Story of Life Program to Be Given Here

Mr. and Mrs. Tom V. Ellzey of Perryton will give their widely-acclaimed "Story of Life" program in Dimmitt Dec. 3-4, under sponsorship of Dimmitt schools. Supt. R. S. Vestal made the announcement this morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Ellzey have given this program in schools and churches throughout the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma, Southwest Missouri, Northwest Arkansas and Kansas. Many times they have been called back for second and third engagements.

The heart of their program simply emphasizes that sex education has a definite relationship to spiritual values. They feel this emphasis is essential to any wholesome educational program.

The Ellzeys hold that proper sex is nothing more or less than development of the future fathers and mothers—in short the development of the future world. This they say, is now pre-eminently the greatest work the world faces. It is the hope of the world.

They also hold that sex education can be carried forward properly only by the wholehearted cooperation of three agencies—the church, the church and the home.

Their whole program was built and presented with these three agencies in mind.

For example, all parents of the community will be asked to attend the first meeting of the two day program. It will begin at 7:00 Wednesday night, in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium. Mr. Ellzey's Christian service work for over 50 years, will address this joint meeting for 20 minutes. Then either the nearby Central Methodist Church for separate meetings. Mrs. Ellzey will address the women and Mr. Ellzey will talk to the men. In these separate meetings, the parents will be given a preview of the program that the Ellzeys will present on the next morning, Thursday, Dec. 4, to the boys and girls in Dalhart High School.

The High School program, from 10 a. m. to noon, will first be a general meeting of boys and girls. Then the boys and girls will go to separate sessions, with Mrs. Ellzey to the girls and Mr. Ellzey talking to the boys.

An Appetizing Relish Easily Made

Mattie Lee Seago Cranberries have been a must on our holiday menus for some time, but have you ever tried them chopped raw with oranges. All you need to do is wash 4 cups of cranberries run them through the food chopper with 2 oranges, . . . skin too. . . that have been quartered and seeded. Then mix well with enough sugar to suit your taste. It will probably take about 2 cups of sugar for this amount of cranberries. Chill the mixture a few hours before you're ready to serve. You'll have about a quart of relish in the above mixture.

Another good thing about this relish besides its taste and ease of preparation is the fact that you can keep it in the refrigerator for several weeks. That is, if your family doesn't eat it all at one meal.

Variations are easy too if you add 2 apples, peeled, cored and diced to the oranges. Or 1/2 cup each of diced carrots and celery.

One cup of fresh grapefruit segments or crushed pineapple may be used.

THANKSGIVING 1957

The Texas farmer and rancher have much to be thankful for this Thanksgiving. At most times his income from farm products and livestock has been the greatest in the history of the nation. Prices have been better than good, and in the majority Texas' crops have been abundant.

And salads, such as Waldorf—chopped apples and celery, with perhaps a touch of chopped nuts—or chopped cabbage, apples, and carrots, with a few raisins thrown in for good measure—are all-time favorites. Don't peel apples when they're used in a salad—the bright red skins add an attractive note, as well as nutritious value.

Fried apple rings are good with pork dishes—slice the apple into rings about a quarter of an inch thick and fry quickly in the hot fat from pork sausage if you want to try something good.

For desserts, there's apple dumpling, scalloped apples and apple crisp pudding. And of course, hot apple pie, full of spice, and served with cheese is America's number one favorite.

SCARLET FEVER CASES ABOVE AVERAGE

Austin, Texas.—The incidence of scarlet fever is at the present time nearly one-third higher than the seven-year median in Texas. One of the most disabling and dangerous of the diseases usually associated with childhood, actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Fifty-five cases were reported in the state during the week ending November 15, bringing the year's total to 1,242.

The Doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive scarlet rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications can result in prolonged disability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling.

A child with any kind of sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment the doctor prescribes will do much to alleviate discomfort, and reduce the possibility of dangerous complications."

The county Home Demonstration Council is now taking orders for grapefruit and oranges. Bring or mail your order and money to the Home Demonstration Agents office not later than December 8, 1947. The office is open from 8:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m. The fruit will be brought here by truck from Donna, Texas and will be tree ripened. The quality should be good. The costs will be as follows: White Marsh Seedless Grapefruit per brace box (80 to 96 count) will be \$1.75—1/2 box bag will be \$1.00. Oranges per brace box (252 to 288 count) will be \$2.50, and 1/2 box bag will be \$1.50. The trucking expense will be \$1.25 per brace box and handling charges will be 10c per brace box.

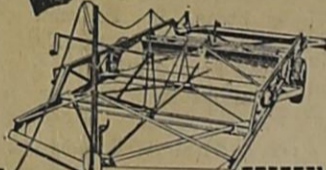
