Irrigation Plant Projected and Organization Effected

At a largely attended and enthusiastic and business-like mass meeting held at the court house in Portales, Saturday, June 10th at 2 o'clock, the sentiment in favor of a large irrigation project to cover the 160,000 acres of irrigable land in the Portales Inland Valley adjacent to Portales was crystallized into a definite plan and an efficient organization.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. L. R. Hough. E. P. Aldredge was elected chairman, T. J. Molinari, secretary and Robert Hicks treasurer. A committee of three, viz: Messrs. W. E. Lindsey, J. A. Fairly and B. J. Reagan, were appointed to name a board of directors or an executive committee of twelve members who should proceed to get an accurate map and plat of the entire shallow water area, determine the depth to water and the amount of water available and especially whether or not the water supply is inexhaustible; also get figures and estimates and all facts relative to the installation of the plant, before bringing a petition before the county commissioners.

It was also definitely decided to undertake a bond issue proposition rather than wait upon the

government project. This action was taken for several reasons: (1) We have no assurance that the Government project can be installed under 3 to 5 years; (2) It will be more expensive than the bond issue proposition. (3) The people directly interested can in this way share in the management and direction of the installation and operation of the plant. (4) It can be made large enough to cover the entire area by bond issue plan—even if it calls for the installation of three plants instead of one.

As is doubtless understood, the committee will proceed along the line of the Carey act, being guided by the many similar projects already under operation in different parts of the country.

It is earnestly hoped that the committee will be able to get at all the facts relative to the water supply, together with such facts, figures and estimates as will enable them to report to a still larger mass-meeting in the near future at which time permanent organization can be effected under the Carey act. The committee will appreciate any help or information which may be given by any one.

The Town Parks and the Test Wells.

In week before last's issue of the Herald we called attention to the need of establishing at once two town parks; one on the plot of ground offered to the town by Mr. Coe Howard on the west side of Portales on what is known as the Will's place; the other on the east side of town on the school section. It was shown that the ground would cost us nothing; that the citizens would be glad to have an arbor day in the fall and one in the spring and to give not only most of the trees and shrubbery, but also the labor in helping to set them and to beautify these places. Finally it was pointed out that the work of securing donations of trees and labor could be arranged by a special committee—perhaps the Woman's Club—and would prove a great uplift and means of developing a town pride and patriotism. Now comes another suggestion which may be credited to our fellow-townsmen,

Rev. W. L. Heck, though we had precisely the same notion about it.

TWO TEST WELLS.

And the suggestion is this: that the irrigation committee in conjunction with the town board could sink one well on each of these plots of ground where we propose to build the town parks and in so doing not only provide the water necessary to take care of the park trees and shrubbery, but also make these wells deep enough so that we could make a thorough and complete test of the water supply of this immediate neighborhood. Now, Mr. Heck and others have volunteered to donate liberally to the sinking of these wells, not only because the town needs the parks but because it will help us to understand precisely what is the water supply of this part of the Portales Valley.

Now, if you think this is a good suggestion: push it along. Speak to the town board and the executive committee and get them in co-operation and let us begin this work at once.

Income Tax Passes

By a vote of 317 to 14 the lower house of Congress, on Monday, June 12th, passed the joint resolution providing for the submission of the question of an amendment to the Constitution of the United States in support of the income tax, after the proposal of President Taft. As was pointed out by the few republicans, it may be defeated by the various state legislatures; but it is a bare possibility and so far as we are able to judge it will not happen—unless the great corporations and moneyed magnates of the county simply purchase the legislatures. The Herald expresses the belief that the sentiment of the people is so overwhelmingly in favor of the meas-

ured by the state legislatures and that on account of the revenue which will be derived from the income tax, the two per cent tax on corporations will be larger than necessary.

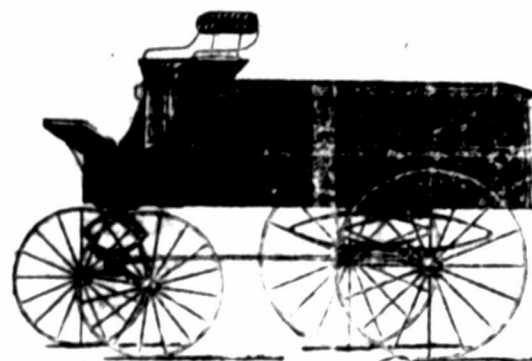

Texas Baptist Encampment

Waco, Tex., July 10.—Rev. M. T. Andrews of Waco, the corresponding secretary of the Texas State Baptist Encampment Association, gave out the following:

"The fifth annual assembly of the encampment will convene in the far-famed Hancock Park, one mile out of Lampasas, July 22 to August 1. Famous speakers in and out of Texas handling every department of church work will make up the program. Rev. W. B. Riley D. D. of Minneapolis, Minn., and Rev. L. R. Scarborough D. D. of Texas are the evangelistic speakers. Rev. S. J. Porter D. D. of Richmond, Va., and Rev. J. F. Love D. D. of Dallas will speak on Missions.

"Rev. Harvey Beauchamp D. D. of Dallas, our Texas Sunday school expert, will have charge of that department, while E. E. Lee of Dallas, one of the strongest B. Y. P. U. forces in the South, will lecture daily on the Young People's Work. Rev. J. B. Gambrell D. D. will deliver a series of his unique addresses, and the women's work will be in charge of Mrs. J. B. Gambrell. Other speakers will be Rev. W. A. Hamlett of Temple, Rev. J. E. Johnson of Waco, President S. P. Brooks of Waco, Rev. E. G. Townsend of Belton, Rev. A. J. Barton D. D. of Waco, Rev. Weston Bruner D. D. of San Antonio, Rev. C. C. Young of Cameron, Rev. Geo. W. McCall of Brownwood, President W. A. Wilson of Belton, and others.

Good Roads.

There is a great deal said about irrigation in our county. Now we are truly hoping that we can get it and anything else in the way of an improvement.

Why not agitate a good road movement? Good roads are just as important along progressive lines, as water works and sewerage systems to our towns; and why not have better highways? We have numbers of roads leading into our towns that are sadly neglected—roads that need cleaning out and grading up in some places where loaded teams can hardly drag through in time of a wet spell. The manner in which new roads have been opened up heretofore are not in accordance with our road laws in a great many instances.

When a new road has been petitioned for and allowed by the court and road notices posted, notifying the people the width of road, some change their fences and set on proper lines and others just let them stand till they are forced to move them out of road and are torn down by the overseer. Where there has been a 80 foot road granted some set back 30 feet from center of road and some only 20 feet. Some claim the old lines for roads and others claim the new lines made by the county surveyor and the result is jogs in county roads, which looks bad and is not in accordance with law.

TAKE NOTICE

All parties having fences along the public highways must see that their fences are not setting in road, and if they are, change them on proper lines at earliest convenience. Otherwise it will be my duty to take them down. Find out the width of your road and be sure you set them back the proper width. Any obstruction left upon these roads must be moved.

There are a great many people who do not know that we have a fence law here or do not think roads need work. The law says every able bodied man between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age shall pay three dollars road tax or in lieu thereof work three days. So don't think three days work is more than the roads need. How can there be made a good road through sandy belts of county? My plan is to plow and kill all vegetation in road and let sand blow out to clay. Any suggestions for the betterment of our county roads will be appreciated.

This bright healthy little fellow but little more than twelve years old, the fifth son of our esteemed neighbors and friends, Mr. and Mrs. C. With him also came the older daughter and sister Mrs. Sid Birdwell, of Tulsa, Texas. The funeral services were conducted at the grave by Pastor E. P. Alldredge of the Baptist church, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Herald expresses its profoundest sympathy to the entire bereaved family.

Poultry-Culture.

Dear Readers: Many letters are received by me asking if a woman with small capital can make a living with poultry. It can be done as I have done it in New Mexico for six years. Like all means of livelihood it requires skill and lots of grit. There is no easy way, but one continued painstaking, and one sure fact, unless you take an interest in your poultry you cannot succeed. Mrs. Hen requires your undivided attention. She takes no excuse for a late breakfast, dinner, and after dark she cannot see, she will tell you next day by laying no eggs, and keep it up. Your best friends must be excused when Mrs. Hen calls for her meals, and you can put it down for a fact, it took me several years to learn. Mrs. Hen will support you, if you give her your attention; your friends will not. As to the best breed, there is none. Take your choice, and once done do not change. There are laying strains, established poultry ranches have them. It takes long to breed layers from such stock. Hens that lay over 200 eggs a year are hard to breed from the best strains, and must be had before one succeeds. It is by artificial feeding and housing the wild jungle hen produce such vast numbers of eggs that supply our large cities. There is no secret in feeding, an egg contains so much matter that must be fed her to make eggs, and one feed alone will not give it. I often hear, my hens are too fat to lay, that's easy explained, you have fed your hens for the market, not to produce eggs. Hens running at large, pick up during summer, large quantities of bugs and will lay eggs. Chicago and other places must have eggs; it's by artificial feeding the demand is supplied.

Roosevelt's Ball Game.

Col. Teddy Roosevelt, U. S. A., who is at present slaying man-eating tigers in the African Kingdom of Ugyasambo, put in the late Fourth of July playing an American Sunday game of base ball. The Col. organized two base ball clubs among the natives, calling one Teddy's Club and the other the American Congress Nine. He annexed the captaincy of the Teddy Club and, using his big stick for a bat and acting as his own umpire, speedily beat his congressional opponents to a standstill and then took victoriously humorous

pot shots at them with his favorite tiger killing rifle. A big American Fourth of July and Sunday base ball banquet was given in honor of the victory of the Teddy Club, which was presided over by a local Booker Washington arbitrarily and affectionately selected by Teddy himself. After the banquet the entire Ugyasambo nation assembled to the Col., who finished up this Afro-American Sunday and Fourth of July by writing a highly colored cable message to Billy Bossam, Washington, D. C.—Raton Reporter.

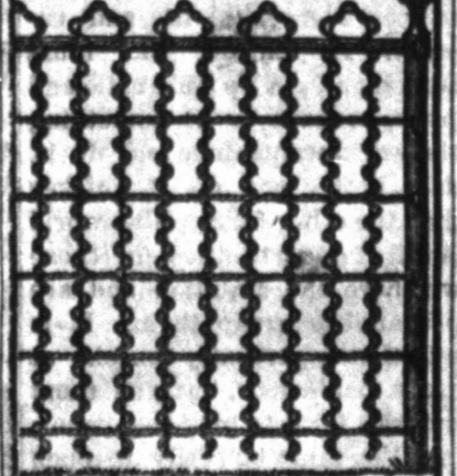

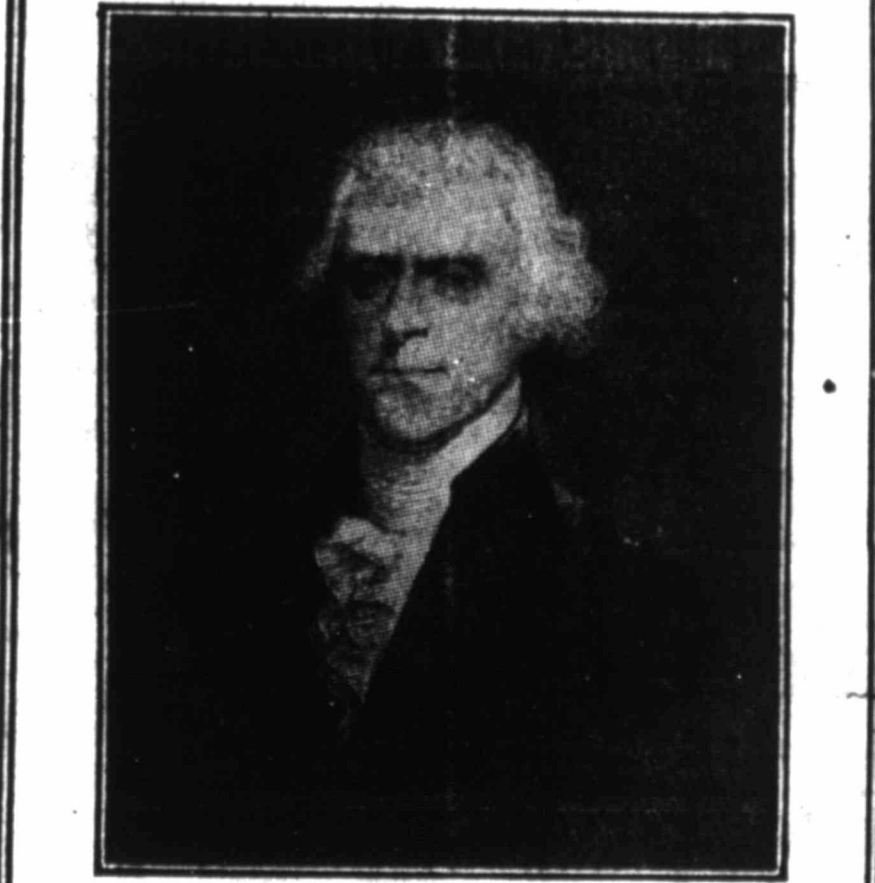
