SENATOR SMALL WILL OPEN IN AMARILLO FRI.

West Texas Senator Throws Hat In Ring for Gubernatorial Nomination.

Wellington, April 30.—State Senator Clint Small will open a vigorous campaign for the Democratic nomination for Governor in Amarillo on May 2, with a full declaration of principles and enunciation of his platform. At that time a giant rally of the Small supporters will be held with delegations from practically every town in the Panhandle-Plains country in attendance. Senator Small's announcement, which has been awaited with keen interest by supporters over the State will be broadcast over the radio.

A number of his admirers from Castro county are expected to hear the Senator in Amarillo.

Splendid Showing Wheat Exhibited At News Office

This was from the farm of R. H. Gough, of Hereford, and is located on Section 23, eight miles west of Dimmitt. Mr. Gough, who is the son of Judge Gough, formerly of this county, and the county's first judge, stated that he has 400 acres in wheat, and is all of this size and variety at this time.

A number of wheat growers in the News office Wednesday afternoon said that it would easily make twenty bushels to the acre, without any more rain.

Young Mother And Babe Are Killed Sunday

Young Mother and Infant Victims of Severe Wind Storm Last Sunday.

Mrs. J. H. Lundegreen, age 17, and her 7-months old baby were killed instantly last Sunday evening during the severe wind-storm in the northeast part of the county. The family, who just recently purchased the farm, located 14 miles northeast of this city, had left their home, to seek a safer place, when the mother and babe were caught beneath the wreckage of the house, torn down by a sudden wind. They were both dead before rescuers extricated them from the wreckage.

Mrs. Lundegreen formerly lived in Amarillo, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Johnson, with four brothers, reside there, to which place the two bodies were taken, and buried.

The family was not known in Dimmitt, having been residents of this county for only about 3 weeks.

No other damage was done by the storm, which was accompanied by a half-inch rain over this section.

Furnishers Home Beautiful to be Announced 11th

Work on the Home Beautiful, sponsored by the Willson & Son Lumber Co. and the Castro County News, will begin at once, after an unavoidable delay of a week.

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Population of Dimmitt Increases Over 450 Per Cent Since 1920

PRELIMINARY, unofficial figures from the decennial census, just completed by the government, places the population of Dimmitt at 904. Not being incorporated until 1928, there are no official records for 1920, when the last government count was made, but it is estimated that there were a few less than 200 people on what is now the City of Dimmitt townsite, with additions. This figure remained about the same until after incorporation, and with the coming of the Fort Worth & Denver, the advance since that year, has been rapid, showing an increase of over 450 per cent, and it is conservatively estimated that this will be increased greatly within the next two years.

Since the above was written, the News has given out the last supplemental blank, which, with the filing of same, adds at least one name to the total figures of 904.

FIRST EXCURSION TO SCENIC SPOTS ATTRACTS MANY

Over 150 Castro Citizens Make Merry on Special Denver Train Sunday.

Approximately 160 made the trip to the tunnels and gravel pit in Briscoe county on the special Denver train last Sunday, the occasion being the first annual picnic of Castro County citizens. Rains of Week Are Beneficial Over County

With nearly one inch of rain last Sunday afternoon and night over the entire county, Castro farmers are well pleased with the outlook for a splendid grain harvest this summer.

It is conservatively estimated that there are near 200,000 acres of wheat planted in Castro county, between 60,000 and 70,000 of which is in the Dimmitt trade territory. With continued favorable weather, another bumper crop is possible for the county.

With additional and adequate facilities this year for handling the grain at this market, it is expected that a good season is in store for the business interests of this city.

The News has learned from railroad officials that the freight car movement has already started in this direction, and we are assured by the Denver that there will be plenty of cars again this year.

Sixth Elevator For Dimmitt Is Announced

Six Elevators, With Combined Capacity of 171,000 Bushels, For Dimmitt

C. W. Boothe, owner of the Dimmitt Coal & Grain, dealers in grain, feed, ice and coal, announces this week that work will begin at an early date on a 16,000 bushel elevator, to be erected on his property near the corner of Jones avenue and 4th st., just southeast of his present location, which is on the highway.

The structure will be of frame and sheet iron, and will be completed in time to handle the coming harvest of grain.

Contract has not been let, pending assurance from the Ft. Worth & Denver that a track will be constructed for service. When completed, the total investment of this property will be about \$14,000.00.

With the completion of this elevator, Dimmitt will have a total of six, with a combined capacity of 171,000 bushels, ample to handle the business here this year, without congestion.

Following are the elevators and capacities:

Farmers Elevator Co., 2—total capacity of 50,000 bushels.
Castro County Grain Co., 2—total capacity, 80,000.
Texas Wheat Growers' Association, 1—total capacity, 25,000.
C. W. Boothe, 1—total capacity, 16,000.

Hart, with three elevators, and a combined total of 60,000 bushels, gives the county a grand total of 231,000.

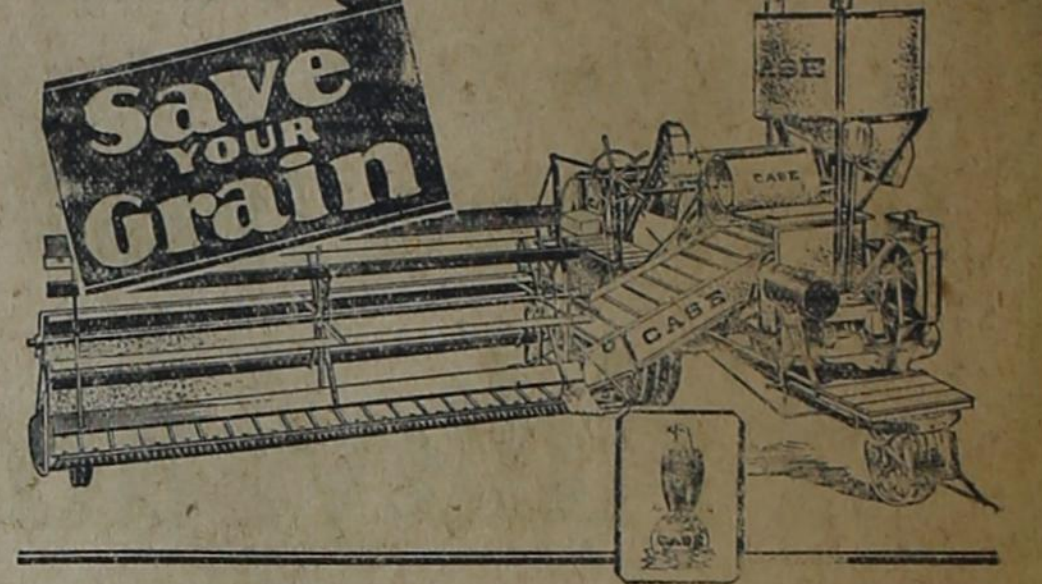
MEETING AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH SATURDAY

his deputy, and Misses Brobasco and Felton, of Lockney, joined the picnics at Sterly as guests, with the announcement that they were ready to make the party enjoyable in every possible way.

The Start

A light mist and heavy clouds early Sunday morning prevented a large number from going, but the train left at 9:10, with a representative, tho small, delegation, from many sections of the county. Stopping at Hart, about 25 boarded the train, and at Plainview the party was increased about ten more.

Dinner in the Hills

At noon the train was stopped four miles this side of the tunnels, and the various parties scattered in many directions, among the hills, under shady trees, and along the inviting creek in a beautiful valley far below the tracks of the Denver. Railroad officials, trainmen and guests all joined together in many merry parties and for two hours the echos rang thru this beautiful section, signifying enjoyment in its fullest measure.

Superintendent Demonstrates!

Superintendent J. W. Mode, heralded as an expert coffee maker, and a good-fellow, jovial, and "one of the bunch" on such occasions, demonstrated his ability in all, and his coffee was cautiously sought as a sample, then eagerly for "seconds" as the party ate dinner.

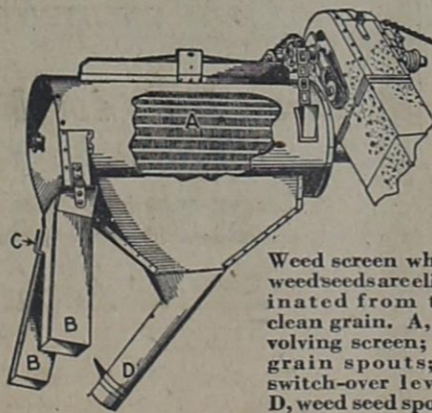

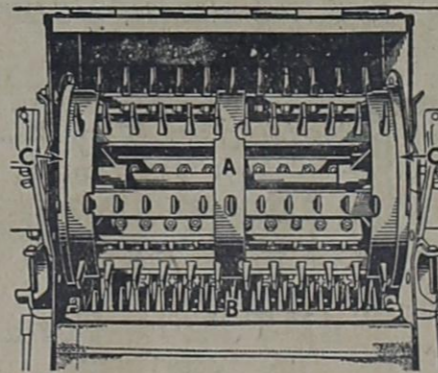

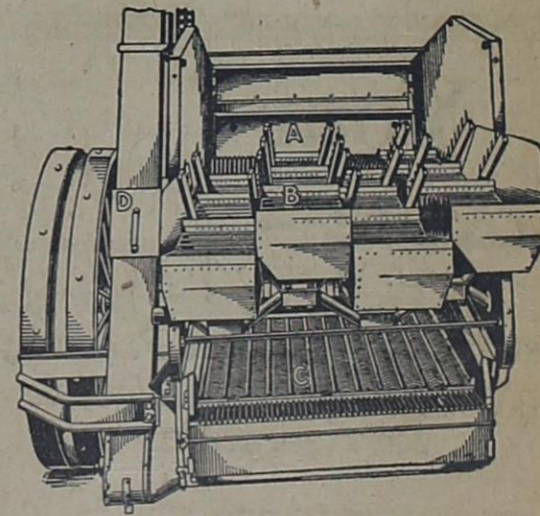
