Funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. C. Slaughter after which interment was made in the Plainview cemetery.



## NERVES GAVE OUT MAN-MADE SUITS

ors in Greater Demand.

Work Regarded Superior to That of Woman, Due to Certain Knack for the Work.

"This costume is the style you want, madame, but it is considerably more expensive than the one at which you have been looking," said an assistant at a big shop. "Oh, yes, the material is the same, but the cut of it is much better, and it is man-tailored throughout."

It sounded as if the last part of the sentence ought to be sufficient to explain everything, and there is no getting away from the fact that garments which are "man-tailored" have a great superiority in appearance over women's tailoring work-and, of course, are much more expensive.

It is not a matter of sex prejudice or imagination, for there are few trades which are so fully open to women as various branches of tailoring. Rather is the superiority due to the greater physical strength of men and a certain knack for the work which is natural to some men.

"Tailoring is not exactly a trade which anybody con learn," was the opinion of a leading tailor. "Highclass tailoring is a real art, and some men are born for it in the same way that others are born to paint great pictures. Very often the tailor's gift is hereditary from father to son.

"There are three main reasons why women tailors are inferior to men in the work which they turn out. Women have not sufficient physical strength to do the heavy pressing which makes or mars a garment; they cannot approach men where 'cutting' is concerned, and the general finish of women's work is not so good as that of men-in total effect rather than de-

"Until comparatively recent years tailoring was purely a man's trade, but now there are scores of women engaged upon it. The bulk of wholesale work, consisting of average price men's suits and women's costumes, is done by women, so far as the actual making is concerned. The cutting of such garments is usually done by machine.

"Certainly the superiority of the 'man tailored' suit or costume is not a fallacy. Women can do excellent work, but they are not such good tailors as men in the results they achieve. Their work is less definite. Moreover, it is a certainty that if you took a tailoring expert into a mixed crowd of men and women he would unerringly select which garments had been 'man tailored' and which were women's work."

## RUSSIANS HIT BY FAMINES

Shortages of Food Date From 1600-8,000,000 Persons Reduced to Starvation in Famine of 1911.

Next to the proletariat of India and China, the Russian peasant feels the pinch of poverty and hunger more keenly and more frequently than any other, says the National Geographic Society. One of the earliest Russian famines on record was that of 1600, with a death toll of 500,000 peasants. Cats, dogs and rats were eaten, and even the strong overcame the weak. Human flesh was sold in the markets,

Three Russian famines of recent date were among the most severe in history-in 1891, 1906 and 1911. During the ten years following the first of these, the government allotted nearly \$125,000,000 for relief, but the sums were not always judiciously expended. In 1906 the government gave 40 pounds of flour a month to all persons under eighteen years old and over fifty-nine. Those between these ages received no allowance, and the older and younger shared their pittance with the others.

The famine of 1911 extended over one-third the area of Europe and affected 30,000,000 persons, while 8, 000,000 were reduced to starvation. Weeds, the bark of trees and bitter bread made of acorns, constituted the chief diet.



#### **WORDS HAVE MANY MEANINGS**

Imagination Cuts Big Figure When Terms of More or Less Picturesqueness Are Employed.

An amusing and plausible analysis has been made of the way many people in the United States use and understand the words "ranch," "plantation" and "farm." In the imagination of easterners, says the analyst in effect, a plantation or a ranch suggests wide acres and a gentle nan on horseback riding about to oversee their cultivation by picturesque Firelings, whereas a farm suggests a comparatively small field of growing vegetables personally conducted to harvest by a plain man in overalls. Tet many a ranch or plantation is no bigger than a small farm, and many a large farm is as big as a corresponding plantation or ranch; and the word "gentleman" fits as many farmers as ranchers or planters. The farm, however, says this observer, may easily get into society by being spoken of in the plural; and all the farmer needs to do to attain this distinction is to build a fence across his land and then call it the Something-or-other Farms. Christian Science Monitor.

### Silvering Mirrors.

There are several processes for silvering mirrors, the simplest of which, perhaps, is to provide a large flat stone table and spread upon it evenly a sheet of tinfoll without crease or blemish. This is covered uniformly to a depth of one-eighth inch with mercury. The plate of glass, perfectly cleansed of all grease and impurities, is floated in the mercury carefully so as to exclude air bubbles. It is then pressed down by loading with weights in order to press out the mercury which remains fluid. After about 24 hours it may be raised on its edge to harden, and should be finished in a few weeks. Another method involves the use of a solution made as follows: Mix one ounce nitrate of silver, three ounces water, one ounce liquid ammonia and three ounces spirits of wine. Filter after solution has stood three or four hours. To every ounce of the solution add one-fourth ounce sugar dissolved in equal quantities of water and alcohol. The surface to be silvered is covered with this liquid at a temperature of 160 degrees, maintained till the deposition of silver is complete. When dry, coated surface is covered with mastic varnish.





Clay Output Falls Off.

The quality and value of the clay mined in the United States in 1919 showed a considerable decrease in output but an increase in value compared with 1917. The total quantity of clay mined and marketed as such is estimated at 2,840,000 short tons, valued at \$9,207,000, or \$3.28 a ton. This is a decrease of about 304,000 tons, or 10 per cent, in quantity, but an increase of about \$1,165,000 or 14 per cent in value. The imports decreased in both quantity and value.



BIG GOOD ROAD BOND ISSUE

Dailas County, Texas, Votes \$6,500,000 for Construction of Complete Beit Line.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The largest bond issue ever submitted in any county in Texas and one of the largest voted anywhere in the country was ratified by a big majority recently in Dallas county, Texas. It provides \$6,500,000 for a complete belt line around the county, with 12 roads radiating from Dallas to all sections and six intermediate roads connecting the radial highways. The system provides for 832 miles of road. and in addition feeder roads amounting to about one hundred miles will b? improved by the decrease in maintenance expenses. Federc'

amounting to \$250,000 had been allotted to Dallas county for its highway development, and it is expected that a large number of motortrucks will be assigned to assist in the construction work. The favorable reception of the big bond issue in this county is expected by officials of the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture, to have a favorable effect on similar proposals elsewhere. Road building in Texas is at high tide. State highway engineers estimate that more than \$20,000,000 worth of roads are now under construction.

## WIND HELPS ROAD BUILDERS

When Used in Construction of Highways in New Mexico Experiment Is Successful.

A new method of using the wind in sand-road construction has proved so successful, that, after making a ninemile experimental stretch in New Mexico, roadmakers in that state have built 80 miles of similar highways. First of all, the grass and weeds are cleared from the right of way, and then a trench is made through the sand to the clay bottom. The loose sand is deposited in stacks ten feet from either side of the cut, and the rest of the work is left to the desert winds. During the spring and fall, the winds sweep away all the sand and widen the clay strip. Then the road is graded and the work finished.



What the Railroads Collect. In 1916, a year of normal conditions, each person in the United States paid \$25 for railroad freight, a bill of \$125 annually for the average family. BALADS AND SANDWICHES FOR VARIOUS OCCASIONS.

A sandwich is never out of season, for it is the substantial part of a meal at whatever time or place it is

served. If one desires a large quantity of filling for sandwiches, the following recipe will be a good one to fol-

low. It may be easily divided. The dressing may be used on potato or other vegetable salads:

Cheese Sandwich Filling.-Mix together one cupful of sour cream, three eggs, one tablespoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of sugar, a few grains of cayenne, one teaspoonful of mustard and one teaspoonful of salt. Beat three tablespoonfuls of vinegar, hot, to the cream mixture. When cooked until it coats the spoon, set aside to cool. Put one and one-half pounds of cheese. two green peppers and two sweet red peppers through a meat chopper. Mix together, and add enough of the dressing to make the mixture spread easily. Use on thin slices of bread.

Carrot and Nut Sandwiches.-Mix together one-half cupful each of ground carrots and nuts (peanuts, walnuts or pecans may be used). Add one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-half tablespoonful of olive oil, one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Mix thoroughly and spread on slices of buttered bread.

Pressed Egg and Ham Sandwiches. -Chop fine six hard-cooked eggs, one green onion and one-half a green pepper. Mix with one-half teaspoonful of salt and one tablespoonful of prepared mustard. Place half of the mixture in a small, greased pan. Press down, then add a layer of chopped ham, using one and one-half cupfuls, finely chopped. Finish with the rest of the egg mixture; pour over two tablespoonfuls of soup stock and place in a cool place until molded enough to slice.

WHOLESOME GOOD THINGS.

Frostings for various cakes have not been the usual thing during the months of sugar shortage. The following are two desirable frostings

which may be covered and kept in a cool place for weeks and, by adding a bit of moisture or heating over water, will be ready for use:

Fondant.—This recipe has appeared before as candy foundation, but makes very satisfactory frosting. Use four cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of water and one tablespoonful of glucose. Boil until the sirup makes a soft ball when dropped in water. Set away to cool; when cool enough to bear the finger, stir until creamy. Put into a jar or bowl, cover with waxed paper and let stand until wanted. Take out what will be needed for icing, melt it over hot water, add flavoring, coloring or chocolate and spread on the cakes.

Another Frosting.--- Use confectioners' sugar and milk or cream. To two cupfuls of sugar add a tablespoonful of cream, adding a few drops more until soft enough to spread. Try it on a small cake until of the right consistency; use what is needed and cover the rest, setting it in a cool place where it will not dry out. It will keep for three weeks or longer.

Bachelor's Buttons.—Rub together four tablespoonfuls of butter and ten tablespoonfuls of flour. Divide ten tablespoonfuls of sugar; stir five into the flour and the other five into two wellbeaten eggs; flavor with anise and add to the flour mixture. Make into small walnut-sized balls, place on a buttered baking sheet and bake in a hot oven. Dip in fondant and sprinkle with nuts.

Sunshine Cake.—Take the whites of eight eggs and the yolks of six, one cupful of flour, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, salt and vanilla. Beat the volks until thick, add vanilla; beat the whites until foamy, then add the cream of tartar; finish beating, until stiff; add the sugar, a little at a time. then add yolks and fold in the flour. Bake forty-five minutes in a moderate
