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

WINTER WHEAT CROP

HE REALIZED \$38 PER ACRE. HIS OATS \$37 PER ACRE IN SOUTH-ERN ALBERTA, WESTERN

Coaldale, Alta, Can., Nov. 19, 1907. Sir: I beg to say that this year we had 349 acres of grain, consisting of 197 acres of spring wheat and 152 acres of oats. The average yield of wheat was 38 bushels per acre and oats 74 bushels. We were offered \$1.00 per bushel for wheat and 50 cents for oats, making the acre values for the two crops \$38.00 and \$37.00 respectively.

We also had 50 tons of hay worth \$13.00 per ton, and 500 bushels of potatoes, worth 60 cents per bushel, the latter off 21/2 acres of ground.

Our best yields this year were 107 cres of wheat, making 41 bushels per acre at \$1. 00 per bushel, would be \$41.00 per acre; 47 acres of oats, yielding 95 bushels per acre were sold for 50 cents per bushel. Proceeds, \$47.00

I might add that 50 acres of our oats were "stubbled in."

During the spring of 1906, we hired about 300 acres broken by steam. We put in and harvested 55 acres of grain last year, did the remainder of our breaking, worked up the ground and seeded this year's entire crop, put in seven acres of alfalfa and five acres of garden potatoes, trees, etc., all with one four-horse team. During harvest we hired other teams, but, aside from this, and part of the breaking, the one team did the work of raising practically 19,000 bushels of grain, worth \$12,000.



As soon as the foundation has been finished and the breast of the reservoir has been built twenty-five to fifty feet high, the dam will be put in use. In order to get the work under way, the first step to be taken in its construction to begin within the coming sixty days, will be a diverting of the waters of the river, so that the excacation can begin for the foundation When the waters have been turned aside, the work will begin on the floodgate end and men will start with immense steam shovels and dredges to dig ninety feet below the river had to bedrock It will be at least nine months before the concrete work will begin. This dam will be the greatest in the world even larger than the famous Assouan dam in the valley of the Nile.

Each of the locks has a floor sloping downward and a similar vaulted roof. When a barge is to be conveyed across the Alps it is carried out in the following manner. It is brought into the west lock and the doors closed behind it. The lock is then filled with water The bottom of the lock is given a very slight upward inclination and is laid with a set of rails on which is a carriage. To this the barge is made fast and as fast as the lock fills with water the barge, on its carriage, glides up the slope. When it reaches the level of the next lock the operation is repeated.

Sig. Caminada places two such tubes alongside one another, one for the up and the other for the down that the water which runs out of one fills the other. It realizes a great economy of water

The tubular canals are only used when the ground requires it.

On the level stretches an open canal is constructed. Of these canals only the one which ascends has locks, the other is built as a running stream. down which the barges glide rapidly. When the Splungen pass is reached a ten-mile tunnel will be constructed.

The canal is to begin at Genoa and will run to Milan via Pavia and Alessandrie. communal buildings can be found towers and lookouts, with small winpart of the main building, but occasionally they are detached and stand off at some distance, and are built sufficiently high to afford a view of the country on all sides.

One of these remarkable structures has been found in Navajo canyon, which is included within the Mesa Verde National park, in southwestern Celorado. The tower still stands on of a sandstone cone about 30 feet high and is perfectly cylindrical. By the aid of steps worn in the stone it is possible to climb to the tower and even to walk around it. The walls are 24 inches thick and, although their original height is not known, those now in place are over nine feet high. This tower arising from the bottom of the canvon to an elevation about the surrounding rim, commanded a view of the adjacent mesa Tunnels with Opposite Inclinations. from which warnings of an approaching enemy could be sent out to the ciff dwellers in the canvon below

Another remarkable lookout is "Gib raltar House," in Ruin canyon, just across the Colorado-Utah line from the Mesa Verde National park. Like the round tower of Navajo canyon, this structure overlooked great distances, preventing a surprise from an approaching enemy.

Considering the fact that about the only known weapons these pre-historic people used were the bow and arrow and a spear-like implement the necessity for the great fortresses and thick walls is quite unexplainable.

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

Test of the Gyroscope.

A practical test of the use of the gyroscope for steadying vessels at sea was made recently in England on the Seebar, formerly a first-class German torpedo boat, with a displacement of 56.2 tons. The apparatus installed consists of a heavy fly-wheel rotating about an axis, and carried by a frame which can oscillate about a horizontal axis, the oscillating motion of the frame being checked by brakes. The wheel is 40 inches in diameter, weighs 1,106 pounds, makes 1,600 revolutions per minute, and is steam driven. The periphery is provided with blades and works like a turbine, the wheel being inclosed like a casing. In the tests with the gyroscope out of action the roll was 14 degrees, while the boat was kept steady with the machine acting.
