NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY

Kit Carson's Grave. Bill For Mountain Road. Delegation W. H. Andrews has introduced in the House of Representatives a bill appropriating the sum of \$35,000 for the construction of a public highway in the Sacramento mountains in southern New Mexico.

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the secretary of the treasury be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to expend out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$25,000, for the construction of a road across the national forest in the Territory of New Mexico."

The Sheriff Kept Order. The Las Vegas correspondent of the Denver Republican gives the following account of a New Mexico political convention held in Las Vegas on the 17th inst.

Rio Grande Log Drive. That the Rio Grande is capable of affording transportation facilities to commercial industries will be proved within a week or ten days, says the New Mexican, when the Santa Barbara Logging & Lumber Co. of Albuquerque begins to commence the work of driving or floating 300,000 pieces of timber, mainly railway ties, down the river.

Reclamation Service reports that the entire canal system of the Garfield and Grant projects in New Mexico, which present 8,443 acres have been qualified for water and the area is being rapidly increased. From present prospects it is believed that water will be furnished to the entire project by the end of the year.

Gen. Benjamin Jehannus Viljan, the famous Boer leader, has been granted citizenship papers by Judge Parier at Las Cruces. He is the leader of the Boer colony that has been established at Chamberlin, in the Mesilla valley, Dona Ana county, Col. W. V. Johnson, Capt. N. J. Vangass, the returned chief of scouts, and other eminent Boer leaders are members of the colony.

A Santa Fe dispatch of the 4th inst. says Mrs. Catalina K. Montoya died today at Pezajico, a village north of Santa Fe. An injury sustained in a highway accident in which she and her husband were thrown out of the carriage. The husband died of his injuries some time ago. Six children survive. Mrs. Montoya was sixty-two years old, and was a prominent and respected citizen.

Attorney General J. M. Hervey has recently addressed all district attorneys urging them to prosecute owners and operators of slot machines, despite the contempt of district Judge Mery of Alamosa who has ruled that such machines are not covered by the anti-gambling law. Attorney General Hervey says he will not cease the agitation against slot machines until the major of six district judges of the Supreme Court have passed upon the matter adversely.

A home fire insurance company, to be called the Home Fire Insurance Company of New Mexico, is being organized by a number of Las Cruces men and others, the concern to have a capital stock of at least \$200,000. The company will not start into business until this sum is subscribed. Among those at the head of the project are Judge F. W. Parker of Las Cruces, Michael Gyles of Las Cruces, L. Dupree, formerly with the Continental Fire Insurance Company, and R. A. Mayer, formerly cashier of the City National Bank of El Paso. It is expected that the company will be fully organized and doing business in three months time.

Governor Curry has appointed the following board to erect an appropriate national monument at Las Cruces, which the last legislature appropriated \$7,500. Col. S. Romero, for chairman; Capt. R. E. Twitchell, for secretary; Capt. Ludwig Heide, for one member; and Capt. H. N. Smith, for another.
