COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Portales, New Mexico, Saturday, Oct. 16th, A. D., 1920.

At a called session of the Board of County Commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, held at the court house in Portales the county site of said county, the following were present, to-wit: J. S. Pearce, chairman; Ed L. Wall and Chas. S. Toler, commissioners and Seth A. Morrison, Clerk.

Whereas, by section 1977 of the Codification of the New Mexico Statutes, 1915, it is made the duty of the Boards of County Commissioners of each county, in the State of New Mexico, to proclaim the elections that are to be held in their respective counties, for the purpose of voting upon candidates for the different offices and other matters, and to do so ten days before election by Public Proclamation, in each of the two leading newspapers published in each county; and

Whereas, it is made the duty of said Board of County Commissioners to give public notice of the object of the election, the officials to be voted upon, questions to be voted on, the names of the candidates for each of said offices, as the same are on file in the office of the County Clerk and the postoffice address of each of said candidates and the place where the election is to be held in each precinct in their respective counties, also to appoint Judges for holding the election in the various precincts of their respective counties.

Now Therefore, we, the Board of County Commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, pursuant to law and the authority vested in us, do hereby Proclaim and Order an election to be held in the various precincts of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, on Tuesday, the Second day of November, A. D., 1920; the object and purpose of said election being to vote on candidates for offices hereafter mentioned, also to vote on the question "An Act Providing for the Issuance of Four Per Cent Coupon Bonds by the State of New Mexico, in the Sum of Two Million Dollars to Provide Funds for the Construction and Improvement of State Highways Providing a Tax Levy for the Payment of Interest and Principal of Said Bonds, and for Other purposes as provided in Senate Substitute Bill No. 86, as Amended."

We do further proclaim that at said election the qualified voters of said county shall vote for the following officers to be elected in the State at Large, to-wit:

MAKING WAR ON DISEASE MENACE

American Red Cross Announces Budget of \$48,200,000 For Current Year.

NEW DISASTER RELIEF PLAN

Continuance of Heavy Work Abroad Deemed Necessary to Protect United States—\$21,000,000 Less Than Last Year.

A program of relief and service toward which appropriations of \$48,200,000 have been made has been outlined for the American Red Cross for the fiscal year, July 1, 1920, to July 1, 1921, according to official announcement by national headquarters of the organization at Washington. The figures for 1920-21 are \$21,000,000 below those of 1919-20, in which \$69,400,000 was spent.

Important among the items of the budget for the present year is the appropriation of \$31,500,000 for relief in foreign lands, which includes \$11,000,000 in purchased supplies on hand and not distributed.

Must Protect United States.
 This will enable the American Red Cross to continue its humanitarian effort to aid stricken peoples to re-establish themselves, to fight the disease epidemics which threaten many countries and to efface largely the remaining traces of the blight left by the World War. It is regarded as social as well as physical sanitation on a large scale that will have a direct bearing on future conditions in America.

Central Europe, the chief sufferer from the conflict, today is facing another winter of famine, pestilence and ruin. Typhus decreased much during the summer months where last winter it had its greatest stronghold, but physicians who investigated the situation at the behest of the League of Red Cross Societies have given their unqualified opinion that this coming winter will see a recurrence on an unprecedented scale. The Red Cross feels it must continue preventive measures abroad to keep this and other deadly maladies from the United States.

Millions for Work at Home.
 When the disease was sweeping Central Europe last winter the American Red Cross, with the aid of the governments of afflicted nations, undertook the fight against it. Hospitals were established wherever possible and food and clothing were distributed to the undernourished populations, who by reason of their undernourishment were easy prey to the epidemics. Where disorganization contributed last year to the great inroads made by the disease, by virtue of its knowledge of the disease and the presence of well established hospital centers, the American Red Cross this year will undertake the work with a new confidence.

Including the total of \$11,000,000 in supplies left from the last fiscal year,

the \$31,500,000 is \$21,000,000 less than the expenditures for 1919-20.

Appropriations for domestic activities total \$16,700,000.

The largest item of this "home" budget is \$7,800,000 for civilian relief work. This includes service and assistance for families of soldiers, sailors and marines, and work incidental to disaster. Of the total appropriation for civilian relief, \$5,000,000 is held in reserve for the carrying out of actual disaster relief.

Reduced Overhead Expense.
 The Red Cross invariably is the first thought of a community visited by calamity. With this in mind, it was determined by the Executive Committee in preparing the budget of 1919-20 to have a fixed reserve fund from which to draw in these instances.

For assistance to soldiers, sailors and marines in hospitals and in camps this year \$1,900,000 has been set aside. Four million two hundred thousand dollars has been appropriated for improvement of health and prevention of disease throughout the United States during the current twelve months. The Red Cross is co-operating fully with the United States Health Service in this work and through its Junior Red Cross is doing much to spread among children the principles of sanitation. An appropriation of \$1,000,000 has been made for developing the peace time program of the Red Cross by service to its chapters in all regions.

The appropriation of \$48,200,000 is exclusive of the local expenditures of the 3,000 or more chapters.

Administration expenses this year will be \$1,800,000. Last year they were \$2,800,000.

Jack Wilcox and Mr. McDowell have two hundred forty already planted half of which is up nicely and had expected to sow a hundred sixty more but will probably not get it now. Quite an acreage is being planted in the south eastern part of the county.

The truck industry in the valley is flourishing. The potato association had to build another house this fall to take care of the increased production of potatoes. The association now has storage capacity for 47000 bushels beside the private plants. The crop is about dug and is averaging from 175 to 200 bushels per acre. The association divided itself into four districts and dug their potatoes cooperatively. It is predicted that a very much larger acreage will be planted next year. Between four and five hundred acres were planted this year.

The onion industry looks as if it would be a big thing. The onions are nearly all of the denia variety and are ranging from fifteen thousand to twenty five thousand pounds per acre. These onions are a wonder to all new comers who see them. If a satisfactory market is found for them a large acreage will be planted next year.

It is not generally realized the amount the dairy industry in the county. There are a number registered herds of dairy cows. Over \$100,000.00 dollars worth of cream was shipped out of Portales from Jan. first to Aug. 19. The Jersey Breeders Association expect to ship in a car load of Jersey heifers this fall.

The cattle industry is still the big industry of the county and the cattle are in as good a shape as they have been in years. The grade of cattle we have is a credit to any country and as a whole our cattle will compare with the pan-handle cattle. The calves are changing hands at about thirty dollars around but the depressed condition of the market is effecting the grown cattle trade.

There are a number of herds of sheep in the county all of which are very good. C'eve George has a string of 1500 that are good. The lambs were recently contracted and the buyer said they were the best bunch he had bought this year and he had handled twenty thousand.

Jordan & Horney have quite a bunch, Messrs Jett, Hendrix and Nutt, of Claudell had a good bunch, Sandy Morris of Tolor

had a string of 1800, Percival and Rocky have quite a bunch and there are a number of smaller herds. The lambs have about all been sold. The county agent had a letter from a Kansas feeder wanting to buy twelve or fifteen hundred feeders but he failed to find them in the county.

The chicken industry is far more than any one suspects. Mr. Crow advises us he paid out over eighteen thousand dollars for eggs during the year to Sept. first. Mr. Henry Holland from Rogers began the year with 536 hens and on Aug. first counted them again, when he had 498 have lost eaten and sold thirty eight of his beginning flock. During the first six months of the present year he sold \$1032.00 worth of eggs, used and set 50 dozen and now has on hands 500 pullets with which he expects to increase his flock.

From Jan. first to August 19 there was sold from this town

\$261143.00 in grain
\$9890.00 wheat
\$57800.00 livestock cattle
\$12000.00 hogs
\$100000.00 cream
\$65000.00 sweet potatoes
\$75000.00 broom corn
\$10000.00 bear grass
\$590833.00 total.

The sweet potatoes and broom corn were the entire crop of last year. The cattle sales of this year have nearly all been since the figures were collected besides there has been about as much grain shipped out as there was to that date.

A Narrow Escape

Ted Townsend while riding his bicycle Sunday evening happened to a very painful accident. In making a turn to pass a car he ran into the drill bit lying in front of the Portales hotel, thus smashing the front wheel and throwing him against a tree. He was unconscious for some time. Dr. Williams was notified of the accident and had him carried to his office where the wounds were dressed. The doctor says that there were no bones broken and the only injury was the loosening of two teeth which can probably be saved.

Peck Taylor, who is attending school at the Kentucky Valley district, came in Friday night to spend Saturday and Sunday with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Taylor.

OBJECT OF CHILD WELFARE SERVICE

Give the Children a Chance to Promote Health in School and Home

The Child Welfare service of the state of New Mexico is a service to bring about a more intensive study of children in the home and school. As the child is a citizen of tomorrow, education constantly broadening its scope and field of work to direct the future of every child toward a happy and prosperous life. The director of this department, Miss Montana Hastings, and the field organizer Miss Ida Nolds have been doing intensive work in Portales for the past week.

The different phases of the work emphasized were; Health school and home, organization of the parent teachers association that all problems concerning the child, his environment and opportunities, may come under discussion for the betterment of both child and parent. More than 20 children have been examined and suggestions given for better adjustment. Research work which is now underway at the child welfare house at Santa Fe and includes studies of individual infants and children.

Courses of study in child care given in evening classes under Smith-Hughes law.

The department expects to reach all districts, that is, the rural, town and city, as quickly as facilities in the different districts and at headquarters can be arranged for.

Every child has his birth right which gives him the right to opportunities open to all children alike. It is the aim of this department to direct the way for a clearer understanding of the full development of every child.

Floyd, N. Mex. has had the work of the organization for several weeks, which will lead to the installation of a permanent worker.

During the week all of the consolidated schools of Roosevelt county have been visited as preliminary steps for acquainting the districts with the work.

NATIONWIDE FIGHT AGAINST DISEASE

American Red Cross Will Have Health Centers in All Parts of United States.

The American Red Cross has launched upon a nation wide campaign of fighting disease and physical defect among the American people. A new and unique health institution has come into being as the result of several months' study by the Red Cross Health Service Department at National Headquarters.

Officials in charge of the department predict that before long this new health activity will be in actual operation all over the country, and that the sign—"American Red Cross Health Center"—will become as familiar to the people everywhere as are now the signs of the telegraph companies.

Busy Long Before War.

The interest of the American Red Cross in the fight against disease is not, however, of recent origin. Long before the war the organization began this health service through its medical units in disaster relief work and its department of Town and County Nursing. During the war and following the armistice thousands of American Red Cross officials have been fighting disease in the war-stricken countries. At the same time tens of thousands of local Red Cross officials have been engaged at home fighting disease, notably during the influenza epidemics.

The American Red Cross has determined that all this valuable experience in health service abroad and at home shall not go to waste. So long as there are a half a million people dying yearly in this country from preventable causes, and so long as more than one-third of the American children and young people are victims of physical defects, the Red Cross recognizes the urgent need for continued Red Cross health service at home.

How Organization Works.

The Red Cross Health Center is governed by business principles, applies business methods, and, in its more simple form, can be established and conducted by lay people.

It proceeds upon the demonstrated fact that health is a commodity that can be bought and sold like brooms and soap. Therefore, it establishes itself in a storeroom in the principal business section of the community. It displays its goods in the form of attractive health exhibits in its show windows. It advertises constantly and extensively. And it uses every business and social device to attract customers.

The Red Cross Health Center is of

service to the sick in that it gives out reliable and complete information about existing clinics, hospitals, sanatoria and other institutions for the sick and the defective; about available nurses, both trained and practical; about when to consult a physician and why to shun the quack and his nostrums.

Teaching Disease Prevention.

The Red Cross Health Center is, however, of even greater service to the well. It teaches people how to prevent sickness and disease. This is done in many interesting and attractive ways—first of all, by the distribution of popular health literature and through health lectures illustrated with lantern slides or with health motion picture films. Then special exhibits are given, one after the other, on various health subjects. Practical demonstrations are made; also health playlets by children to interest and instruct themselves and their elders. Classes are organized in personal hygiene, home care of the sick, first aid and in food selection and preparation. Health clubs, both for younger and older people, are formed; also Little Mothers' Leagues. Nutrition and growth clinics are conducted for children.

Already more than a hundred of these Red Cross Health Centers are in actual operation throughout the country. Many of them also conduct medical clinics, but the one chief, outstanding feature of the American Red Cross Health Center is its health education service which teaches well people how to keep well.

FRENCH PRAISE FOR OUR RED CROSS WORK

Lauding the work accomplished by American philanthropy for war-stricken France, Andre Tardieu, former high commissioner from that nation to the United States, in a recent article widely commented on throughout the French press, says:

"The American Red Cross has accomplished a work which calls for the heartfelt gratitude of every true Frenchman. In 1918 this great relief organization spent in behalf of France nearly 87,000,000 francs, and in 1919 its expenditures on charitable projects in our country attained the tremendous total of 171,000,000. It has recently turned over to the French relief organizations huge stocks of supplies whose value must be counted in the hundreds of thousands of francs.

"Fifteen million American boys and girls, banded together in the Junior Red Cross of America, are back of a movement to establish the closest ties between themselves and France's younger generation through the charitable works they have financed, and are now carrying out among our little war sufferers.

"The bonds of friendship between France and America is cemented with mutual admiration, respect and gratitude."
