**CHIEF JUSTICE MILLS  
 APPOINTED GOVERNOR**

When asked this afternoon over the long distance telephone if he had been proffered the position of governor by President Taft, Chief Justice W. J. Mills replied affirmatively. "Will you accept the position?" he was asked. "Yes," was the reply. Justice Mills was reached at his home in Las Vegas by the news of his appointment after a number of futile attempts had been made to reach him from this city.

THE NEWS RECEIVED HERE.

The news that Justice Mills had received the appointment as governor was received this morning in Albuquerque in a private telegram from Las Vegas which contained only the information that President Taft had tendered the position to him and asked for his acceptance. It did not say whether or not he would accept. "This appointment is going to stir up the biggest kind of a row," said one on the inside of the Republican ring this afternoon. "Mark my words, Mills will not satisfy the party in New Mexico."

Other Republicans predicted that the selection would never be confirmed and that the committee on territories would be besieged and forced to take a decided action.

One of the humorous phases of the situation is the fact that the ride of the W. H., or "Bull" Andrews. Tripping over the marshes and plains is the delegate, hurrying to rescue the grand old party from an embarrassing plight at Washington. But ride as he might threaten as he may the Hitchcock, Luna and Taft conference on the affair without his kindly advice leaving nothing for the party to do but to retrace his steps back to the starting point.

Among the people of Albuquerque generally the appointment of Justice Mills was good news, as the judge is popular here and well liked, and it is thought his administration will reflect credit on New Mexico.

The friendship between President Taft and Justice Mills which began at Yale may have been the reason for the selection of the latter to succeed Governor Curry. Justice Mills graduated from the Yale law school in 1877, a year before President Taft graduated, and the friendship which began during school days has been continued in after life.

William Joseph Mills was born at Yazoo City, Miss., January 11, 1849. His father was William Mills of Virginia, and his mother was Harriet Beale of Philadelphia. His father died when he was but a child and he moved with his mother to Connecticut, where his mother later remarried.

Previous to graduation at Yale, Justice Mills attended private schools and graduated at Norwich Free Academy. After leaving Yale he practiced law at New Haven, Conn., and later in New Mexico, his appointment as chief justice of the New Mexico supreme court coming from President McKinley. His first commission was dated January 31, 1898.

Twice reappointed by President Roosevelt, his present term will expire January 30, 1910.

Justice Mills was a member of both branches of the Connecticut legislature at different times and before making New Mexico his home took a prominent part in the affairs of Connecticut. Justice Mills has two children, Wilson W. Mills, aged 20, who is a student at Yale and Madeline, aged 13, who is with her father at Las Vegas.

**POPE SUCCEEDS MILLS.**

Judge William H. Pope of Roswell has been appointed chief justice to succeed Justice Mills, according to a message received this afternoon by Judge Edward A. Mann from Governor Curry, who received word of the appointment direct from Washington. Judge Pope has been associate justice of the New Mexico supreme court since October 1903, and previous to that time served for about a year as judge of the court of the first instance under President Taft, then governor general of the Philippines.—The Tribune Citizen.

**GOOD BYE OLD BOOZIE.**

Did you say, "Prohibition don't prohibit"? Well, any way there was a 3 or 4 dozen case of dear old booze that came down the line from Clovis some days since; made its way out to a neighbor's coal bunk; and after spending several lonely and repining hours out there by itself, was dug up by Messrs. Chas. Duncan and Tom Reynolds; escorted to Judge Seay's office; asked to give an account of itself and, on refusing, was sentenced to the dust and filth whence it came for contempt of court; and was taken out on the court house lawn and broken to peices to remind the natives that it's "good bye old booze, good bye, in Portales." Unfortunately in this instance, the whiskey appears to have been stored on the premises of a man who had no interest in it. It is a fact that sometimes prohibition, like other laws, against murder, theft, gambling and prostitution for example, do not prohibit; but for what reason? Just two: In the first place, because there are some saloon men (not all) and still more hangers-on at the saloons who make it a business to do as they please and they please to sell whiskey, law or no law. But is this a reason for granting these same men a license? If so, why not grant every man who kills another a license? And why not grant every adulterous man or woman a license? And the men who desire to gamble and in the face of the law, get together and play poker, why not grant them a license to gamble? The law against gambling does not always prohibit—grant the gamblers a license therefore, and say to the world by so doing that gambling is a good thing and ought to have the sanction of all good people and be upheld by the law. And, as we have started out in the business, why not also license embezzlement, theivery and arson, for the law against none of these things prohibit. BUT WHY DO THEY NOT PROHIBIT? Because there are some people who propose to sell whiskey, to gamble, to steal and to commit adultery, law or no law? Yes, and there is another reason, and that is because the officers of the law haven't the courage to do their sworn duty? And sometimes, when the officer would do his duty, the people do not support him. On the other hand, people sometimes conclude that an officer who is doing his sworn duty is persecuting them because he happens to catch them. Bosh! An officer must catch every violator he can, whether it be his friend or mine, whether it be his brother or mine. It is not a matter of friendship; but a matter of law and of justice. But some one says: "He didn't catch the other fellow." No, and no officer ever caught every violator; but we venture the assertion that Chas. M. Duncan, if given a chance, will make dear old booze mighty scarce about Portales.

Why not save yourself \$50 an acre in the purchase of some good irrigable land? You can do so by purchasing the propositions on page 3, then subscribing for water right at \$35 an acre. **PERSONAL LIBERTY.**

The liquor dealers, recognizing that their very obvious pecuniary interest would lessen the weight of any argument which they might publicly advance, are making their fight under cover of organizations purporting to represent those who use liquor. Many well-meaning men have been misled into believing that every attempt to lessen the evils of intemperance is a "fanatical attack" on "personal liberty." It is time the phrase "personal liberty" were defined. What is meant by "personal liberty?" Does it mean that a person has a right to drink any quantity, at any time, and in any place, no matter what injury he may inflict upon others? If not, with whom rests the right to fix limitations? A drunken man is a menace to the lives and property of those about him; have his neighbors no right to protect themselves? A drunkard robs his wife and children, and he may finally make his family and himself a charge upon society; has society no right to protect itself? The saloon is next of kin to the brothel and the gambling hall; it is a rendezvous for the criminal element and the willing tool of the corrupt politician; has not the body politic a right to protect itself from the demoralization which the saloon works? The right to drink does not necessarily include the right to demand the establishment of a saloon. The right to drink is sufficiently protected by any arrangement that permits the reasonable use of liquor under reasonable conditions; and it must be remembered that the right to drink, like any other right, can be forfeited. Nothing is more sacred than the right to life, and yet one may forfeit his right to life if he uses it in such a way as to threaten the life of another. So, the man who drinks to excess may forfeit the right to drink; even the moderate drinker may forfeit the right to drink in moderation if, not content with reasonable regulation, he insists that liquor shall be sold under conditions that constitute a menace to the home and the state. The man who desires to drink moderately ought to join with those who seek to reduce the evils of drink to the lowest possible point instead of allying himself with those who ignore the evils of intemperance and resist every effort to put forth for the protection of society.—Commoner.

**THE GUNNISON TUNNEL.**

ITS BUILDING COST \$3,000,000. RECLAIMS 147,000 ACRES OF LAND.  
One of the unique feats of President Taft's 14,000 miles swing around the country was his opening of the flood gates of the Gunnison tunnel, at Montrose, Colorado, which carries 1,200 cubic feet of water per second and which is to irrigate 147,000 acres of land. The Uncompahgre Valley, in Western Colorado, has long been noted for the fertility of its soil and the splendid flavor, size and coloring and form of the fruit grown there by irrigation from the small stream found there. It was also known that only a few miles away, on the opposite side of a high mountain ridge, the abundant waters of the Gunnison River were running to waste. How to get to the thirsty valley beyond the mountain ridge. Everybody's Magazine for October thus describes the work of tunnelling this mountain ridge  
Against a precipitous wall hung men and steam drills in mid-air. The tremor and rumble of dynamite charges, followed by the clatter of tons of rock crashing into the abyss, drowned out the drone of the treacherous stream. Foot by foot, a wagon road, winding steeply upon itself, was hewn out of the solid rock. Where not even a goat could have found foothold, power houses, machine shops, and quarters for men were stuck like hornets' nests against the side of the cliff.  
"West from the River Portal, and east from the Uncompahgre end, the gnawing of the tunnel was begun. Through solid rock they bored, through quicksands that had to be timbered foot by foot. In the west end of the tunnel, the men tapped an underground stream charged with carbonic acid gas, which goused them with a 100 gallon a-minute soda fountain and drove all hands helter skelter toward daylight.  
"For ten years, working in three shifts, day and night, the engineers drove the gigantic bore, averaging a progress of 250 feet a month and removing more than 5,000,000 two-horse wagon-loads of material. Then came a day when the men in the eastern heading could make out the pounding of the drills of the men in the western heading, and two weeks later came the final charge that ripped through the separating wall of rock, while men leaped joyously from one heading into the other; for the long, dangerous, tedious work at last was done."  
It is noticeable that the cutting of this tunnel, which was but six miles in length, cost ten years of incessant toil, not to speak of the \$3,000,000. And yet it is estimated by the government that the increased valuation of this 147,000 acres of land is at least \$100 an acre, which would mean that this three million dollars has brought about a net gain of over eleven millions of dollars.

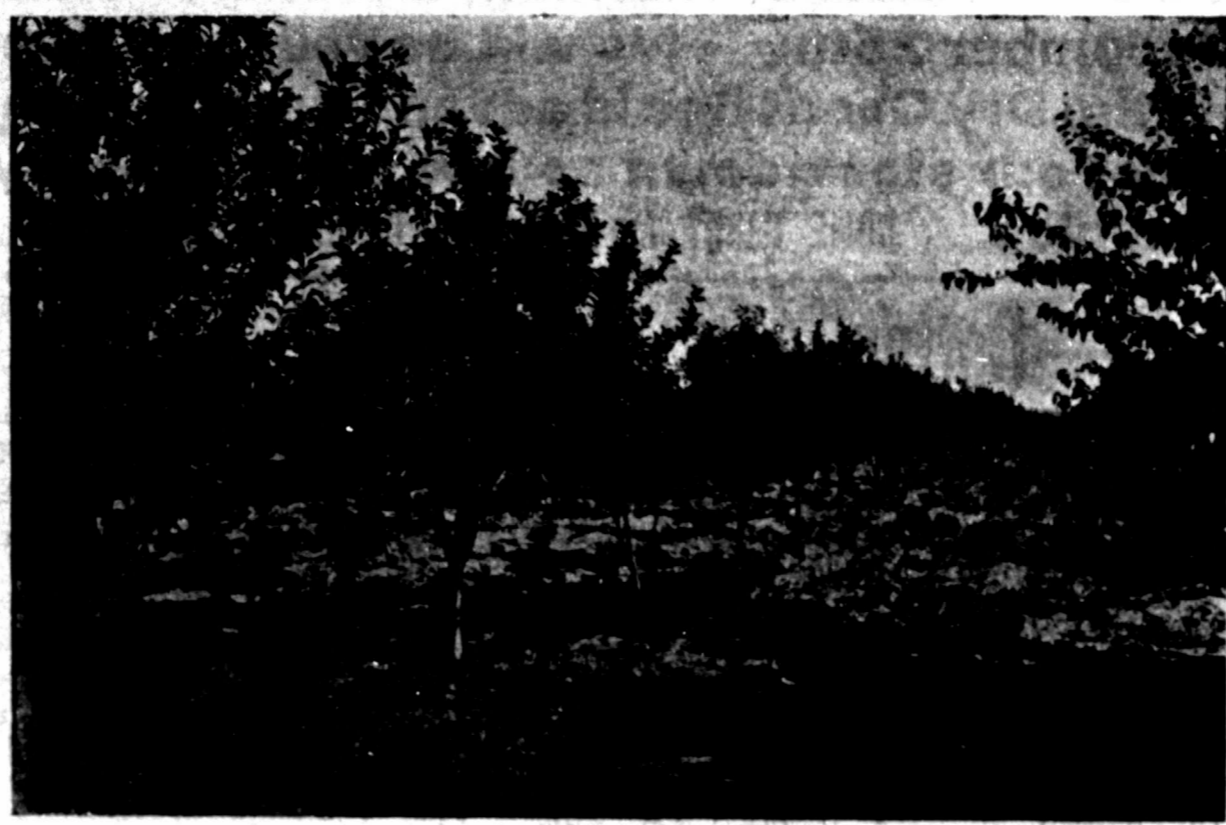
