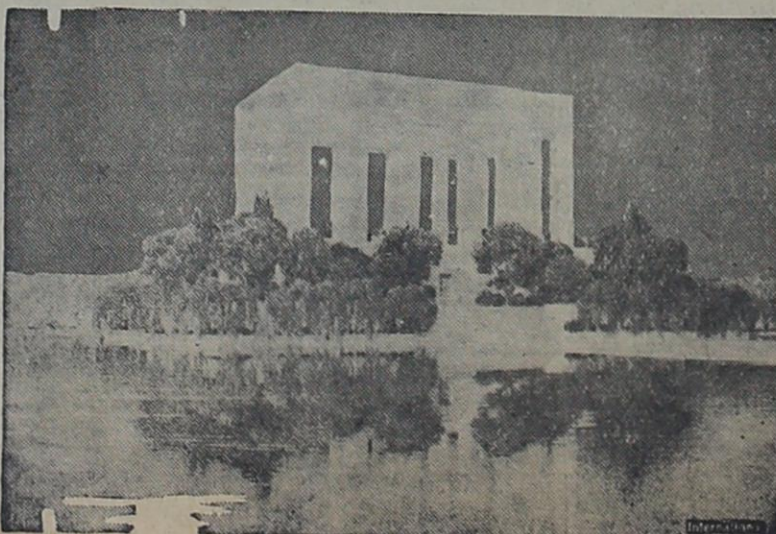

of Dimmitt and Castro County will give the new officials co-operation, the results of work now being outlined will be more than satisfactory to the most confirmed pessimist!

Up in Dalhart they had a "Cuss the Editor" week a short time ago. This was inaugurated immediately previous to a "Praise the Editor" week, the latter being the thought of several business men and the force in the Dalhart Texan newspaper office. The former, "Cuss the Editor" week was the product and idea of Editor John L. McCarty, of the Texan, and he was evidently of a humorous mood when this thought struck him. But the promulgators of the "Praise Week" put one over on him when they followed up with their very "unusual" idea, which brought much commendation from the entire city. The only criticism we can find with either event, was that in the "Cuss Week" there was no necessity for calling the public's attention to any particular time for their opinions—he usually gets it every week, from some sources, just after the paper is out! And a "Praise Week" for an editor is embarrassing to newspaper folk, and the publicity is, in nearly all cases, entirely too flattering!

The organization of a bull circle in Castro County is encouraging news, and should, we think, be encouraged further by the business men of Dimmitt. This is a step forward, and a step to better farming methods. It is a direct result of the night school, conducted by T. V. this year, we placed him in the 100th Congressional District. We don't know who represents the people in that bailiwick, but if he's as good as Jones, they should feel complimented at our error. Jones or Christopher on account of this error.

Revenue Collector Issues Warning To Taxpayers

Word has been received by the News from George Hopkins, collector of Internal Revenue, at Dallas, that promiscuous extensions on income tax returns will not be tolerated this year.

Heretofore, individuals and special accountants have asked for extensions during the last week of the time limit, March 15, with the result that much delay and confusion has resulted in government offices.

This year warning is issued in plenty of time, and those not filing their returns on time will be penalized, according to Mr. Hopkins.

Special note is made to those who depend upon tax experts to fill out their returns, that they will not be allowed the usual extensions at the eleventh hour because of various reasons, such as "Impossible to collect data," or "Physically impossible to reach all."

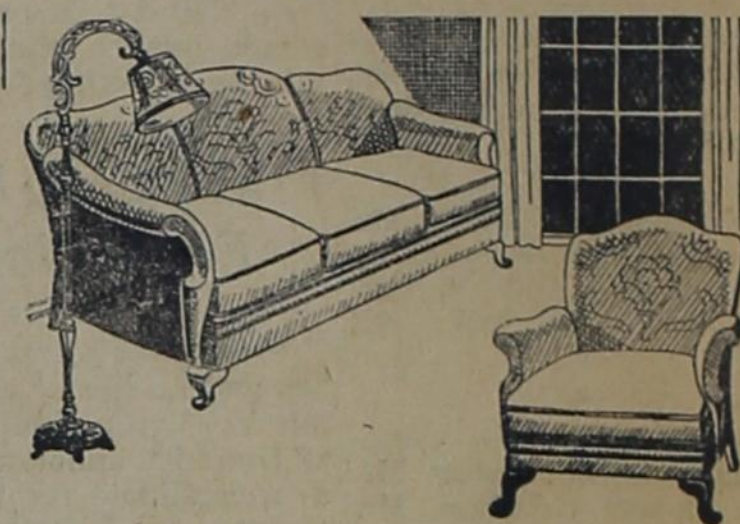
