HOME INDUSTRIES

ECONOMIC LESSONS TAUGHT BY EDITORS OF MANY PAPERS.

COMBATTING A COMMON EVIL

Practices of Sending Dollars from Communities Where Earned Helps Along the Centralization of Business.

Apparently the press is now fully aroused to the importance of combatting the evils of patronizing other than home enterprises. Editorial and local columns of the papers, especially in the western states, are filled with common-sense articles setting before the people such facts as appeal to reason and patriotism. Some editors in their zeal to accomplish good, perhaps go too far in abuse of systems that take money from their neighborhoods, and by severe criticisms of patrons of outof town concerns "overshoot the mark" and fail to accomplish what is

None will gainsay that the wage-

earner has the inherent right to spend his earnings wherever he desires. If he wishes to buy his clothes in some distant city, he has that privilege Sometimes he may have cause to do so. His home merchants may not carry in stock what he wishes to se cure. Others may charge him what he considers an exorbitant price. Quite often he may learn that he makes a mistake by buying goods without a careful examination of them. When this is the case-and i frequently is-the purchaser becomes a better patron of home institutions than ever before. But there are a few things that the average man and woman overlook. It is that the dollars that they send away means money taken out of local circulation, and the consequent impoverishing of the community to that extent. Say that there are 2.000 people in the community. Five dollars a year from each one sent afar amounts to \$10,000 a year, and in ten years \$100,000. Supposing that a fifth or sixth of this represented the profits that should be left in the community. It would be quite enough to establish a business enterprise that would support several famlies. But from some communities the average amounts sent away for goods is from a third to a half and often more than the total paid or needed supplied. Think of what a great loss that is! Think that this trade, given to the home town, would immediately increase its business from a third to a half! How many years would it take if the home trade principle was adhered to strictly before your town would be more than double in size! It would only require a very few years. And with the growth of the town everyone living within its limits

and its trade radius would receive a benefit. All the residents of a community have common interest in it. The laborer, the farmer, the merchant, the doctor and the lawyer prosper in common. Their interests are parallel. The community is cooperative. If the merchant employed men from some distant city to do his work, would patronize an out-of-town doctor and the town doctor send away for the help he needed, the laborer would suffer, and suppose that the laborers would send away for their eggs, their vegetables, fruit, butter, etc., would pot the farmer be affected? Suppose that the merchant is compelled to do business without profit; can be pay as good wages to his help as they should be entitled to? So it goes down the line. The better the home town can be made, the better it is for all. Be a patron of home industry. and by being such you assist yourself and all in your neighborhood.

> D. M. CARR. MISUSE OF THE MAILS.

How the Law Reads Under Which the Postal Department Excludes Frauds.

Section 5480 revised statutes of the of the mails reads as follows: "Any person, who having devised or intend ed to devise any scheme or artifice to defraud or to be affected by either opening or intending to open correspondence or communication with any other person whether resident within or without the United States, by reason of the post office establishment of the United States or by inciting such other persons to open communication with the person so devising or intending, and for executing such scheme or artifice, or attempting to do so, shall place any letter or package in any post office of the United States, or take or receive therefrom. such persons so misusing the mails shall be punishable by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500) and imprisonment of not more than eighteen (18) months, or by both such punishments.

Why kill off the business of the local town and help make wealthier the proprietors of the big concerns in the great cities? Does

this question call for an answer?

HOW SCHEMERS WORK.

Cooperative Plane Used to Get Dollars from the People of the Country.

Financiering or promoting has become a particular science. This new science has taken the broad name of "system," and to "system" is attributed a Machiavellism that would make insignificant the chicanery of the noted Italian diplomat. At present the nation is treated to illustrations of the methods of the advocates of "system" through the magazine articles, and the disclosures made of the transactions of many big concerns which have been investigated by the courts.

When simmered down, it will be seen that it is by use of money contributed by the masses of people, and placed in the control of the few that the masters of finance are enabled to rob and build up at will, give and take, and let the people go to the bow-

It is not the intention herein to deal

particularly with the gigantic institutions, but to show how the principles employed by them are also brought into use by promoters of schemes of lesser degree. And here an anomaly presents itself, plainly showing how short-sighted the masses of people are. the small-caliber schemers who apply 'system" use as their main props the cry of "trust" and "robbers." Well they know the cupidity of the masses. and by presenting what appears a plausable scheme of cooperation get from out the pockets of the people money with which to carry on business. This plan of working is generally a stock-selling scheme, a membership plan with promise of selling goods at wholesale prices, and the paying of large dividends. A number of such concerns have lately come into existence. Some of them have such mammoth things in view that if their plans could be successfully carried out, it would be the building up of greater he left—an he was here two or three monopolies than those that they hold up before the people as justification of their own existence

Do not be deceived by the representations made by alleged cooperators. A close investigation will show that instead of a purely cooperative plan, it is a scheme simply with the object of getting from the people money with which to carry on business for the personal gain of a few. Don't invest money in any alleged cooperative store or concern located in the large cities, and of which you know nothing other than the representations made it is a poor scheme that does not carry with all appearances of soundness, for that. Only a man like meself." this is essential to the success of it.

WANDERING WEARY WILLIES.

Towns by Adopting Proper Ordinances Can Assist in Decreasing Vagrancy.

Like unto the poor, the tramps and the "hoboes" it seems, we have "with us always." With the coming of winter they drift from the north to the south. The torrid heat of summer finds them wending their way to the northern climate. While for the last decade of years prosperity has been universal throughout the United States, and employment for all willing to work, still the wandering, lonely, unfortunate, remain as an object lesson of ignorance and indolence. Still America conditions are such and local laws have tended toward bettering the conditions of these "Weary Willies," and we find year after year their number is decreasing. They are the unfortunates of humanity. Men with morbid mentalities, with criminal instincts developed that make them a menace to the public. There is the harmless tramp, a proper place for him should be in the home for feebleminded; there is the indolent/framp. with all mental faculties developed whose place should be in the workhouse, and there is also the wandering vampire, who is the criminal at heart and whose proper place should be in the penitentiary. If towns should have ordinances regulating the employment of those within its confines, and if such ordinances are properly framed so as to impose a penalty upon the vagrant who mayhaps visit the place, it will soon be found that such towns will be avoided and the troublesome United States pertaining to illegal use visitors to the community will seek fields elsewhere.

Uncound Cooperative Concerns

"Self-preservation is one of the first laws of nature," wrote some thinker ong ago, and time has failed to prove it untrue. Yet how many commit involuntary suicide by unwisely following the instructions of some quack doctor in their efforts to cure themselves of some allment? And how many more bring to themselves financial ruin by wild speculation in schemes that they know little about, prompted by glittering promises of great returns for little money. Lately numerous alleged cooperative mercantile establishments have sprung up in large cities and are seeking the support of farmers throughout the country. Don't take the advice of the "quack doctor" and commit financial suicide by investing in them and giving them your patronage instead of the business place of your own town.

Progressive Farmers.

The average American farmer is a rogressive mortal. He is always ready to learn new things. He lately realizes more than ever the necessity of education in his business. He no longer ignores the fact that science is a wonderful factor in his work, a money saver that must be considered if he succeed. The more intelligent is the farmer, the more interest will he take in the furthering the interests of improving the community in general.

Manganese Ores.

The United State Geological Survey's report on the production of mangan ores in 1906 records separately the production of relatively pure manga-nese ore carying forty per cent. or more of metallic manganese and the production of manganiferous iron ores carrying from twenty to forty per cent.

During 1906 the production of manganese ores amounted to 6,921 long tons, valued at \$88,132, an increase of 2,803 tons, or 63.1 per cent., in quantity, and of \$51,918, or 143.4 per cent. in value over the production of 1905. which was 4,118 long tons, valued at \$36,214. All of this increase is due to large reported increases in the output of Virginia and Utah, for no other states produced any notable quantity

Of manganiferous iron ores, mined in Arkansas and Colorado, 41,300 long tons were produced, valued at \$122,400, as against 49,158 long tons, valued at \$117,139, in 1905. In addition to these ores 93,461 long tons of manganiferous zinc residuum, valued at \$1 a ton, were produced at zinc oxide works using New Jersey ores, against 90,289 tons, or equal value per ton, in 1905.

HOW TO DYE LACE.

Methods That Will Not Injure the Most Delicate Fabrics.

To make a dye for laces put the tube paint into gasoline and stir until the former is dissolved, then test the shade by dipping in a scrap of the sample. If too dark, add more gasoline, but if the shade is too light put in more paint. Dip the lace up and down in the bath with a pair of bonbon Wilson L. Collins, Elkhart, Ind., tongs until the desired tint is obtained. Then shake the lace out and let it dry. Then press on the wrong side with a warm flatiron. Pull the lace very gently to give the new effect. Ribbons may be dyed in the same way, but should not be washed before dyeing with the oil paint. If they are creased press by passing a dampnot wet-sponge over until smooth, then dye. Feathers, such as quills and wings, may be dyed in the same way. Ostrich feathers, too, will respond to the same treatment, while for faded artificial flowers the method is admirable.

The gasoline and oil paint solution may be described as a dry dyeing, in the same way as cleaning with gasoline is spoken of as dry cleaning. The goods not touching water are almost like new again, hence its value over the water cleansing.

Eevery one knows that a cream tint may be given to lace by dipping in weak tea, but every one does not know that Ceylon tea will give a prettier, clearer tint than any other brand. A cube of sugar dissolved in the tea will give the required stiffening.

TO WASH SHEEPSKIN RUGS.

Renovating Treatment That Will Make Them Look Like New.

Sheepskin rugs, according to an expert, may be washed at home with comparative ease, when one knows how. The skin or pelt side should not be wet at all, and to prevent this the rug is tacked around a stout barrel. Choose a sunny day, and with a clean scrubbing brush and plenty of hot suds in which a good washing powder has been dissolved scrub the rug thoroughly. Afterward spray well with clear water, using a hose with show er nozzle for this, if possible, in order to have a strong, penetrating stream. Leave the rug on the barrel to dry in the sun, combing it out now and again with a clean currycomb, to prevent matting of the wool. The rug should come out after this treatment beautifully white and fluffy.

Delicious Crullers.

Crisp, home-made crullers are dainoughly delicious ones with the unusual addition of nuts, allow three eggs, three tablespoonfuls of milk, six of sugar and of melted butter. Two cupfuls of flour, one saltspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of baking powder and half a cupful of English pecans or walnuts chopped fine. Beat the eggs well without separating, then add the milk, sugar and butter. Sift the flour with the salt and baking powder and add to the mixture. Stir in the nuts, turn the dough out on a flour pastry board and roll out to the thickness of three-quarters of an inch. Cut into shape and fry in deep smoking hot fat. If, on turning dough out on the board, it is not stiff enough to roll add flour as may be required.

Creole Egg Plant. For six persons, three egg plants; slice one inch thick; lay them in salt water two hours. Sauce.-In a deep iron pot, one cooking spoon of olive oil, four cloves of sarlic cut fine; let brown; then six or eight large tomatoes, or one large can, half pound of olives, half pound capers, a pint of water, salt and pepper to taste; let simmer for one hour, then fry egg plants in hot lard, then drop them in sauce, simmer for one hour. Serve with grated Italian cheese.

Keeping Lettuce Fresh. When lettuce is placed on the table there is often considerable left. In order to keep it fresh for another meal. place it in a damp cloth and set it in the refrigerator. If it is not used on the following day, dampen the cloth again and rewrap the lettuce. You will be surprised to find how long lettuce can be kept from wilting. Even at the close of a week, the salad will taste as though it had just been picked. This plan is also good for celery.

Dry Bread Omelet.

Break dry bread into small crumbs and soak in milk and water until a mush. Beat in two eggs, half teaspoon ful sait, one-fifth cup sugar. Let stand half an hour. Beat again and fry in hot butter, being careful to keep the frying pan in motion, as you would a corn popper. When thoroughly browned turn and brown the other side also.

Pumpkin Marmalade. Seven pounds pumpkins; five pounds sugar; three lemons. Pare the pumpkins and slice in small pieces. Do this at night and cover with the sugar and lemon juice. In the morning you will find plenty of strup in which to cook your pumpkin. Boil down as for any other marmalade and you will be delighted with the result.

A Very Useful Knife. There is an odd knife, one end o which pares vegetables and fruit quickly, and economically takes the eyes and spots out. The other end is used to slice vegetables for soup, or potatoes for frying.

House-Cleaning Hint. When renovating the house or apartment, all polished furniture should be carefully wiped over with a cloth wrung out of lukewarm vinegar-andwate -- half a tencupful to a gal's.

The King system of ventilation re moves the lower layer of air, but does not permit the warm air to escape. In a well constructed stable this insures a rapid change of air without unduly lowering the temperature. Outlet flues are built tight, usually

of lumber, beginning eight or ten inches from the floor and extending higher than the ridge of the roof to insure a good draft at all times. When made of metal, ice is liable to form on the inner walls. One such flue is sufficient for a small or medium sized stable, while a very large one would probably be better served with two flues some distance apart.

The proper capacity of the outlet flue is determined by the total weight of live stock in the stable, figuring one each 5,000 pounds of live stock.

For instance, if the stock weighs about 20,000 pounds, four square feet would be required, which could be furnished by one flue two feet square, or by two flues 12x24 inches each Each flue should be provided with a when a strong wind prevails. The stable should have an opportunity to flow along the floor to an outlet flue. close beside a cow, she could be protected from draft by a partition several

feet high and as long as the cow Fresh air is admitted through the small flues at the walls, which compe the ceiling, where it meets the heat and becomes warmed. This arrangement prevents the warm air from flowing out, inasmuch as it will not travel downward against the colder,

At present I don't know how important the inlet flues are, as I have seen apparently satisfactory results where only the outlet flues were used, and I would urge every dairyman to install the latter and follow directions

Heat in a stable represents food so during the winter we can't afford to waste it. It should be utilized to the fullest extent in warming fresh air. should not be permitted to flow, eak or be conducted out. That implies a tight ceiling, tight walls, preferably with one or more dead air spaces or some other good insulation.

RECIPE FOR CHILI SAUCE.

Better Than Any Variety to Be Found in the Stores.

A chili sauce is made by a western housekeeper, which will be found much better than any ready-made variety to be had in the shops.

Chep fine six large green peppers from which the seeds and white pulp have been removed, and four large onions. Cut into small pieces 24 large ripe tomatoes. Put them together in a kettle, mix thoroughly, and add three tablespoonfuls of salt, eight tablespoonfuls of brown sugar, six cups of vinegar, two teaspoons of cinnamon and one of cloves. Boil it gently one hour, then seal in pint cans.

Following is a cucumber pickle recipe: Pare and slice two dozen cucumbers and one dozen small onions. Sprinkle them with sait, and allow them to drain well in a colander. Then place them in a bowl, adding one quart of vinegar, one cup of offive oil, onequarter of a cup each of black and white mustard seed, one teaspoonful of celery seed and one-quarter teaspoonful of powdered alum. Mixthoroughly and seal in pint cans.

GOOD PICKLE OF TOMATOES.

Can Be Made of the Green or Ripe Variety, as Desired.

While tomatoes are procurable, a very good pickle may be made from the recipe of an old New England housekeeper.

Chop one peck of green tomatoes and arrange them in layers in a stone crock, sprinkling each layer with salt

Saited Almonds

First put the almonds after they have been shelled into boiling water until the skins can readily be removed. Dry earefully. Put a piece of butter in a pan and while melting stir in the almouds glaze. Then place the pan in the oven. Be careful and stir often so as to color the nuts without scorch-When slightly brown take them spread on white paper and sprinkle with table salt. They should be eaten coid. A plain salad of lettuce with French dressing may be served before the dessert.

Care of House Plants.

Don't be afraid to scrub the plants brought in for the winter. With a brush, water, soap and an infusion of tobacco every leaf and stem should be scrubbed to remove insects. The bathroom spray is excellent to use in rinsing, which should be thorough. A frequent drenching and occasional meals of flower food will make up to the plants for the loss of outdoor life and they will repay with vigorous growth and bloom during the winter

Crumpets.

Take one quart of dough from the bread in the early morning, break three eggs, separating whites from yolks, whip both to a light froth, mix into the dough and gradually add lukewarm water till the consistency of griddle cakes. Beat well and let rise till breakfast time, then have the grid-

The material will fall into perfect folds and can be straightened by drawing firmly from top to bottom when it is ready to put into garment.
