# SUMMER NORMAL For Portales Professor T. W. Conway, Director.

County Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mrs. S. F. Culberson, announces that she has been fortunate enough to secure the services of Professor T. W. Conway, Superintendent of Public schools of Raton for director of the Summer Normal to be held in Portales beginning May 31st for those who hold 3d grade teacher's permits and beginning June 14th for what may be termed the "compulsory normal."

In this connection it may be well to quote the statute touching the matter of required attendance upon normals of this character in New Mexico. It runneth thus: La Carporter

"Institute attendance of at east two weeks is required of all teachers. A four weeks institute is permitted for all holders of third grade certificates and holders of permits. Such teachers who have taught at least three months during the twelve months previous to said four week's institute, may upon attendance for the full four weeks receive \$15.00 each from the common school income fund upon presenting to the Territorial Auditor a certificate of such attendance by the County Superintendent, the institute conductor, and the Territorial Superintendent of Public Instruction." Portales people will be glad to see a large attendance upon these sessions of the normal.

ing the past year for foreign missions amounted to \$461,197.42. which is a gain of more than \$50,000 over last year.

Another feature of the work presented was the report of home missions, which was as follows:

Secretary Gray of the Southera Baptist convention, in his report of the home mission board. showed 5,917 churches organized and 188,003 persons baptized. The report says: "Our work in Cuba and the Southwest is yielding large returns and the probability of our entering New Mexico will make our trans-Mississippi territory greater. The amount expended by the home mission board during the year included the following: Arkansas, \$5,800; Louisiana, \$11,498; Mississippi, \$3,250; Oklahoma, \$18,975; Texas, \$15,536; and in addition all Southern States on their own initiative expended in the same work a total of \$233,096. Perhaps, the next to home missions in importance is the Sunday school work of Southern Baptists, as presented by Dr. Frost, which may be gathered from the following report:

In presenting the report of the. Sunday school board, Dr. J. M. Frost of Nashville, Tenn., secretary of the organization, said that collections by the board during the year just closed amounted to \$205,000, an increase of less be annulled. He told of the purpose of the board to establish a chair of Sunday school pedagogy in the Southern parties on the ground that the Baptist Theological seminary, to be supported by a permanent endowment fund of \$60,000, and the statement was received with enthusiasm.

Besides these phases of work. the question of endowment for the Southern Baptist Theological seminary, located at Louisville, was raised, and the handsome sum of \$115,000 was contributed. From this it may be gathered that Southern Baptists have raised more than \$800,000, baptized 188,003 persons, and organized 5,917 churches in the home field.



The First National bank will move their present building from its location and in its stead erect a two-story brick 50x100 feet, costing not less than fifteen thousand dollars.



May 14, 1909. Hon. W. E. Lindsey, Portales, N. M. Dear Mr. Lindsey:

I note all you state concerning the flowing springs adjacent to Portales. I agree with you it ought to have a pumping plant similar to that of Deming.

This is a matter to be handled by the Reclamation Service. I would suggest this plan of action. Call a mass meeting of the people who would be benefited by such a plant. Pass resolutions asking Mr. F. H. Newell, Service to take up an investigaaround Portales, and to recommend the passage of the bill I will introduce to construct a power plant.

You must get all these people to run his own pumping plant together, enthuse them, have them interested to the highest degree and I think we can pull this off. I will send you a copy of the bill just as soon as it is printed. Very truly yours, W. H. ANDREWS. 




