



The Dimmitt Independent School District Food Service Department announces the sponsorship of the Summer Food Service program.

Meals will be provided at Richardson Elementary School, 708 W. Stinson, Dimmitt, from June 2 through June 30. Breakfast will be served from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. and lunch will be served from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

People who are eligible to participate in the program must not be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or political belief.

With summer on the way, students will need a Verification of Enrollment (VOE) from high school in order to renew their permits or licenses. Students can get it before school is out and it will be good for the summer. Bring the VOE to the Dimmitt Drivers License Office in the court house Thursday or Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Those are the hours for the drivers' license bureau until further notice. If a student is turning 18 years old, he or she will not need the VOE.

Saturday, June 7, is the date that's been set for Dimmitt's 16th annual City-Wide Garage Sale, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Each year since its inception, more than 100 families have participated in the sale day by holding garage sales at the homes, or joining with friends or family members in multifamily sales. Young tells Court about OMNI system Would help raise revenue

The Commissioners Court heard from Justice of the Peace Tana Young on Tuesday about a method of collecting outstanding warrants.

She told commissioners that the company, OMNI Base, would contract with the county to put all outstanding warrants on DPS records.

"We'd send in the names of those who didn't take care of their tickets and then they couldn't get their drivers license renewed," Young said. "With this system, New Mexico wouldn't issue licenses to anyone whose named is flagged."

The fee would be \$30 per warrant collected, she said. The commissioners asked that they be given a copy of the contract to examine before deciding whether to enter into a contract with OMNI.

In other business, commissioners:

In addition to the standard hard-bound version, a limited edition, leather-bound, collectors version will be available. No more


than 50 numbered copies of this leatherbound edition will be published. It will include a custom bookplate affixed to the inside cover, which will be hand numbered.





TIF may have outlived its usefulness in state

Growing up in the small, rural town of Glen Rose, Texas, my mom and I used to make deals.

If I did my part - keeping my room clean, helping with the dishes, taking out the trash - once a week she would load my sisters and me in the car for a trip to Dairy Queen and a dipped cone, fulfilling her end of the deal.

It taught me a lot; not the least of which was the importance of striking agreements and sticking to them.

And no matter how busy she was running a small business and taking care of three small children on her own, she always did as she promised and produced those chocolate dipped ice cream cones.

Too bad our government doesn't always work that

We all know the stories about our federal taxes: the Spanish-American War ended a century ago, but the tax to fund it survived all the combatants — and many of their descendants.

Texas is now headed in the same direction. The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund was created in 1995 primarily to hard-wire public schools, universities, libraries, and public hospitals to the Internet. A tax was assessed on telecommunications companies doing business in Texas to fund TIF. Some companies passed the tax directly on to consumers, others absorbed it as a cost of doing business — which of course always ends up being paid by consumers, shareholders or employees

The 1995 law required this tax to be levied until the fund received \$1.5 billion. Well, the till is almost full, and the terms of the agreement will soon be fulfilled by the telecommunications industry.

And so the time has come for the tax to go away.

The purpose has been achieved.

The need no longer exists.

A deal is a deal.

Unfortunately, the Texas Legislature is considering an extension of the tax. And they want to use it for other

whether state government should have even done such isn't always a deal.

In the real world, the tax would go away.

But in the world of politics, it is a truism that taxes never die, government just finds new ways to spend the money.

But this goes beyond extending the reach of a tax; it is a violation of both legislative trust and existing

A commitment was made, in law, that the tax would be assessed until the certain amount had been collected. The commitment was further made, in law, that funds would be used for a particular purpose.

The telecommunications industry agreed to the tax and upheld its end of the bargain.

And it will be paid, in full. The rules of the game were clearly understood.

Too bad legislators now want to change those rules. When kids change the rules of their games, we call them poor sports.

When businesses change the rules on customers, we call it criminal.

Not always so with government.

Let the TIF tax be seen to

its legal conclusion. If legislators want a new


source of revenue for a new program or initiative, then let them go back to the drawing board and begin again.

However, that may not be done here, probably because it is easier to extend an old tax than to get approval for a new one.

If the TIF tax is extended, the legislature will only prove again that politicians cannot be trusted to keep their word — even when set

in law. This TIF tax debate should be a reminder to us all: if old Texas taxes won't die, we must be exceedingly careful about implementing them in

the first place. Another reminder: One can argue about unfortunately, when dealing with government, a deal







USDA extends conservation reserve program signup

Sign-up period for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has been extended from May 30, June 13, announced Patricia A. Elliott, County Executive Director for the Castro County Farm Service Agency.

"Interest in the general CRP sign-up has been strong. This extension gives busy producers more time to enroll in this highly successful, environmentally beneficial program," said Elliott.

CRP is the nation's largest private lands environmental improvement program-it protects millions of acres of topsoil from erosion, provides valuable wildlife habitat and safeguards America's ground and surface water quality.

The 2002 Farm Bill authorized CRP enrollment up to 39.2 million acres. For fiscal year 2003, Castro County CRP participants have received

\$3,900,351 in rental payments as of May 2003, and approximately 103,567 acres are currently enrolled in the program.

CRP participants voluntarily remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production by entering into long-term contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, they receive annual rental payments and a payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation practices.

Current participants with contracts expiring this fallcovering about 1.5 million acres-can make new contract offers, which, if accepted, will become effective on Oct. 1, 2003. All other contracts awarded under this sign-up will become effective either at

the beginning of the next fiscal year, Oct. 1, 2003, or the following year, Oct. 1, 2004, whichever the producer chooses.

FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI), a ranking of environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP. Decisions on the EBI thresholds will be made by the Secretary after the sign-up ends and after FSA analyzes the EBI numbers of all the offers.

Those who would have met previous sign-up EBI

thresholds are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up.

"Producers who enroll acreage in CRP promote conservation and stewardship by protecting sensitive land for future generations and reduce production of surplus commodities.

"In return, producers receive needed income support through program payments and use of the land for recreational purposes," said Elliott.

Aside from the general sign-up, the CRP continuous sign-up program is available on an ongoing

basis for private lands currently in production. FSA has reserved 2 million acres for the continuous sign-up program, which protects the most environmentally desirable and sensitive land.

FSA is making a special effort to help enhance wildlife habitats and air quality by earmarking 500,000 of these acres for hardwood tree planting.

Swifts fall in regionals

Nazareth took one game from the Hamlin Pied Pipers on Saturday, but it wasn't enough to win the best-ofthree regional semifinal se-

After losing the first game last Thursday, 3-9, the Swifts rallied to claim the win in Game #2 on Saturday, 3-2, in eight innings. Hamlin, which advanced deep into the playoffs in Class AA a year ago, capped the series with a 10-3 decision in the third game.






