A Great Bridge.

The last stone has been laid in the construction of a stone bridge which is destined to take rank as one of the greatest of its kind in the world. The bridge is over the Connecticut river at Hartford. With its approach it took nearly three years to build and cost about \$3,000,000. It is composed of nine spans having maximum dimensions of a reach of 119 feet and a clear height of arch of 45 feet, and is 82 feet wide and has a total length of 1,192.5 feet. The famous London bridge, which has hitherto ranked first among stone bridges, is but 65 feet wide, 1,005 feet long and has five arches, with a longest span of 152 feet and a maximum rise of arch of 27.5 feet. The Connecticut bridge, says Cassier's Magazine, is not remarkable for its length of span, for there are several stone bridges with a span of more than 200 feet, but these are generally narrow one-span structures, as, for instance, the Cabin John Creek bridge, carrying the Washington aqueduct, which has a span of 220 feet and a width of but 20 feet. Neither is it the longest bridge, for there is the Congleton viaduct, in England, which has 41 arches and is 2,870 feet long and 25 feet wide. Although the Hartford bridge is one of the widest bridges, it is not any one feature that stamps it great, but a summary of size of arch, of length and breadth, combined with its perfection of structure and symmetry of outline, that makes plain the claim of superiority.

It was reported last week in the Current Events column that the United States consul in Harbin, Manchuria, had refused to recognize the president of the municipal council in that city, on the ground that the president was appointed by Russia. His action has precipitated a discussion in the foreign offices of the world of the open-door question in China. According to the treaty of Portsmouth, both Russia and Japan agreed to evacuate Manchuria, leaving the province to the Chinese. The American consul is accredited to China, and refuses to recognize any other governmental authority. The Russians have not withdrawn, neither have the Japanese, and a new government for Harbin was lately arranged in such a way as to give to Russia the control. But the American consul, acting under instructions from home, insists that Russia has no more right than America or France or Germany to name municipal officers in Harbin. It is evident that the government in Washington expects both Japan and Russia to keep their word given at Portsmouth. If its expectation is expressed with sufficient emphasis, it is likely that the rights of China will be considerably advanced and the friendship between the Chinese and the Americans more firmly cemented.

An American play running in London has to be accompanied by a glossary in order to give the English audience the proper tip as to the meaning of many of the unfamiliar terms employed. This is so funny that it really adds to the humor of the performance. But the American dramatist can plead a distinguished precedent. Several of the carefully edited works of Shakespeare are furnished with a glossary. And doubtless if the English audiences would look the matter up they would find a large number of the slang terms included in the Shakespearean vocabulary. That often happens when so-called "Americanisms" are traced to their source. The English critics have failed to "catch on" to the evolution of their own language, that's all.

Mr. Aquith, the new British premier, was a lucky "find" by Mr. Gladstone. He entered parliament in 1886. A single speech, which proved his power as a debater, led Mr. Gladstone, in 1892, to offer him the important post of home secretary, with a seat in the cabinet, although he had not previously held any office. He remained at the home office until the Rosebery government was defeated in 1895; was in the opposition ten years, and has been chancellor of the exchequer since December, 1905. He has therefore served but five years and three months in all as an officer of the crown. To have attained the chief place in the government by two steps, and in so short a time, is almost unprecedented.

Doubtless the great grand rush to Alaska will be caused by the report that some one has struck a gasoline well, for soon some miner is likely to discover certain supplies of fuel cached along the route of the Paris racers. Or was that all a bluff?

Dr. Allen of New York urges everybody to concentrate his efforts on making the municipal government thoroughly efficient. That idea, if carried out, is worth a lot of money to any city.

NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY

Beien Cut-Off Completed.

A Beien dispatch of the 14th inst. says: The last and "Golden Spike" on the Rio Puerco end of the now famous Beien cut-off was driven last week when the last permanent rail was laid making the final connection of the great transcontinental route of the Santa Fe. Grant Brothers of Los Angeles had the contract for this work have moved out and their outfit is now being shipped to Nogales, Arizona, where they have large contracts for railroad building with the Southern Pacific.

General Manager J. E. Hurley in his private car No. 18, accompanied by General Superintendent H. W. Sharp of La Junta, came down from Albuquerque Monday evening and spent some time in inspecting the improvements at Beien after which they went to Rio Puerco, meeting President Ripley in private car No. 17, and General Manager A. G. Wells of the coast lines in private car No. 5. After making a thorough inspection of the Rio Puerco end of the line and arranging for the movement of trains into Beien the entire party left for the east via the cut-off, General Manager Wells going as far as Vaughn, from which point he returned to Beien. Instructions have been received that the entire line of the Eastern railway will be turned over to the operating department on July 1st and the finishing touches have been ordered rushed as rapidly as possible.

The various improvements at Beien are progressing nicely and if there are any doubts as to this place now famous as an important railroad center it is only necessary to note the extensive improvements now under way. Two large steel tanks have just been completed, with a power house and water treating plant, together with a large store house are being erected. Tracks for storing several thousand cars have already been laid and still more are coming. A new depot, Harvey eating house and a reading and recreation room for railroad employees will also be constructed during the present year.

The Rio Puerco end of the Eastern railway of New Mexico will become a part of the Coast lines, with its terminus at Beien, which will also be the first division of the cut-off. Heavy stock shipments are now moving over the Rio Grande division and several hundred cars will move east via Beien and the cut-off within the next ten days. There is a noticeable increase in freight moving to points on the cut-off showing that the country tributary to this line is rapidly settling up.

Killed By His Son.

News reached Santa Fe on the 13th inst. that G. Cox, aged sixty-three, was shot and instantly killed the day before by his son, C. Cox, aged twenty-two, at the Cox ranch, about twenty miles south of Portales. The verdict of the coroner's jury was "justifiable homicide."

The older Cox became suddenly demented and told his son, who was working at the barn, that he was going to put the whole family under "New Mexico soil." He went to the house, closely followed by his son, and returned with the rifle and struck his daughter over the head with the pistol. He then laid the rifle down and drew the pistol on his wife, but before he had time to shoot, his son picked up the rifle and shot his father. The bullet entered just back of the right ear and death was instantaneous.

Oil Tank Explosion.

A dispatch from Deming, received at Albuquerque on the 13th inst. says that the storage tanks of the Continental Oil Company at that place exploded and burned early that morning, resulting in the death of J. G. Clark, manager of the tanks, and the destruction of thousands of dollars worth of property. The fire also consumed several large storehouses of the Anheuser-Busch Brewing Company, causing a heavy loss, and Santa Fe railway cars and tracks were also damaged.

The fire started at 9 o'clock from an explosion, the cause of which is a mystery. As the fire gained headway after another of the tanks exploded with terrific force, sending great volumes of flame and smoke hundreds of feet in the air.

To Your New Mexico.

It is understood, says the New Mexican, that Governor George Curry, upon his return from Washington, will head a large party of officials and citizens who will make a circuit of the eastern part of the Sunshine Territory in a special train in the interest of the sixteenth national irrigation congress and International Industrial exposition. The excursion is to start about the latter part of May.

In the party will be Governor Curry, Colonel W. S. Hopewell, chairman of the board of control of the irrigation congress, Ralph E. Twitchell, secretary of the board of control, and many other citizens.

From Albuquerque the train will go to El Paso, Texas, where it will be switched onto the El Paso and Southwestern lines and sent north through eastern New Mexico. Stops will be made at Santa Rosa, Alamogordo, Carrizozo, Tucumcari and other places in which they wish the President to be present. From Tucumcari the train will go to Clayton and Folsom and other towns in that portion of the country, then back through Raton and down over the Santa Fe railway to the Duke City.

Oppose Enlarged Reservation.

The Board of Trade of Farmington has passed strong resolutions which will be presented to Governor Curry, together with a request that he present them to President Roosevelt, in which they wish the President to rescind his order of some months ago, by which the Navajo Indians have had added to their reservation some 4,000,000 acres of land, about half of which is in New Mexico.

The resolutions set forth that there are already 11,000,000 acres in the Navajo reservation, including many acres of good land which the Indians, it is said, have not attempted to use, and this amount some 3,000,000 acres in New Mexico, mostly in San Juan county. The resolutions set forth that this tract is sufficient for the Indians without further allotments.

The 4,000,000-acre allotment includes 120,000 acres along the east boundary of San Juan county, and government agents there, it is said, are forbidding sheepmen from crossing this land with their herds. Sheepmen have been in the habit of crossing this land to reach their summer ranges ever since white men have occupied these parts. There are about 20,000 Navajo Indians on the reservation.

It is stated that more than thirty railroad men from New Mexico are planning to go to Chile, where they will work on a railroad being extended from Valparaiso to the north.

"TREASURE" OF LITTLE WORTH.

Beneath the floor the servants found a large antiquated earthen pot, which was at once taken to the master, Kitayama, who opened it in expectation of finding something, and true to his anticipations the pot was filled with ancient gold coins.

His joy was unbounded. The valuable find, evidently an intended gift of his forefathers, was carefully deposited in the family shrine, to which sake and other offerings were made in profound obedience to the memory of the good ancestors who left such a splendid gift to posterity. A banquet was given on the following evening in honor of the auspicious event, in which several friends and neighbors were invited.

Here a curious dealer proceeded to inspect the coins to the breathless interest of the whole group, and the critic at once pronounced them all lead washed with gold—Japan Times.

ARE UNABLE TO GROW TUSKS.

Elephants in Ceylon Unlike Those of Their Species Elsewhere.

It is a singular thing that Ceylon is the only part of the world where the male elephants have no tusks; they have miserable little grubbers projecting two or three inches from the upper jaw and inclining downward.

Nothing produces either ivory or horn in fine specimens throughout Ceylon. Although some of the buffaloes have tolerably fine heads, they will not bear a comparison with those of other countries. The horns of the native cattle are not above four inches in length.

The elk and the spotted deer's antlers are small compared with deer of their size in India. This is the more singular, as it is evident from the geological formation, that at some remote period Ceylon was not an island, but formed a portion of the mainland. It is thought that there must be elements wanting in the Ceylon pasturage for the formation of ivory.

WIRE MEAN DEATH TO BIRDS.

Eagles and Cranes Climb Under Insulators and Are Electrocutted.

One of the most annoying difficulties in the operation of high-tension electrical transmission in some sections of the west results from the electrocution of the large birds. On the Kern River-Los Angeles line, for instance, the eagles and cranes climb up under the insulators at the top of the towers.

He has been at the head of the movement which resulted in the beginning of work on the great cathedral of St. John the Divine in 1901. Bishop Potter married Mrs. Alfred Corning Clark, who had a fortune of \$13,000,000.

WAGES IN SAMOA.

A memorandum drawn up by the German colonial office, and attached to the estimates for the information of the members of the Reichstag, contains a statement of the present condition of the labor question in Samoa, in which it is stated that the white population was formerly entirely dependent upon Samoan workmen, while now the major part of the work at most of the plantations is done by Chinese imported for this labor. Each Chinese laborer receives in wages \$2.85 a month. The total cost of each to the employer, the report states, including wages, maintenance, passage money, and medical treatment, is calculated at from \$8.92 to \$11.90 per month.

Powerful Irish Lighthouse.

The new electric Fastnet light, off Cape Clear, Ireland, is of 750,000 candle-power. The cost was \$420,000. The focal plane of the flash is 150 feet above high water, and theoretically it is visible 16 miles.

Kill the House Fly.

The fly transmits typhoid through its feet. It can carry thousands of bacilli on each foot, and if it lights on food and the food is eaten disease is apt to follow. The fly does not wipe his feet, and there is no use in trying to train him to do so. The only recourse is to get rid of him entirely. All careful housekeepers have their windows and doors screened, but this is valuable largely as a matter of comfort. It does not go to the root of the trouble. The flies infest butcher shops and grocery stores, and we shall never be immune until we attack the fly as an enemy of society.

The Woman's Club of Portales was organized in 1903 by Mrs. Oldham, who was elected the first President, and who for two years filled the position with honor to herself and much good to the organization.

The first years work was the study of various topics of interest, and the commendable plans of starting a club library were carried out. Our members thereby had the pleasure and profit of becoming thoroughly intimate with the latest and best writers.

The second years work was devoted to the study of the Chautauque Course and the faithful few who continued the study to its close were more than repaid for the time and energy thus expended.

The third years work was an interesting study of various subjects— notably, those devoted to the home. It was during the third year that active work in civic improvement was begun. Over six hundred dollars was raised for improving the public square. A substantial and ornamental iron fence and a grove of shade trees transformed the appearance of the square, and also the opinion of some of the husbands concerning the Woman's Club.

The fourth year, devoted to the Boylston study of Great Britain, proved a most successful years work and one continued to its very close by a greater number than any previous year.

We have entered upon this years work with even more determination than ever before; our civic work more varied, and our library work revived. After many trials, much trouble and criticism, but with courage undaunted and faith renewed, we are nearing our fifth anniversary. An organization of which we are justly proud, and one worthy the commendation of all; the original inventor of much profit and pleasure.

In behalf of the members, we wish to express our appreciation of, and admiration for the founder of the Woman's Club of Portales, Mrs. W. O. Oldham.
