where any sewer pipes are now laid, or may hereafter be laid, to have and make proper connections of every sink, bath tub, basin, watercloset, privy, slop-hopper, wash tray, and all other fixtures discharging waste or waste water, whether inside the house or separate therefrom, with the city sewer; said connection or connections to be made in an approved sanitary manner under and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the water and light department.

Section 2. No building or buildings shall hereafter be erected or constructed upon any lot or lots, or lands adjoining or abutting any street or alley where a sewer pipe is laid, without the owner or owners, or the agent of such owner or owners causing the proper sewer connections to be made, as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the ordinances of the town relating to sewer connections.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions or requirements of the foregoing sections shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than five nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment; and each and every day that such violation is done, or suffered to be done, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in force and effect on and after thirty days from the date of its passage and approval, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

The board of trustees for the town Tuesday night enacted two health ordinances that should appeal to the better judgment of every man in the city. While, on their face, they may appear a little drastic, yet it must be remembered that the public health is a matter of the highest importance and, while there are many who are always willing to do their full duty without legal requirements, yet some always have to be driven. The sewers were constructed under a special provision of congress for the special reason that the public health might be conserved. So long as there was no law compelling the use of this system the expense was more or less of a waste and the health was not benefited to the extent contemplated by the act. To the man who really wants to do the right thing there are no terrors in the new ordinances will be enforced, reasonably, but without fear or favor. The town board has acted wisely and should be commended.

Teachers Institute

The Roosevelt county teacher's institute will be held at Portales the last week in August, 26, 30, 1918, Prof. W. M. Wilson will be instructor. There will be a regular program in which the most practical subjects will be discussed by all the teachers. Each teacher and prospective teacher will be mailed a program later. In addition to the regular program, the meeting will be visited by some of our most prominent educators of the state and nation, whose names will be advertised later.

It is compulsory upon all persons who expect to teach in this state to attend at least two week's institute or summer school approved by the state superintendent of schools.

The most of the counties this year upon recommendation of the state board of education will hold only five days institute in lieu of the regular ten days institute. Teachers attending the full five days will receive credit for the two weeks attendance. Teachers attending one of the state normal schools is excused from institute attendance the following year.

The exemption dates are as follows: May 31 and June 1; June 14 and 15; June 28 and 29; July 26 and 27. There will be no examination during the institute and those teachers desiring to take an examination will have the privilege of taking one or all of the above dates, provided they notify the county superintendent at least two weeks in advance which date they desire.

It is hoped that every teacher in the county can arrange to attend this institute and assist in making it a success and receive the inspiration which will assist them to teach better schools. Arrangements are being made to have one day an educational rally for the entire county.

Ordinance No. 59

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. It shall be, and is hereby made, the duty of every owner, agent or occupant of any building or buildings, or of any premises whatsoever, where sewer connections are not made, to have and maintain all privies, waterclosets and toilets in such condition and manner that the discharge and waste therein deposited shall not be accessible to flies, and easily accessible to the city scavenger; and at all times to keep such privies, waterclosets and toilets thoroughly disinfected with lime or other disinfectant of equal effectiveness.

Section 2. That there shall be provided and kept by the owner, agent, or occupant of every building a suitable covered metallic vessel, free from leakage and so that they are not accessible to flies, in which shall be placed all garbage and liquid refuse that accumulates in said building or on the premises. Said receptacle shall be emptied not less than once during each week; and no person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any garbage, rubbish, manure, dead animals, or other offensive or unwholesome matter at any place other than that designated as the town dumping ground.

Section 3. All buildings, premises, lots, corrals, wagon yards, whether occupied or not, shall be kept by the owner, agent or occupant in a sanitary condition, free from garbage, rubbish, refuse, weeds, offensive and unwholesome matter, noxious and offensive odors, and all things that might endanger the public health.

Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions or requirements of the foregoing sections shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than five nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment; and each and every day that such violation is done, or suffered to be done, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

The town council met in regular session and, upon roll call, the following members were present: Mayor, E. B. Hawkins; trustees, Inda Humphrey, J. T. Wilcox, C. J. Whitcomb and G. M. Williamson. Minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

The town council proceeded to canvass the returns from the bond election held on June 1st, 1918, said bond election was for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the town of Portales the question of issuing twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars bonds for thirty years for the purpose of repairing the water works system of the said town. It was found that there was for the water works bond issue, fifty-six (56) votes; against water works bond issue, two (2) votes; total vote for and against the bond issue, fifty-eight (58) votes; majority in favor issuing the bonds, fifty-six (56) votes.

We, the judges and clerks of special bond election held on June the first, 1918 do hereby certify that the above are the true and correct results of said election, signed, S. F. Moore, J. N. McCall, C. W. Ison, judges of election; S. Howell, Leo Braley, clerks of election.

W. E. Keeter, having recovered from his serious illness, was instructed to take charge of the work at city plant.

The city attorney and town clerk were instructed to draw the proper notice of proceeding to offer for sale and publication bids for the bonds.

The city attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance prohibiting the keeping or storing of gasoline, or other explosive oils, or any explosives, within the town limits unless stored under ground.

The city attorney was also instructed to draw an ordinance prohibiting open closets along the sewer system and regulating the sanitary condition of all open closets.

The town council then recessed until Friday evening, June 7th, at 8 o'clock, p. m. 1918. E. B. Hawkins, Mayor.
