Canning Factory Proposed.

Many Citizens Believe It Will Pay and Want It Established.

It has been proposed that a canning factory be built at Portales and everybody to whom the matter has been proposed is enthusiastic for it. To establish such a plant would simply mean to create a large market where the farmers could always sell for cash many of their best crops, crops which grow in great abundance here and with comparative ease. The editor has talked recently with men who know the canning business thoroughly and it is their pronounced judgement that the business would be a decided success here. They believe there are a number of products here that could be canned at a good profit and in large quantities. Among these are beans and other vegetables, potatoes and pumpkins. One man from Missouri well acquainted with the business and with the market, says that a canning plant for potatoes alone would pay well. But the most of our citizens want a plant equipped for handling all the varieties our farmers can supply. This will include not only those mentioned above, but any and all other marketable products that may be grown here and will supply material for canning. Pickling is also proposed and with wisdom, for no country can excel this on in the quality and quantity produced. What we need is simply somebody to grow them and that problem ought to be easy to solve.

This proposal is made in seriousness and ought to appeal to all the public as a profitable and even necessary industry. It means increasing the number of money crops for the farmer and that means a larger volume of trade for the merchant. In fact it is simply one more opportunity to add in a considerable way to the wealth and prosperity of the whole country.

The Herald would be greatly pleased to see definite action taken to establish a first class canning factory. It can be done and somehow it ought to be done. How shall we do it? Come in and let us talk it over or get together some way, some where and do it now.

City Ordinances.

NOTE: The Editor will give a careful digest of all the town ordinances as they are enacted week by week; also will keep on file a book of the ordinances for the convenience of any who may desire to refer to them.

The Ninth Ordinance.

Publication was made last week of the ninth ordinance relating to public health and sanitation. It covers many important points. The preservation of public health by means of public sanitation is one of the main duties of a town government and this work ought to command the heartiest general sympathy and co-operation.

The ordinance provides for the removal by the scavenger of all filth, to a point one mile from the city limits; for tight boxes for all privies for the reception of excrement; for the removal of all slops from restaurants and hotels, which slops are to be kept in metallic covered receptacles. The digging of cesspools and pits for closets is prohibited. Slaughtering houses must be a mile from the town limits, and no hog or pig pens are allowed within the corporate limits.

Barns, stables and stalls must be cleaned and disinfected every thirty days. Unhealthy and unclean water is not allowed to be kept in cisterns and sick animals are not allowed within the limits of the town. The Town Marshal is required to visit all meat markets each week and report any unsanitary condition found. All cases of infectious or contagious diseases must be reported to the town physician by other practicing physicians or by owners or occupants of property where they occur; vaccination of all the population of the town may be required when the Board deems it necessary to public health. Disinfection is required in houses where infectious or contagious diseases have occurred. The marshal may compel the removal of all infectious material from private premises. Spitting on sidewalks and in public buildings is punishable with fine. Weeds must be cut from all private premises and sidewalks in front of same. Fresh meats sold from vehicles must be securely screened to avoid infection by flies.

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The Making of a Country.

The development of a country—the making of it—depends upon three things. In the first place it must have intrinsic value; it must have the confidence of the people who propose to build it, and last of all it must be advertised. Let either of these be lacking and a country will grow slowly or not at all.

Everybody here is interested in the development of Roosevelt county and the Portales country and all of us would hail with delight a prescription guaranteed to effect this result. Let us see if it is not possible to make these three essentials meet here and then let us give them a good chance to do their work.

There are those who doubt that this country has a producing capacity sufficient to make it prosperous and substantial, but be it said with all deference to these doubters that they are not in most cases men who came to stay and build homes. The men who have gone in whole-hearted to build homes and adapt their farming process to this soil and climate have the utmost confidence, as a rule, in its future and are most enthusiastic for its possibilities.

Some men have tried hard enough and failed because their methods did not meet conditions of climate here. They have tried to use the same crops and employ the same process as in the states whence they came. A necessary failure followed.

But the fact is that this soil is rich and remarkably productive when properly farmed. The amount of corn, milo-maize and kafir corn sold here this season is proof that crops of that sort can be grown here in an absolutely satisfactory way. Potatoes have been grown here with a yield of a hundred bushels per acre and that without the application of the expensive intensive methods necessary in the states. Sweet potatoes also grow in great abundance and of a quality surpassing those in the rainy sections. Beans, cucumbers, watermelons, cantaloupes, grapes and fruits need but ordinary attention to produce bountifully. When we have properly mastered processes, no other section can surpass us in the abundance and quality of its products.

It can not be denied that confidence in our country is growing. Our own home-builders are feeling more and more the assurance that their lot is happily cast and the discriminating newcomer sees here a future prosperous and substantial empire.

The question of confidence is not the one for us to settle. It is settled already. Our problem is that of advertisement—boosting. Let the world know what our country is and what it is capable of. Let every man be a booster and let us make it "sell" for its full value. In California whole districts are devoted to the production of one certain vegetable or fruit, as beans, grapes, etc. Each district is equally adapted for the production of all, but each one has been made famous for the production of a certain thing by the lavish use of vigorous advertising methods. Our country has the capacity and we can give it the fame if we stand together with an unflinching optimism and boost. Let's get together and boost.

A Ballotting System.

Inquiry was recently made by a new comer as to the ballotting system used in New Mexico. The reply came from a prominent lawyer of the territory and was to the effect that we have no system. The conversation developed the fact that practically no safeguards are employed in the matter of holding elections. Voters go to the polls to register their sentiment and express their wish only to find restraining influences free to embarrass them on every hand. This point needs no discussion for it is almost universally acknowledged that elections need to be safeguarded. The strongest of us enjoy freedom when we go to express our choice at the polls. Nor have we come to that millennial condition as yet where election corruptionists are absolutely lacking. Just as they are present in every state they are present in New Mexico to intimidate when they can, to buy when that is possible on a reasonable plane of expenditure. The fact is that there is hardly any other section in all the country which offers such opportunity for election fraud and the buying of votes as do those sections in New Mexico where the population is so largely Mexican. This reference to the Mexican takes into account and makes due allowance for the intelligent and self-respecting man of that nationality who thinks and votes for himself. But it must be acknowledged that a large majority of our Mexican population are too untrustworthy to be left unprotected from the plunder of the politician and too ignorant to vote on his own initiative and judgement.

New Mexico needs an election law, one carefully drawn guaranteeing to every intelligent citizen the right to vote and to vote without extraneous influence and denying suffrage to men incompetent to exercise the right. The Australian ballot system would satisfy the one demand and a literary requirement would satisfy the other. The English language is the national language of this country. Why should not all voters be required to have the ability to read and speak that language? It is urgently necessary to enact legislation speedily along this line and it seems to the Herald that only some such definite action can save us from the political corruption entirely too common in many parts of the country.

NEGRO OUTRAGE.

Young School Teacher, Girl of Nineteen Brutally Attacked by Negro. People Enraged.

Another sickening report of outrage comes from Rowlett, Texas where a young woman of nineteen years was found, near the school house where she was teacher, in an unconscious state, the result of a brutal assault by a negro. The following item from the Daily Panhandle states briefly the facts involved.

McKinney, Texas, March 11. Miss Minnie Turner, aged 19, teacher of the Rowlett school, eighteen miles west of here, was found unconscious near the school this morning.

When she recovered consciousness Miss Turner said a negro attacked her and knocked her down.

Officers left for the scene with bloodhounds. The entire section is stirred up. Hundreds of citizens are assisting in the search.

The negro will likely be violently handled if caught. Citizens are determined to end frequent attacks by negroes on white women in Collin and adjoining counties.

In our sober moments the most of us don't believe in mob law but under circumstances such as these many thoughtful men

would be swept along by a passionate outburst of indignation to any sort of lawlessness. Who ever solves this harrassing problem for the Gulf States will do them and the whole country a great benefaction.

The Religion of the Presidents

Interest in the inauguration of Hon. W. H. Taft as President of the United States during the present week has led to compilation of the creeds of former Presidents, which is thus set forth by the St. Louis Christian Advocate:

"Washington was an Episcopalian, and one of his biographers says he was a communicant, while another declares that although he was a regular attendant on the services of that church he was no more than an adherent and sympathizer. John Adams was a Unitarian, having been brought up in that faith and adhering to it all his life. Thomas Jefferson was charged with being a free thinker, but after his death his friends and family asserted that he was a believer in God and divine revelation, the immortality of the soul and a future life. Madison and Monroe were both members of the Episcopal church, remaining in that connection all their lives. John Quincy Adams was a Unitarian and for most of his life was connected with the same congregation which bore on its rolls the name of his father. During the greater part of his life, Gen. Jackson had no religious affiliation whatever, but in the evening of his days, and mainly through the influence of Mrs. Jackson, he attended the Presbyterian church, and after her death became a member.

"Martin Van Buren was not a member of any church, but was a regular attendant on the services of the Dutch Reformed church. William Henry Harrison was a communicant and for a time a vestryman in the Episcopal church. Tyler, like Harrison, was an Episcopalian, and personally a very devout man. Polk was baptized during his last illness by a Methodist clergyman, a friend and neighbor, and formerly received as member of the Methodist church, South. President Taylor was a regular attendant on the services of the Episcopal church, and although the testimony is somewhat conflicting, it seems probable that he was a member. Millard Fillmore was a Unitarian, born and raised in a family belonging to that denomination. President Pierce was a Trinitarian Congregationalist. Buchanan was a very active member of the Presbyterian church—Dallas News.

The Liquor Fight.

It is proper to confess, in the outset, that the forces of evil are in the ascendancy in public life in New Mexico as a whole. This applies especially to our Territorial Legislature though it does not mean that there are not good men in that body. The fact remains, however, that if we are to get any real reform measures through that body it must in some way be made over, eliminating a number of its present members.

A Bill was offered during this session providing a local option law for this territory, but it was so snubbed to sleep in the committee room probably not until it had cost poorer men thousands of dollars. One little town in an adjoining county, a town of only four hundred people, is reported to have sent a thousand dollars to Santa Fe. When nothing could be done from the bill the reform forces began to pour in petitions asking for its resurrection, and the latest news from the capital is that it may receive further attention. The liquor forces in the territory and their representatives in the assembly have probably decided that it would be better to have local option than general prohibition, and sixty

TO PROLONG LIFE 15 YEARS.

An Appeal to Insurance Companies to Teach Hygiene.

The average length of human life could be increased fifteen years—more than a third—if the people were educated to the rules of hygiene. Dr. Irving Fisher professor of political economy of Yale, and chairman of the committee of one hundred on national health, made this statement today in an appeal to life insurance companies to engage in a campaign of education for better hygienic conditions in the United States.

The resulting decreasing mortality he said, would so lessen the cost of insurance that the returns to policy holders would be many times more than the original expenditure. The there would be a vast economic gain to the country in general by reason of the prolongation of the lives of trained and efficient men.

Dr. Fisher made this statement to a meeting of the association of life insurance presidents, which was attended by company executives, medical directors and actuaries, as well as physicians and others active in the present anti-tuberculosis crusade.

"The insurance men, whom I have consulted as to whether it would pay life insurance companies to engage in the saving of lives, have been unanimous in their belief that the step would be a profitable one," said Dr. Fisher. "A fall of the death rate always promptly follows sanitation. Colonel Gorgas cut the death rate in Havana in two. The New York death rate responded at once to Colonel Warring's clean streets, and that of Rochester to Dr. Goler's crusade. It is announced that the death rate of New York is now 16.5, the lowest

Arbor Day Proclamation.
The territorial law provides that this day shall be set apart each year, known as Arbor Day, to be observed by the planting of trees and shrubbery, for the benefit and adornment of public and private grounds; that the Governor shall by proclamation at the proper time and season, call attention to this law and specify a day for its observance.
Now, therefore, I, Geo. Curry, Governor of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby designate Friday, March 26, 1909, as Arbor Day in the Territory of New Mexico, which shall be a holiday in all the public schools. Under the law it is the duty of the school officers and teachers, especially county superintendents of schools, to personally and actively promote the plans of the day by assisting and directing the children in planting trees.
This is an interesting portion of the Arbor Day Proclamation of Gov. Curry as sent to the office of the county superintendent of schools, I wish therefore, to call the attention of directors and teachers to the conditions and requirements of the above Arbor Day Proclamation, and respectfully ask their co-operation in making the day profitable.

The Plea of the Saloons.
The gentlemen who compose our town board were elected on a definite promise to pass an ordinance prohibiting the sale of liquor within the limits of the Town of Portales. After their election the saloon men of the town appeared before them and asked an extension of time promising that if allowed a short period in which to dispose of their stocks they would quietly retire and offer no resistance to the operation of the ordinance. The Board, wishing to be fair in every way, agreed to extend the time from March 8 to March 22 and everybody expected the saloon men to do what they had promised, but on the contrary they have taken advantage of the Board's generous action to employ counsel in the hope, ostensibly, of defeating the ordinance or nullifying the act of incorporation. This is regarded by the Board and by the people of Portales who have decreed the removal of the saloon as a breach of faith on the part of the liquor men who made their plea for time and their solemn promise to quietly withdraw if time should be granted. They now threaten an injunction in the event the Board refuses to grant further time—namely to the extent of licenses held by them.
The Herald is not the organ of the Board and does not attempt or presume to speak for them but it ventures to predict that the board will make no compromise and allow no extension of time. The people of Portales

have declared themselves on this question. They don't want the saloons and they don't mean to have them. The Herald does not believe the saloon men have a case but should they succeed in delaying the operation of this ordinance there can be no doubt they will have to go in a very short while.



PUBLICS
Their Annexation by Mexico Proposed if Uncle Sam Will Help.

City of Mexico, March 13.—The Mexico Herald today advocates the annexation of the five Central American states by Mexico. General opinion here is that intervention is inevitable and Mexico looks to the United States to make the final move.

INTERVENTION PROBABLE
 Washington, March 13.—Joint intervention by America and Mexico in the interest of peace in Central America is expected to be now under serious consideration.

Such intervention would be based on the obligation imposed on the two larger republics to see that the Central American peace pact, in which the five republics agreed to refrain from hostilities and submit quarrels between themselves to arbitration, is enforced.

The naval strength in the vicinity of Nicaragua will soon be increased by the presence of the Duquesne at Bluefields. The Duquesne sailed from Guantanamo yesterday.

It is now evident that with the moral support of Mexico, the United States intends to take action and that this will make lasting impression on Nicaraguans and convince them as well as the other Central Americans that the peace pact of 1907 must be held up to.—Daily Post-Intelligencer.

Unique Gift to Roosevelt.
 President Roosevelt has just been made the recipient of a handsome album, by an admirer who instructed the Consolidated Press Clipping Company of Chicago, over a year ago, to gather all newspaper editorial comments on the tour around the world of the U. S. battleship fleet.

The album contains over 2,100 clippings, divided into two volumes, 12x14 inches each, hand somely bound in black morocco with the following inscription in gold letters:
 "World cruise of the U. S. bat-

leship fleet. December 16, 1907, February 22, 1909."

Besides the editorial comments from the newspapers from every state in the Union, the clippings appearing in the Chicago Tribune and the New York Tribune, recording the progress of the warships, from port to port are chronologically arranged, as well as the domestic life and doing of the battleships from the pen of the fleet correspondent, whose articles appeared regularly in the great Metropolitan papers.

Throughout, illustrations of the various ships are interspersed. No doubt the president will value the present, not so much from an artistic view, but as a faithful expression of the people of the entire country, on the most remarkable achievement of modern times, and one of the crowning efforts of his administration.

A number of items selected for this album were taken from the Citizen.—Albuquerque Citizen.

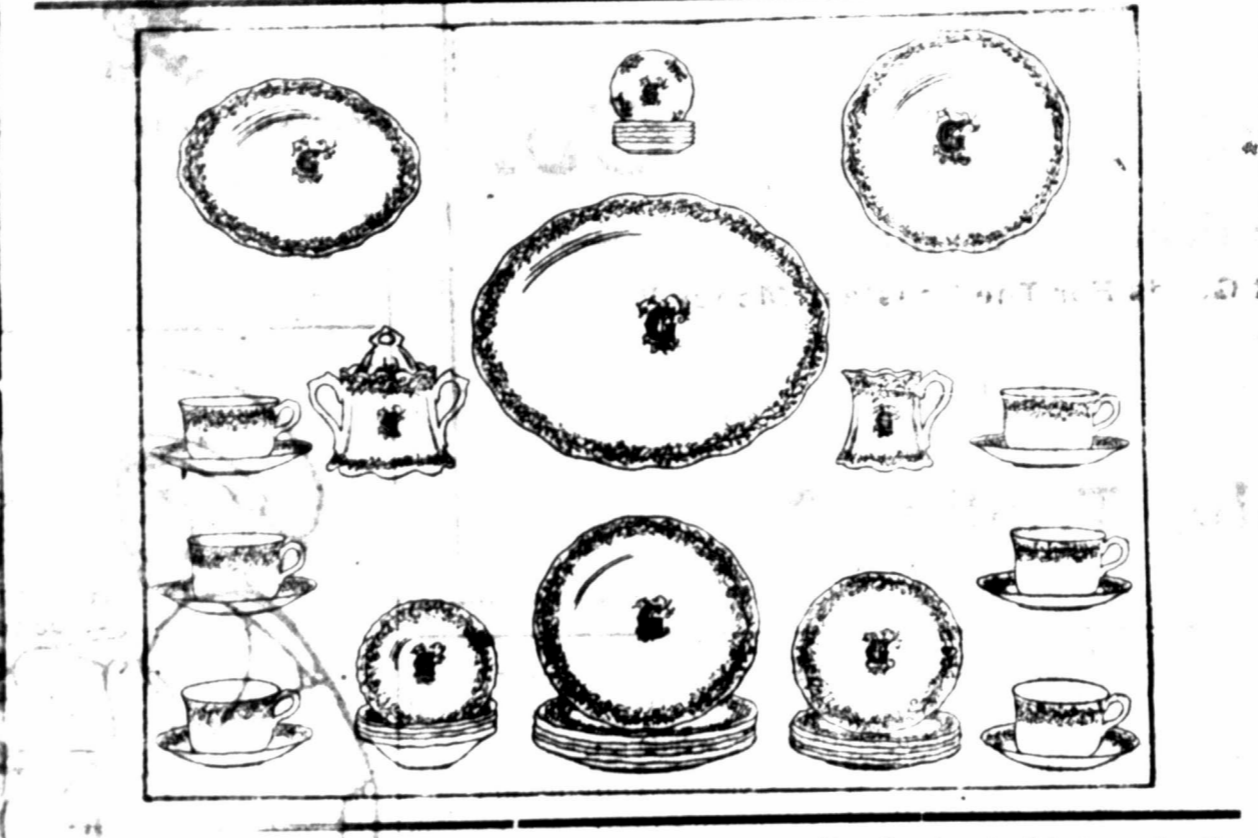
The Sidewalk Question.
