The history of Armenia is not cheerful reading. With the exception of occasional brief periods, the Armenians have been almost continually under some foreign rule. Assyrians, Babylonians, Medes, Persians, Macedonians, Romans, Parthians, Saracens, Mongols and Turks have each in turn dominated the country, and of all these successive foreign yokes, the present one, that of the Turks, has been the longest and the heaviest. The highest activities of the Armenian people to-day are not to be found in Armenia proper, but rather in the marts of prominent cities the world over. This is especially noticeable in Constantinople, Smyrna and other cities of the Levant, where the marked aptitude of the Armenian in business enables him practically to dominate the commercial situation. One example is the Oriental rug trade, which is practically controlled by Armenians, not only in the east itself, but also in many western countries.

A judge down in Kings county, New York, has issued what may be an effective mandamus against Black-Handers. He received a letter threatening his life, the writer evidently being one who had taken umbrage at the court's dealing with criminals. Thereupon the judge applied for and received a permit to carry a revolver. As the judge is a crack shot and the winner of a number of medals for sharpshooting he thinks he can hold his own with anyone who has murderous designs against him. A little more of the same sort of determination might tend to decrease greatly the cowardly Black Hand business.

Bill For Mountain Road.

Delegate W. H. Andrews has intro duced in the House of Representatives a bill appropriating the sum of \$35,000 for the construction of a public highway in the Sacramento mountains in southern New Mexico. The full text of the bill follows:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the secretary of the treasury be, and he is hereby authorzed and directed to expend out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$35,000, for he construction of a road across the national forest in the Sacramento mountains, in the Territory of New Mexico.

"Section 2. That the construction of said road shall be placed in the charge and under the direction of the secretary of agriculture."

Sheriff Cleofes Romero sat on the restrum at the West Las Vegas city Republican convention this afternoon and with a big six-shooter frowning on the crowd, compelled ever delegate to come forward and be searched, and a fine collection of revolvers and knives was secure. This was rendered nec essary by the bitterness of the contest over nomination of a ticket for tomor row's election.

The convention itself broke all rec ords in political history here. Dr. M. F. Desmarais' faction was opposing the faction of Secundino Rom ero, the latter present mayor and the

former desirous to succeed him.

The Romero faction captured the chairman. Instantly the Desmarais if there is an opportunity offered him men leaped to their feet and with jeers to advance he should grasp it. rushed to one side of the hall, where they attempted to hold a rump convention. They were ejected fighting every inch of the way.

Then they wrote out their own ticket and ran for the clerk's office, hoping to file it and have it made the official record. Getting wind of this the Romero men met them at the clerk's counter and a bloody fight was waged, during which the ticket was torn up.

He must not think that youthfulness is a bar to the performance of duty or to as suming positions that riper years may perhaps have been associated with Others may smile and deride but remember it is ability that counts, and tenacity and perseverance that wins Authority makes easy the work.

Among these of the present who have achieved mightily and who occupy prominent places in the commer cial world, and in the arts, are young men of talent and energy. The inclination of these later days is to seek the young and the energetic to fill places of responsibility. No longer is age considered the chief requirement for high places. At the heads of the corporations will be found men of no advanced years. In the great bankng institutions young men will be found to be the most active forces. In the army no longer is age considered worthy of high office, but rather merit. So it is with every profession or vo-

Accompanying other essentials should be stability of character. Too ften it is found that of the ones who go to the front, while all qualities necessary for the work are in evidence, weakness of character, the in clination to soar socially and to seek recreation in ways that are vain and unworthy, causes a downfall. Our peni tentiaries are filled with penitents, with men whose careers were full of promise and brightness, and who had responsibility placed upon them, but had been unfaithful to their trusts Then it is not all in ability, in selfconfidence and energy to accomplish, but it is honesty and integrity and a keen sense of right, and right doing that assures greatest success. BUSINESS EXPERTS

self-styled business experts have come

into existence. They are apparently

the outgrowth of the advertising school. They are business-builders. men with ideas, and ready to dispense services at so much per dispense. One of the reasons why this class of experts exists is the lack of proper business education on part of merchants. Were the average retailer the well-informed man that he should be there would be little field for the business specialist. It behoves the business man these days to be in the front rank of the well informed or he is likely to be in the front rank of bankrupts. There is hardly a middleground. One may be a plodder for a while, but it sooner or later becomes evident that the retailer or the jobber or the man in any branch of business who does not keep up to advanced methods is supplanted by some one more enterprising. Close estimates show that advertising in country papers has increased fully 20 per cent. the past five years This shows that the merchants are realizing how important it is to advertise, and also shows that there is merit in the right kind of use of printers' ink, or there would be a decrease instead of a continual increase. There can be no doubt that the inroads of the mail order houses into trade in different parts of the country have aroused merchants to the necessity of

more extensive advertising. One of the things that has no doubt stimulated advertising is the practice of many manufacturers supplying dealers with electrotypes and ready prepared advertising. There can be no doubt the trade papers have been important mediums in the matter of influencing merchants to do more and better advertising. It matters not how the change has been wrought, but it is a fact that advertising patronage of the country newspaper publishers has been increased about 20 per cent. in five years. This means that the mer chants are getting their eyes open and are on the right path for the protection of their interests.

Now is the time to start at work on spring and summer advertising. There will be a heavy trade the coming seasons. The people have abundance of ready cash and they are anxious to spend some of it for things that they want. The live merchant is going to get his share of it.

He is going to get just a little more if he sets out right and does a little judicious advertising. When we say little we mean that he must use liberal space and fill it with the right kind of ideas, of attention attractors. Start in early. Take time in studying out just what you want. You should have ideas that are worth trying out, some opinions in regard to goods that you carry and want to shove. When you have carefully weighed the matter, take your printer into your confidence and tell him that he must do his best to get the ideas in the right kind of shape. Too often good advertisements fall flat because the printer has no knowledge or lacks the means of setting up an attractive advertisement. It will pay the liberal advertiser to adopt the methods the great concerns in the cities follow. Have a certain style of type to use exclusively in your advertising. If the printer is too poor to get it for you, it might be a good investment for you to secure it yourself and for your sole use. It will be different from the others, and the people will notice it. It will be a kind of advertising trade mark for you.

OUT FOR THE CASH.

Organizations Which Prey Upon the Business People as Well as Others.

Now and then comes the news of he formation of some new-fangled organization. Many of them are designed to do away with established systems of business. Most of them are schemes devised by insincere persons who think that they can make some easy money through the work. Plans proposed are of the most impractical and visionary kind. Note long since what was known as the "South Dakota" plan was undertaken, and it involved a complete revolution of established business methods. It was proposed to have the backing of Standard Oil interests to the extent of \$20,000,000, and with this great amount establish supply houses in large cities, issue immense catalogues with the names of merchants who would use them, and supply all these merchants with the goods listed. It was a brilliant scheme. Should such a plan become operative and successful, it would be the building up of a mammoth monopoly to fight the retailers of the land or compel them to become merely agents of the concern. There is only one way to fight the tradeaway from home evil, and that is by educating the people to the fact that the system is wrong, is unjust and contrary to economic laws; that the farmer and the laborer who patronize other than home enterprises is working against his own interests. This is a tedious process. It is an expensive thing to do, and the only way it can be done is by the liberal use of printer's ink, by utilizing the home papers that are as deeply interested in the building up of the home town and community as the merchants, the bankers

and as the farmers should be. Our Common Protector.

Did you ever think that the government is a great obliterator of prize schemes, premium games, adulterated foods, etc.? It surely is, and the time is not far off when it will take a hand in the methods of selling goods, and let it be hoped cut out such schemes as ccupons and the premiums in general. Fraud one way is just as bad as fraud some other way. The lottery principle involves the plan of making fore the race and absolutely the a great majority contribute toward the payment of sums to a mighty small minority. The average premium scheme works with more certainty. It means that all the users of goods with which premiums are given must contribute towards paying for prizes which only about 30 or 40 per cent. of the users of the goods receive. There are two ways of heading off the premium deal: One is to educate the merchants and the consumers to the truth that the premium racket is a plan that works against their interests, and the other is to have the government prohibit the plan. The former is a hard proposition to handle, and perhaps the latter is equally so but it is more certain and would be more effective.

BEST USE OF DISINFECTANT'S.

Knowledge That Every Good House keeper Should Have.

Every household needs disinfecting and the proper use of the ordinary deodorizers is knowedge that every good housekeeper should have. Not only do these useful things make a house pleasanter to live in, but they also make it healthful. So many good disinfectants are on the market at the present time that there is, a wide choice for the careful woman. They are classed under three headings:

Disinfectants which purify the water, air, clothes, etc.; antiseptics that arrest putrefaction, and deodorizers that destroy disagreeable smells. Heat, of course, is a powerful disinfectant, and boiling water may be used when it is practicable and possible to reach the spot to be disinfected.

When obliterating traces of disease -measles, scarlet fever, typhoid, diphtheria-burn sulphur in the room after stopping all cracks and crevices with newspapers so that it will be airtight During the illness a sheet saturated with a solution of carbolic acid should be hung over the doorways, even when the doors are shut, to protect the other members of the family from possible contagion.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

If the knife and fingers are slightly buttered when seeding raisins the work will be robbed of its stickiness and discomfort.

A pinch of salt will make the white of an egg beat quicker, and a pinch of borax in cooked starch will make the clothes stiffer and whiter.

Sunshine is destructive to mirrors. It causes the glass to assume a milky appearance, and the mirror will never be so clear again in spite of whatever is done to it.

To clean silver trimmings-Cover the surface with well dried and finely powdered magnesia, and let it lie for 5 couple of hours. Afterward rub in the powder and brush off with a hard

Pumpkin Fanchonettes.

To each two cupfuls of stewed and strained pumpkin add one cupful of milk, two tablespoonfuls flour, one tablespoonful of butter one-quarter teaspoonful each of cinnamon and ginger, a grating of nutmeg, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful of sugar. Heat the pumpkin, add the dry materials, well mixed, then add the milk, butter and beaten volks of eggs. reserving the whites for a meringue Cut out pastry in rounds to fit over gem pans, bake, then fill with the mixture, which has been cooked and partially cold, cover with the meringue and finish in a moderate oven.

Recipe for Herring Dish.

A herring dish brought over from Normandy by a French woman is pre pared in this way: A big onion is chopped fine and fried in butter until it is a rich golden brown, but not burned. Then it is removed and six big herrings are put into the pan and cooked. When they are nicely browned, they are arranged on a hot plate with the onions, and a sauce made with salt, pepper and two table spoonfuls of vinegar cooked together is turned over them. Mustard is passed with them.

A Canned Peach Dessert.

Cut stale sponge cake into round pieces an inch thick. Place these in a glass dish and moisten them with the sirup from a can of large half peaches. Place a half peach on each piece. with the inside up. Sweeten some whipped cream and flavor it with va nilla. Then blanch some almonds and chop them very fine and add them to the cream. Heap this on each half peach. Serve any that remains in a separate dish.

Safety Pin Needle for Tape.

Take a safety pin, stick pin securely brough end of tape, fasten pin, then as the pin is smooth it will go through goods easily, drawing tape with it is especially good for tape that is too wide for ordinary needle.

Use Coins.

To clean new bath tubs or porce ain sinks on which paint, varnish or plaster has been dropped, lay a nickel or any small coin flat, rub over the spots and they will disappear without scratching the glass or enamel.


