



They Practically Have the Same Feed ing Value Pound for Pound.

The weight of oats per bushel varies from 30 pounds to 50 and even 55 pounds in some of the western irrigated states. The office of experiment stations notes an experiment on three pair of Percheron horses which were

The practical results of this experiment seem to indicate that pound for pound, the light oats have nearly the same feeding value as the heavy oats Although the heavy oats contain higher percentage of protein, and can bohydrates and a less percentage of fiber than the light oats, it seems probable that the relative proportions of these constituents are such that they are more easily and thoroughly di-

It should be remembered that alequal, pound for pound, they are not equal, quart for quart, and that in feeding by measure, as is usual, allowance should be made for heavy oats and a

less portion given. Since oats are bought and sold by weight instead of measure, there seems to be no gain made in buying the heavy oats at an advanced price over the light oats.

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

If you wanted a coachman, or a groom, you would hardly engage one who had never seen a horse. If you did, and your stock were badly cared for and yourself run away with, you would be laughed at if you blamed your incompetent retainers. Yet this is just what is done by housekeepers in regard to servants, says the New York Weekly. It is as unreasonable to expect women to cook or do other housework before learning how as to expect a man to build a house or manage horses without any instruction or experience. What is needed is a school for servants, or a system of apprenticeship, or some other means of training them to household work be-

The New Mexico Historical Society at Santa Fe has recently obtained a very interesting addition to that branch of its collections which illustrates the Spanish settlement and occupation by securing a number of metates and the accompanying "mano stones used in grinding corn, from the first Spanish settlement made under

Onate in July, 1598. This was at the place on the west bank of the Rio Grande just above the mouth of the Chama river, called by the Indians Yunque and christened by the Spaniards, San Gabriel; and which was the capital until the removal to Santa Fe about six years later. It is close to the present Chamita station on the Denver and Rio Grande railroad, directly opposite the Indian pueblo of San Juan. The metates are massive affairs of hard stone but the mano stones have been broken during

the lapse of time. The society has also obtained a remarkable and entirely unique specimen of Indian carving on a stone which has long been one of the treasured antiquities of the pueblo of Sandia. This is in the form of a human face very delicately carved in low re lief and bearing the marks of the wear of ages.

A WEALTH-SAPPING SYSTEM.

New Public Utilities Managed in Way That Retards Progress.

It should be borne in mind that the investment of outside capital, the ownership of public and semi-public utilities by others than residents of a community, is a serious thing for the people residing in the place. In western cities there are hundreds of illustrations of the working out of this plan of securing public utilities. There is need of a water-works. Outsiders come into the field with a proposition. The city or town council is approached and the final result is that a franchise covering 25 to 50 years is granted. The works are built. People are then compelled to pay highest rates to meet interest on bonds and watered stocks. The company perhaps pays taxes less proportionately than the residents of the town are compelled to pay, and the only money left in the community that is earned by the peration of the plant are the taxes paid, the wages of the few laborers employed, and the salaries that a few straw" officers draw. All the profits are drawn to the owners of the plant some other city, generally Wall street. New York. Thus is built up a system that draws the money earned in the community to some other place. It is the same with street-car systems, electric and gas lighting plants and all other semi-public and public utilities under private ownership, and in which outside capital is chiefly in-

Should these utilities be owned by home capital, all the earnings would be retained in the community, to seek investment in other improvements and the people would receive a general benefit. There is no argument that can prove that foreign ownership of any enterprise is good for a commu-Any system, it matters not whether in a commercial line, financial or other branch, that takes from a community the earnings of the people someone to take the leading part. and uses them for the enrichment of other sections, is a wrong system.

True Principle in Advertising.

According to the most careful estimates, the volume of business done by the mail order houses in the United States amounts to more than one billion of dollars annually. When it is considered that 20 years ago there were no mail order systems of business as now known, and that since then the plan has been developed, it becomes evident to the thinker that there is magic in advertising, for it is by advertising alone that the mail order business has been built up. It would perhaps be fatal for the small merchant in the agricultural cities and towns to follow the plans, the distorted and exaggerated advertising methods of the department stores and the mail order houses. Yet there is a principle in advertising that ever holds good. This principle is as sound for the little merchant, the dealer in any kind of wares, as it is for the biggest concern on earth.
