## Ford Tractors

At last a tractor has been put upon the market that is not only practical but it is economical and priced so that all may own one.
Henry Ford has labored on this machine for the past several
years, testing and proving each new model, thoroughly. It has all the advantages enjoyed by the high priced motors and some not possessed by them. The day of the farm horse is waning. He
has been faithful and true, but the time has arrived when the four footed tractor must be re placed by the machine. The
horse must be fed and cared for twelve months in the year, three
hundred and sixty-five. days, work or play, the tractor, when not at work, consumes no feed or fuel, one man will do with it in one day as mucn work as three or four men and a dozen head of horses. A horse after working
all day, must rest at night, the tractor will plow all day, pulling two fourteen-inch plows, and can
then be put on the road and worked all night, rest periods during the work hours are eliminated, the work being done bet ter and more rapidly. Espe cially in the west and southwest, where farming is done on a lar ser scale, where fields often emrace from five hundred to two or three thousand acres, must the
tractor be employed if the farm
is to prove profitable. Also the farmer with only his little quarter or half section of land will not be slow to recognize the advantage

THE SUGAR STIUATION
The sugar situation is one that must and will be borne patiently with by the people generally. The further reduction by the na tional food adminstration from three pounds per person per month, to two pounds per person per month, will also be followe without much grumbling. There is no inclination on the part of those remaining at home to ask the soldiers of our own or allied nations, yet there cannot but be some grumbling about the more than liberal allowances made to non-essential industries. In Por ld to cold drink Institutions is as follows; For the month of July, $\begin{array}{ccc}350 \text { pounds, } & \text { for August, } & 350 \\ \text { pounds, } & \text { for } & \text { September, }\end{array}$ pounds, for September, 300 each of the places, or two thousand pounds of sugar in three months. quested so to do, and given to understand that it was asked as a war measure, but they certainly have a right to be heard when it comes to wasting thousands upon thousancs of pounds of sugar in non-essential industries that are carried on for profit solely; that are neither necessary nor beneficial; that the public be better off without.
