You state that "the eity would lose thirty-two thousan dollars a year by golng on a no-license basis and would have $t$
add that much to the direet tax now levied upon the propert of the people

You do sot take into consideration the extra cost of running a eity when it is full of saloons. The police forc are lioensed, and while I do not know what our police forc costa, it would be safe to gay that it would not cost half a uruch if the elty whas "dry." Then take into consideration the costs of the police court, the feeding and care of prisoner and to drunkennees and you srill that your thirty two thousan to drunkenness and you will had that your thirty-two thousand ont.

We critiocied the report on the that an attempt to put it on a money basis would serve a boomerang, and come back upon the inventor. The object of the report in question was to show that the sale of liquor increased the police expenses of a town in a sum greater than the amount received for licenses, and to show the erro of this contention we called attention to the experience of Albuquerque, where the amount recived from liquor license pays one-third of the entire expense of maintaining the whole machinery of the city government.
Hon. E. S. Stover, in a communication which appears
elsewhere in this morning's paper takes elsewhere in this morning's paper, takes issue with us on thi much greater on account of the liquor traffic that it practically wipes out the entire sum received for liquor licenses. show the fallacy of his argument it is only necessary call the attention of the reader to the fact that the maintenance ur city police department, on its present basis, costs in round figures, sixteen thousand dollars a year, while the liquor license bring into the city treasury thirty-two thousand dollars a or enough to pay the cost of the whole
city on its present basis, twice over.

Mr. Stover attempts to sustain his position by charging the city with the extra burden put upon the district court
by the liquor traffic throughout the country, but that is too unfair to merit any discussion. The bulk of the business created for the district court by drunkenness, probably ninetyfive per cent, comes from the numerous low hell holes which are permitted to run throughout the county, dispensing the most virulent "forsty rod" whisky, at a merely nominal license. The practical way to meet that evil is to have the legislature give us a local option lay, which will give to each njoy, of regulating the traffic in their towns and cities now
