All dairymen in the county are urged to exhibit their animals. Animals do not have to be registered to be exhibited in the local show.

Classes for the Jersey and Milking Shorthorn departments are: Bulls two years old and over, bulls under 2 years, bulls 6 mo. to 2 years; cows 3 years old and over, cows 2 years old and under 3; heifers 1 year and under 2; heifers 6 months and under 1 year and this year a new class for Dry cows has been added.

Classes for Guernseys are cows and heifers. A special Junior division for Club boys will be held. Ribbons will be given to adults and ribons and some cash money will be given Junior exhibitors.

Dairymen who have not made entries are urged to do so at the County Agent's office as soon as provided for all entries.
