HOW POLITICAL CONVENTIONS ARE MANAGED

PEEP BEHIND THE SCENES

Ordinary political convention is a thing of wild animals, whose actions are extremely amusing, but absolutely without form and void. Nothing but a cage full of monkeys can be reduced to one globe of futility which each delegate is duly ticketed with his proper credentials. The will of the "bosses" is really important in the gathering; he does it for a "green" he is a seasoned campaigner who knows that he merely "represents" the people; and the chairman of the convention "represents" the delegates, and the "bosses" the chairman and secretary means of this sliding scale of power it will be seen that the "bosses" represent the people!

The long, low, rakish hall, the where a wavy blue with tobacco Aisles are cut through to the generally three in number. The committees on this, that and the other go forward to the chairman and hand in their cut-and-communications. The different districts are ranged about all, each with its particular spot in like checkers on a board the game begins. Many of delegates are in their shirts, and many are talking wildly, shouting powerfully and in other molding the destinies of their party. The very few who are not are choking.

The platform are two tables, at the chairman of the convention the having been chosen by the delegates. He is a mere puppet in their hands, understanding what they want, and at any and all times to carry out their wishes. The chairman is a mere echo; the assistant secretaries mere assistants of the three highly respectable dignitaries of various titles sit at the stage to receive the unintelligent observer into the belief that they are "on the square." A pitcher of water is on the chairman's desk, and he will open the convention with a speech. In the speech he will glorify in the history of his own party, salt and all to the political house the hide of the opposite side. This is a species of buncombe which is always indulged in.

Sometimes a convention is opened with prayer. This is something which is not touched on at length, for the devil himself would not conceive a grotesque blasphemy. Most conventions are opened with political "smiles," being burglarious aggressions, brought together for purposes of plundering men of their political rights. The chairman has his speech fully learned by heart, and he is invariably eloquent, pungent, witty, and terse, dense, flowery and grand. But he finally subsides, and then, after the committees' reports and the platform are finished, some more political red tape is run through with the work of nominating candidates is begun. But by the convention has reached the point of being ready to vote there have been a number of battles fought and finished before the various committees' credentials.

In certain wards of the cities, or in certain districts in the country, there may be a dispute about some delegate claiming the right to represent the people; those putting in counterclaim for recognition. In such cases, contests are begun and the respective claims thrashed out before the committee on credentials. The committee has the power to review these disputes in the various districts or wards. No one but the contestants and the committee and the other delegates are allowed in the committee rooms in these contests. It being a sort of family affair. Usually, the contests are determined according to the way the "bosses" want them to be decided, but if it doesn't matter about a vote in two, the "bosses" allow the committee to do as they please. Evidence is heard, speeches are made, and the committee picks the winner.

Every face of his questioner, surrounded by his bright red covering of locks and responded easily, gracefully and most urbanely. "I don't like the color of your hair." And the delegate remained "unseated." Men were let out of their delegations for any or no reasons. The only question was to have the majority, or at least the loud and most pugnacious minority. This latter, with the aid of the chairman and the secretary, will enable the nomination of their candidates.

The seventh ward, we will say, is called on and the chairman of the delegation roars out "Fourteen votes for Jones and one for Smith." An assistant secretary repeats to the main secretary, "Fourteen votes for Smith and one for Jones," and it is so recorded in their seats and howling "Mister Chairman! Mister Chairman!" was a mere tableau and nothing that concerned the convention in the remotest degree.

By the way, convention oratory is divided into two kinds, the "turned loose" and the "squelched." The "bosses" and the chairman have their eyes on their own orators, and very little latitude is allowed the opposition "law-smiths." It is laughable to watch the frantic gyrations of some silver-tongued word-juggler, especially if he is a young man, who is trying to get the chairman's eye in order to let off a philippic against the chairman's tyranny. His companions may hoist him high on a chair, where he balances himself precariously while he shrieks "Meastair Chairmannann," and froths like something stricken with hydrophobia, but the chairman goes placidly on. "Twenty-second ward, is for Smith" is the announcement, when in fact the announcement was just the other way. This raises a counter-irritant and the Twenty-second ward placidly goes on the war-path. But "take the gaff" in public. Party fealty, party cohesion, party this, and that and the other weighs on them and makes them cowards. For the most part the delegates hope to get some crumbs from the party table and they fear to revolt, knowing well they will be marked men with the organization. Oh! potent phrase, "the organization." There is the "ward organization," the "county organization," the "state organization," the "national organization," all intricately linked and welded together, and the national committee can put his finger on a garbage wagon driver in a remote ward and separate him from his job if the driver doesn't do exactly as he is told. It is a beautiful system. Don't imagine that it is not perfected so far as it can be.

Occasionally some fossil of respectability, galvanized into spasmodic action by something particularly brazen on the part of the powers that run the convention, will get up from the platform, where he is supposed to be acquiescent to the program, and start the animals by a fiery diatribe against the bare-faced robbery going on under his very nose. At such a time it is really delightful to see the perfect respect in which his remarks are listened to by the chairman and the "bosses." His remarks may be pun-

dered by cheers by the malcontents in the delegates' seats, but the "strong arm" contingent governed by the "bosses" sits quietly until he fires his broadside. Then possibly a "boss" gets up, or the chairman gets in a happy remark or two and there is a thunder-roll of applause from the "bosses' gang. The respectable gentleman has simply talked for the pleasure of having his cerebellum vibrated. He might as well have recited "Mary had a little lamb."

Our ward stood eight to seven in one convention, and our chairman announced it correctly. He was an opponent of mine, but he did not try to change the vote. But when the vote was announced from the stage it was 15 for the other side. Several of us yelled "bloody murder" at the steal, but, bless you, that convention went right ahead with its business as easily as if seven men standing upright in their seats and howling "Mister Chairman! Mister Chairman!" was a mere tableau and nothing that concerned the convention in the remotest degree.

They are too wise to resort to such puerile foolishness.

Nothing can exceed the perfect repose which marks the proceedings as the most absolute fairness to their opponents. But once the business is concluded, over the cigars and cocktails these genial gentlemen will unbend and relate delightedly and with rare humor the amusing comedies played on the convention floor. They have remembered the very voices and gestures of the reformers and patriots, they can imitate, and perfectly, the surprised air of the plundered delegation, or the venturist's sweep of the hand-bolled orator. They enjoy these things with the gusto of the connoisseur, the political bon vivant. But at the hall, and in the midst of the carnage, they are as suave as panthers and as remorseless as cannibals. "Everything goes in politics," is their motto, that is, everything but honesty.

Coming back from my last political convention I met Jack Derby in the "chicken." Jack was from the ward next to mine, and I had missed him just before the voting began. I had noticed a stranger in his seat when I came in rather late, but still in time to vote. Jack was moody and his head was done up in a gaudy handkerchief. "What's up?" I said to him. "I didn't see you when the votes were being cast." "They threw me out," was his reply. "I went over to see a friend of mine in the fourteenth and when I got back to me seat they was a guy there in it. I grabbed him and he caught hold of me arms. The 'sarge' (sergeant-at-arms) came runnin' up 'says this guy gives him the wink an' says this fellow's a pick-pocket. WHAT SAVED "UNCLE JOE"

Old Lifting Machine That Long Ago Proved a Health Preserver.

TWO WAYS OF SERVING EGGS.

Changes from the Ordinary Methods of Preparing Them.

Eggs a la San Malo are a disguised dish. Four hard-cooked eggs, four slices of tomato seasoned with a little salad oil and tarragon vinegar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, little lemon juice, some aspic jelly, pinch of pepper, fine watercress, chopped parsley or chopped pistachio nuts, two teaspoonfuls anchovy or caviare. Put the yolks, butter, caviare, pepper and lemon juice in a mortar and pound them until quite smooth. Put these in a forcing bag with plain tube and fill up the eggs.

Coat them with liquid aspic jelly, arrange on little sprigs of fine cress, chopped parsley or chopped pistachios. Recoit with more aspic. Dip the tomato in hot water, remove skin, slice, season with the salad oil and tarragon vinegar, and lay them on a lace paper in an entree dish. Lay eggs on top. Garnish with small cress and chopped aspic jelly.

Eggs a la Rossi are nearly as elaborate. Seven eggs, seven tablespoonfuls of cream, four tablespoonfuls of lean cooked chopped ham, two pickled gherkins, salt and pepper, seven slices of bread about one-half inch thick to cut out seven cases about 1/2 inch in diameter.

Stamp out the cases with a round cutter. Remove the centers carefully with a knife, so that a thin, hollow case of bread remains. Dip each case for a second in a little milk or brush over with beaten egg, roll in fine bread crumbs; fry them a golden color in plenty of smoking hot fat. Drain them on white paper.

Carefully break an egg into each of the cases. Put one tablespoonful of cream on each egg, and a dust of salt and pepper. Place the cases in a moderate oven and bake them until the eggs are slightly set. A little chopped ham on the top of each egg, and lay across each four strips of gherkin. Serve at once, garnished with fried parsley.

SECURE SUPPLY OF FRESH AIR.

Necessary Ventilators Can Be Put in with Little Trouble.

Where steam-heat is installed, according to Suburban Life, ventilation is especially needed, for the absence of fires and open fireplaces deprives the rooms of a constant source of pure air, and architects are often negligent in supplying efficient substitutes for them. When building a house, it is very easy to have at least one opening communicating with the outside air placed at the highest possible point in every room, with a flap, if desired, to prevent this outlet becoming an inlet; but, even when the house is built without these necessary ventilators, they can be easily made with very little expense or trouble. Perhaps the simplest method of providing a constant inlet for a room is to have a counterpart of the outlet of the sash-frame made, with upper and lower surfaces parallel. When this is put in its place and the window shut down on it, air comes in readily at the junction of the upper and lower frames, and at a height which prevents those sitting in the room from feeling any draught.

Candied Lemon Ring. Don't throw away lemon and orange rind. When using lemons for lemonade you may take the rind off in strips or squeeze out the juice and keep the rind in halves. Clean out the inside, throw rinds into cold water, boil five minutes, drain, then cover with boiling water and boil until tender. Make a syrup from one pound of sugar and half a pint of water, skim, put in lemon rind. Cook until transparent. Put on sieve to drain, stir syrup until it begins to granulate, and pour over. Let it harden and dry on the rinds. These are better for fruit cake and mince-cake than what you usually buy. Orange peels may be treated in the same way.

Maple Sugar Shortcake. Make a rich shortcake dough of one pint flour, one cup of sour cream, pinch of salt, one-half teaspoon of soda, rolling it out to half the thickness of ordinary biscuits, cut with biscuit cutter, butter every other one and sprinkle with bits of maple sugar. Moisten the other biscuits with a little sweet cream or milk and press down on top of sugared biscuits. Lay close together in pan, brush over the top with melted butter and bake in quick oven. Place on a platter and pour over the shortcakes a cup of hot maple sirup. Serve with cream.

Brown Mushroom Sauce. One can mushrooms, one-quarter cup butter, one-quarter cup flour, one-half lemon juice, two cups consommé or brown stock, salt and pepper. Drain and rinse mushrooms and chop finely one-half cup of same. Cook five minutes. Cut with the butter, add flour when well browned add gradually consommé or stock. Cook 15 minutes, skim, add remaining mushrooms cut in quarters or slices and cook two minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

Ironing Shirt Waist. If you have trouble in making the button side of waists, shirts, and corset covers look nice, fold a Turkish towel double with the buttons facing down. Now run the iron over it several times and the band will be ironed smooth and dry.

Chop with a Can. For a vegetable chopper I use a corn can. The top was removed by turning upside down on a hot stove. Hoops were made in the bottom and the top edge was sharpened with a file.
