NEW RAILROAD FROM TUCUMCARI TO ROSWELL

For the past month, Albert Morrison, a railroad promoter from New Jersey, has been in the city, and has secured the data and all other information necessary to promote another road out of this city.

The above has been selected for the road, and it is to first run from here to Tucumcari, a distance of 150 miles, at which point it will connect with the Rock Island system. Facts and figures which are reasonably accurate showing the earnings of the new road in freight tonnage and passenger traffic. One of the best points in favor of the new road is that Mr. Morrison has asked for nothing up to date in the way of cash, and states that all preliminaries will be fully carried out without any extra cost to the citizens here, showing that he is willing to go into the minor details himself.

The corporation papers have been made out and sent to Santa Fe today to be filed. In this Mr. Morrison does not ask the citizens here to bear any of the burdens, but has chosen for the board of incorporators the best representative citizens of the town.—Roswell Register Tribune

PROSPERITY CERTAIN AT PORTALES

Portales, N. M., Jan. 2.—Portales might be said to be celebrating her tenth anniversary this New Year's season and, considering the time she has had, feels that she need not be ashamed. Situated in the heart of the Portales valley, the town has been the natural center of all coming to that section of "the Plains," to experiment in dry-farming. Water has been comparatively easy to get at from forty to sixty feet and the inevitable windmill, attached to each home gives to the town a curious and rather attractive appearance.

During the last few months the commercial club reorganized and has succeeded in putting through a project of irrigation, involving a central electric power plant, which, furnishing power on poles to motors and pumps on the individual farms, will put under irrigation 12,000 acres at the start. The financial part of this deal has been managed through the Westinghouse company of Chicago, and the Portales Irrigation company was incorporated last week at Santa Fe, with the following officers: W. E. Lindsey, president; T. J. Mollari, secretary; S. H. Morrison, treasurer.

The engineers of the Burns & McDonald firm of Kansas City are drafting plans and specifications for a water, light and sewerage system for Portales. A bond issue was voted for this purpose some time since and the money is now on call.

Portales has three well established churches, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist, and lately a Christian and a Catholic church have been added to the list. Strong chapters in the Masons, Odd Fellows, Woodmen of the World and Eastern Star lodges and a good public school system, consisting of high school and primary grades are other attractions.

The principal menace to the town heretofore has been an excessive loss through fire, owing to preponderance of frame buildings and a naturally windy and dry climate condition. This has been much alleviated by an ordinance of the town council, restricting the erection of frame buildings within certain limits, and the severe recent fires are already being made good by handsomer buildings and the firms are doing business in temporary quarters.

The teachers and holiday visitors are getting home. The weather is unusually fine, the recent snows having made things good for spring planting. With the irrigation water due in April, and better lighting and cleaning of the town already started, Portales stands facing a prosperous new year.—Tribune-Citizen.

NEWS OF WEEK IN BRIEF

REFEREE DECIDES THE ELIDA MERCANTILE CASE.

C. R. Brice, as referee, has given his finding in the suit of Henry Rankin, trustee, against Z. L. Kirkman, manager of the Elida Mercantile Company, giving complainant judgment for the amount of his claim, which was \$21,085, alleged to have been misappropriated by the manager of the bankrupt firm. There was also a decision against the building in which the firm was established, valued at four or five thousand dollars, making it a part of the firm's property, subject to the claims of creditors. The referee's finding must be approved by the court. —Roswell Record.

TWO TRAGICS ON THE SANTA FE.

Albuquerque, N. M., Jan. 4.—The first move in the plan of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe to double track the road from Chicago to Los Angeles is said to have been taken yesterday when a contract was let to double-track a section from Ashfork to Winslow Junction, Arizona. The distance is ninety miles and the work will be rushed. It is reported that the next step will be the double-tracking of the section from Albuquerque to Gallup, a distance of 150 miles.

ROCK ISLAND FAVORS THE TUCUMCARI-ROSWELL LINE.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 7.—The Roswell, Northern and Gulf railroad has filed incorporation papers in the office of Territorial Secretary Nathan Jaffa. The road is to be built from Roswell to Tucumcari and is to be 146 miles long. It is believed that the Rock Island system is friendly to the new road. The capital stock is \$150,000 all paid in. The incorporators and directors are: Charley C. Tannehill, Aurelius Pruitt, J. Smith Lea, John W. Rhea, James F. Hinkle, Edgar L. Bedell, Clifton Chisholm, J. Phelps White of Roswell. The stock is divided into 1,500 shares.

NINE-DOLLAR HOG HITS CHICAGO.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—The nine-dollar hog arrived at the Union Stock yards today, and his coming marked an epoch in high prices. With the exception of a short period in 1882, when swine sold at \$9.35, the nine dollar hog has not been seen here since the Civil war. Continued intense cold, impeding transportation, and the apparent hesitation of producers to market hogs are the chief causes of the abnormal advance.

BIG SAN JUAN COUNTY IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Aztec, N. M., Dec. 24.—Announcement will be made this week in local newspapers that January 1, 1910 will see the final survey run on the line of the big San Juan canal, preparatory to the inauguration of actual construction. This high line canal has been projected for about four years, under the management of W. Goff Black, of this city, and Denver and New York capitalists. The acreage covered is estimated at 40,000 acres on the east side of the Animas river, and twice that much on the west side, where the line runs into the La Plata valley. The bonds, it is said, have been floated in New York, and as soon as the final survey is completed, estimates of construction cost will be made and bids will be asked. This ditch will be about forty miles in length for the east side and will be of such size as to make the operation of steam shovels profitable. Present plans call for the water to be on the land under the ditch inside one year. Water cost has not been estimated, of course, but is placed at about \$40 per acre. Considering the value of the products that this land will grow, \$40 per acre is very low. Several reclamation schemes in Colorado are now being floated at \$50 and \$75 per acre, and in one case nothing but grain can be grown.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT NEW MEXICO.

"It is a fact worthy of mention, that during the past eight years, not a single bank, either territorial or national, in New Mexico, has closed its doors by reason of being insolvent," said Territorial Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford today, says the New Mexican. There are today in the territory 44 national and 44 territorial banks, with a capital of \$3,324,000 on June 30, 1909, and resources and liabilities amounting to \$24,458,106 on that date. On June 30, 1908, there were 40 national and 29 territorial banks.

There were filed in the office of Territorial Engineer Vernon L. Sullivan during 1909, 143 applications for water appropriation for irrigation and power purposes. Naturally, the applications asked for the maximum amount needed. Under these projects, 7,174, 203.25 acres are to be reclaimed, or four times as much land as was under irrigation during the past year. The cost of these projects is to be \$7,004,017.50. This is in addition to the Federal projects at the Elephant Buttes, at Carlisbad and on the Arroyo Hondo, which represent an outlay of another \$8,000,000. The power projects are to develop \$1,332,098 horse power at a cost of \$9,828,205.

SALOONS INCREASE TAXES

It is the firm belief of the Record that the voting of the saloons out of Roswell would tend to decrease rather than increase our taxes. There are many reasons for this belief and they are confirmed by experiences elsewhere.

Statistics show that seventy-five per cent of our idiots come from intemperate parents; eighty per cent of the paupers; eighty-two per cent of the crime is committed by men under the influence of liquor; ninety per cent of the adult criminals are whiskey made. In ten years 53,550 murders were committed by men under the influence of liquor. All this does not do anything to lower taxes, but does aid to increase them.

It costs money to care for idiots and paupers made by whiskey; it costs money to punish and convict criminals made by whiskey, and to maintain the court machinery made necessary by whiskey.

In Chaves county a good two-thirds of the court expenses are made by whiskey. It has caused poverty and suffering and means unpaid bills to the merchants. Money that should be spent for bread, meat and clothing goes to fill the purses of the whiskey manufacturers.

Before July 1, 1906, Kansas City had 250 saloons, 200 gambling houses and sixty houses of ill-fame, all with a population of 89,000. Today, with a population of over 100,000, without saloons and the other attendant evils, the bank deposits have increased four millions, building operations 209 per cent; court expenses decreased \$25,000 in one year, eighteen additional teachers were employed in the public schools, two hundred thousand dollars were spent for new school buildings and the bonded indebtedness was reduced \$245,000 in one year.

Paola, Kansas, put the saloons out of business several years ago and the town is a dry town, really dry. Since then more street paving has been done than in all the previous years of the town's history; the bank deposits have increased wonderfully; business has gained by jumps and by bounds; and the city indebtedness reduced.

Probably one hundred thousand dollars is sent out of Roswell every year for booze, and not one cent of it ever comes back. It is taken from the homes of those who most need to spend it for bread, meat and clothing. It represents just so much lost business to the legitimate business men of Roswell; it is just so much lost capital.

Last month the city police made forty arrests in Roswell and drink was back of over half of them.

The saloons of Roswell pay to the city twelve thousand dollars per year, but they cost the city much more than that every year in actual money, and then produce poverty, drunkenness, disease, criminals and suffering and misery.

As an investment the saloons of Roswell are a drag upon the progress of the city, and a deadly evil.

The last Grand Jury of this county complained that the saloons were busily engaged in violating the laws of the territory and endangering the youth of the city.

How many murders have been committed in Roswell that may be traced directly to drink? How many suicides? How much misery? How much suffering of women and children? Does it pay? Will you vote to continue it?—Roswell Record.

Kirkman, manager of the Elida Mercantile Company, giving complainant judgment for the amount of his claim, which was \$21,085, alleged to have been misappropriated by the manager of the bankrupt firm. There was also a decision against the building in which the firm was established, valued at four or five thousand dollars, making it a part of the firm's property, subject to the claims of creditors. The referee's finding must be approved by the court. —Roswell Record.

TWO TRAGICS ON THE SANTA FE.

Albuquerque, N. M., Jan. 4.—The first move in the plan of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe to double track the road from Chicago to Los Angeles is said to have been taken yesterday when a contract was let to double-track a section from Ashfork to Winslow Junction, Arizona. The distance is ninety miles and the work will be rushed. It is reported that the next step will be the double-tracking of the section from Albuquerque to Gallup, a distance of 150 miles.

ROCK ISLAND FAVORS THE TUCUMCARI-ROSWELL LINE.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 7.—The Roswell, Northern and Gulf railroad has filed incorporation papers in the office of Territorial Secretary Nathan Jaffa. The road is to be built from Roswell to Tucumcari and is to be 146 miles long. It is believed that the Rock Island system is friendly to the new road. The capital stock is \$150,000 all paid in. The incorporators and directors are: Charley C. Tannehill, Aurelius Pruitt, J. Smith Lea, John W. Rhea, James F. Hinkle, Edgar L. Bedell, Clifton Chisholm, J. Phelps White of Roswell. The stock is divided into 1,500 shares.

NINE-DOLLAR HOG HITS CHICAGO.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—The nine-dollar hog arrived at the Union Stock yards today, and his coming marked an epoch in high prices. With the exception of a short period in 1882, when swine sold at \$9.85, the nine dollar hog has not been seen here since the Civil war. Continued intense cold, impeding transportation, and the apparent hesitation of producers to market hogs are the chief causes of the abnormal advance.

BIG SAN JUAN COUNTY IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Aztec, N. M., Dec. 24.—Announcement will be made this week in local newspapers that January 1, 1910 will see the final survey run on the line of the big San Juan canal, preparatory to the inauguration of actual construction. This high line canal has been projected for about four years, under the management of W. Goff Black, of this city, and Denver and New York capitalists. The acreage covered is estimated at 40,000 acres on the east side of the Animas river, and twice that much on the west side, where the line runs into the La Plata valley. The bonds, it is said, have been floated in New York, and as soon as the final survey is completed, estimates of construction cost will be made and bids will be asked. This ditch will be about forty miles in length for the east side and will be of such size as to make the operation of steam shovels profitable. Present plans call for the water to be on the land under the ditch inside one year. Water cost has not been estimated, of course, but is placed at about \$40 per acre. Considering the value of the products that this land will grow, \$40 per acre is very low. Several reclamation schemes in Colorado are now being floated at \$50 and \$75 per acre, and in one case nothing but grain can be grown.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT NEW MEXICO.

"It is a fact worthy of mention, that during the past eight years, not a single bank, either territorial or national, in New Mexico, has closed its doors by reason of being insolvent," said Territorial Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford today, says the New Mexican. There are today in the territory 44 national and 44 territorial banks, with a capital of \$3,324,000 on June 30, 1909, and resources and liabilities amounting to \$24,458,166 on that date. On June 30, 1908, there were 40 national and 29 territorial banks.

There were filed in the office of Territorial Engineer Vernon L. Sullivan during 1909, 143 applications for water appropriation for irrigation and power purposes. Naturally, the applications asked for the maximum amount needed. Under these projects, 7,174, 203.25 acres are to be reclaimed, or four times as much land as was under irrigation during the past year. The cost of these projects is to be \$7,004,017.50. This is in addition to the Federal projects at the Elephant Buttes, at Carlsbad and on the Arroyo Hondo, which represent an outlay of another \$8,000,000. The power projects are to develop 11,332,098 horse power at a cost of \$9,828,205.

POWER OF THOUGHT.

CHARITY BALL'S HYPOCRISY

LATEST AND LOWEST TYPE DENOUNCED BY DR. EMIL G. HINCH.

"This kind of hypocrisy that parades and advertises its own pleasure and says it is for the benefit of those who have no pleasure, is particularly objectionable to me.

"If that is our notion of the flower of charitable giving, it is time we stopped boasting of being civilized. I include the Marks-Nathan ball in this. It was given by an association of orthodox Jews on the west side who are in the same state of intelligence as anybody that thinks a ball is a good vehicle for charity.

"I discount this thing from every point of view—practical, ethical, and as a matter of taste. Practically, it is wasteful. For every \$10 that is spent not more than \$5 gets to the poor. It is equally wasteful of the time and efforts of those who promote it. The Jews of this city gave up charity balls some years ago. When we dance we dance, and when we give we give. Charity balls don't pay.

"Ethically the charity ball reminds me of a dentist's sign I once saw: 'Teeth pulled while the band is playing.' That means that it is about as hard to get money for charity out of most people as pulling teeth, and at the charity ball they try to get it out of them while the band plays.

"I know from experience that the proper appeal at the proper time will get more money for a good purpose than in any other way, and it is the decent way to do it.

"Analyze the motives of those who patronize such an affair. Social ambition and rivalry inspire nearly all the women. They want to shine and this is their ready-made opportunity. Every one can get in who can buy a ticket and every one has a chance. Those on the outside have an opportunity to run shoulders with the inner circle for once, while the inner circle basks in the glow of adulation. There is a splendid outpouring of rich, warm, human charitable feeling in the vulgar scramble.

"As a matter of taste the charity ball is an inharmonious mixture. The ingredients are all well in their place but they don't mix well. A man once found some strands of hair in a pot of butter in a restaurant and called the waiter to remonstrate with him. 'This is pretty hair,' he said, 'I like it. It also seems like good butter, but I don't want them both on the same plate.' That's the way a great, expensive, barbaric public dance strikes me when they call it a charity ball.

"Why drag the word 'charity' into such an affair? A person in need couldn't get near enough to

hear the orchestra play. And, as for the effect on the minds of those who took part, the best way to find out is to go the next day to persons who have danced and try to get money out of them for a charitable purpose.

"Furthermore, it doesn't pay, financially or morally. The Jews found that out long ago. The luxury of it is not to be condemned in itself. Luxury is an economic factor. It gives employment to many. But it is my experience of life that people who want to dance are going to dance and that plenty of balls for all will be given. Such work as they furnish will always be furnished up to the limit of society's means. They don't have to be called charity balls to obtain that result."

ROOSEVELT OUT-

DONE BY BOY.

Carlsbad, N. M., Jan. 3.—Roosevelt in Africa or anywhere else never made a better showing for big game hunting than has Jessie Plowman, twelve years old, who lives in the Guadalupe mountains in Eddie county, for Jessie is the slayer of three big bears, which he tracked to their den, smoked out and shot down one at a time as they emerged from the cave.

Living all his life in the mountains, he early learned to take care of himself and to know that most of the time he would have to depend on himself in whatever occasion that might arise. Therefore, the sight of the bear tracks along the trail when he was out hunting the other day didn't cause him to turn about and seek the help of a grown-up hunter. He had a 30-40 Winchester and he set out to trail the bears to their den.

The trail ended in a cave in Pine canyon, near Pine Springs, and Jessie boldly entered the cave. It was too dark to see the bears, so he secured a long stick, placed his hat on one end and pushed on into the cave, waiving the hat on the end of the stick, ahead of him.

He didn't go far. One of the bears reached out, grabbed the hat and tore it to pieces, while Jessie retreated to the mouth of

the cave to consider ways and means. The smoking out process looked best to him, so he built a fire and threw on green branches to make a dense smoke. Then the boy took up a position at the entrance, cocked his rifle and waited.

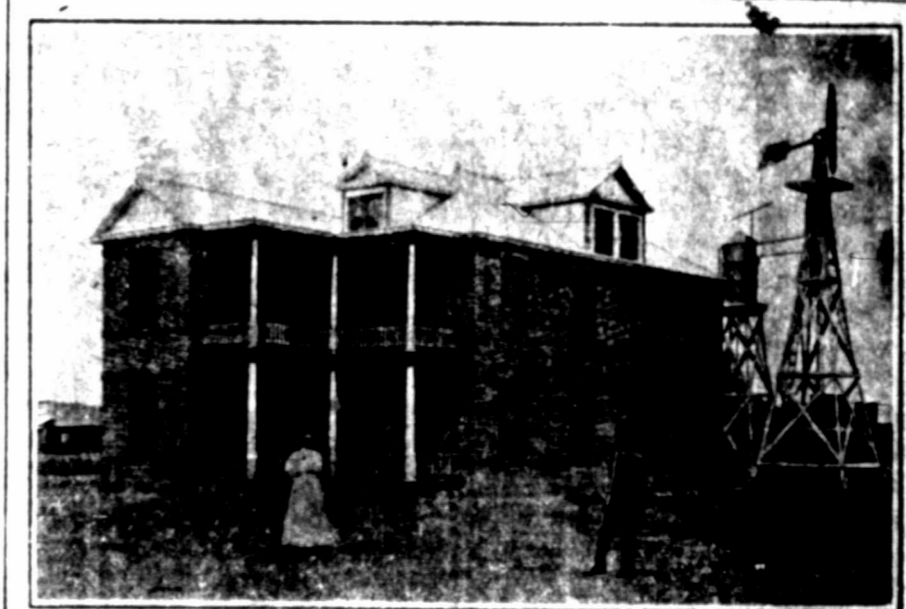
