No one with any bowels of com passion can contemplate the passage of an income tax without a gush of tears, for it means suf fering to those who have never known what it is to suffer, and sorrow in places where there has hitherto been naught but happiness and laughter.

It cannot be denied, of course, that such a measure is the only clear, straight way to equalize conditions of taxation between the rich and the poor, but what of that? Here in America the working people have never been used to equality and considera tion, and a change in our national policy will only unsettle and dis-

Why not let things remain as they are? The poor people are accustomed to injustice, so used to getting the worst of it that they have really cont to like it. The rich, on the other hand, have never known what it is to be annoyed by tax gatherers, and enforcement of the square deal is bound to come to them a a shock, an outrage.

It does seem a triffe hard that the toilers should bear all the burdens of government, but it must be remembered that they have been doing it for years, and have come to regard it as their duty. There is also grave doubt as to whether they will know how to conduct themselves if any change is made in this condition of things.

What if they fail to stop at gratitude and appreciation, and tear on to such anarchistic ideas as EQUAL RIGHTS all along the line? This is a matter for very earnest consideration, for it is a historical fact that common people have always been ready to take a mile when given so much as an inch.

IMMEDIATE WORK ON PROJECT EXPECTED.

Las Vegas, N. M., Aug. 3.-The people of this city are rejoicing over the practical assurance of the early construction of the mammoth irrigation project on the Las Vegas Land grant, that will reclaim ten thousand acres of mess land. For two months past a force of surveyors have been making preliminary surveys for this proposed project on behalf of D. A. Camfield, a capitalist of Greeley, Col., who entered into a contract with the grant board some time ago for the ionation to him of the acreage above mentioned, providing he constructed a reservoir and ditch system that would place the same under irrigation. Camfield was given an option on a designated tract and since then has had a corps of engineers in the field running lines for the irrigation

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


