As this doubling of the transmission line would cost the Western Construction Company \$50,000, we have no right to expect them to stand for it.





WHY ALABAMA VOTED DOWN PROHIBITION

Birmingham, Alabama, Dec. 1 .--- United States Senator Joseph F, Johnston, of Alabama, yesterday issued the following statement on the effect of the defeat of the prohibition amendment in Alabama:

"The election determined that the men of Alabama did not wish to write into their constitution police measures, nor surrender rights they have expressly reserved.

"It does not mean the return of the saloons or any backward step in public morals.

"It means that Alabama is conservative and not to be shaken off her feet by mere sentimental appeals."

"Why did Alabama vote down the stringent constitutional amendment for prohibition?" One reason is that many of the best people in Alabama did not feel the need of the amendment, believing upon good grounds that the police regulations and the strong local option laws already in force in the state were quite sufficient. Hence many pronounced prohibitionists were not prepared to go the length of the drastic amendment presented in the issue. For another thing, Alabama-like most other stateswere not prepared for so sweeping a change in so short a time. In this lies a great lesson for reformers on any line-especially for the moral advancement of a people, viz. that it is a mistake in policy and expediency to undertake to revolutionize the thoughtlife and habits of a people in a day. There needs to be a gradual process of elemination, time for thought, opportunity for observing the experiment here and there and above all, there must be unceasing education, in doctrination. People are to be won, one by one and not nation by nation or even family by family, and the greatest harm may come to the most blessed cause - indeed is sure to come-if this principle is overlooked, as was witnessed in the national adoption of Christianity by Constantine. But the greatest factor in the defeat of the Alabama prohibitory amendment was the corruption fund of the great breweries and the bestializing influence of the saloon men in the state. But, Alabama has not gone back to the saloons and indeed has no notion of returning thither. As few states in the Union, she has the whiskey traffic under the strictest regulation; and who knows, when the people hove had 'ime to fully test the laws in force, Alabama may be able to vote a constitutional amendment.

The bill for the admission of the territories of New Mexico and Arizona into the union of states, and the bill which it is believed is certain will pass the United States congress at the session just opened, was introduced in the house of representatives yesterday by representative Hamilton of Michigan, chairman of the house committee on territories. Today, Tuesday morning, it will be introduced in the senate by Senator Borah, of Idaho. That the bill will pass congress at this session does not admit of a doubt.

STATEHOOD BILL INTRODUCED IN CONGRESS.

This statehood bill is an administration measure. It is said to have been written by President Taft in collaboration with Secretary of the Interior Ballinger and Attorney General Wickersham. It is designed to meet the objections offered to former measures of this kind and is likely to go through both the house and senate practically without amendment.

Every effort will be brought to bear for its rapid passage and as far as known now practically all opposition to the measure will be withdrawn and New Mexico will be a state this year.

The bill provides for the election of delegates to a constitutional convention at which a constitution will be drawn up for the new state of New Mexico, to be submitted to the people. It provides, however, that officers for the state shall not be elected at the time of the vote on the ratification of the constitution, but shall be chosen at an election to be held after the constitution has been passed upon by the president and the state of New Mexico is formally proclaimed. Thereafter the people will proceed to the elec tion of a state government and until such time the present territorial officials will remain in their positions. The capital is to remain a Miss Thomas, of Elida. at Santa Fe until 1915, after which date the people may vote on its location.

The bill makes liberal appropriations of land for the support of territorial institutions, allowing 120,000 acres for university purposes.

The bill as affecting New Mexico follows in full, similar provisions being made in the case of Arizona.-Albuquerque Morning Journal.



POPULATION INCREASES 20.000 FINANCES IN GOOD SHAPE_48,000 PUPILS IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 28. In his annual report for the fiscal year ended last June 30, Secretary Ballinger of the Interior CURE FOR AFFINITY HABI Department makes the following observations in matters concerning the welfare of the territory of New Mexico. He says:

NEW MEXICO

"The estimated population o the territory of New Mexico is now 470,000, an increase of about 20'000 over last year. The additions to the population have been mostly from the middle, northern and middle-western states, the foreign immigration being less than one per cent.

"The finances of the territory are in good condition, the net bonded indebtedness on May 31, 1909, being \$912,420.51; the net receipts for the eleven months husband's habits.' ending May 31 were \$1,611,159. 83, and the expenditures during the same period were \$1,083,934. 67, leaving a balance on hand, June 1st, of \$527,225.16. All territorial funds are deposited with approved depositories, are protected by ample bonds, and draw interest at the rate of three per cent per annum on daily bal ances.






