

Hale Center. I and two other men drove in there about December 1, in a covered wagon, put up our team and began to try to buy a place to call home. Had poor Well we have just gone through luck, stayed in camp there until and loved ones, in a tent and snow about shoe mouth deep, and among strangers. Went to a Christmas tree Christmas eve night, which was very nice. Had a fine program and got acquainted with a few people. But the biggest surprice came Christmas Day, when a man who had moved in from Hill County, Texas, late in 1901 sent one of his boys down to our camp and invited us up to take dinner with them, and I assure you the invitation was gladly accepted and highly appreciated. We had a fine dinner and were treated as if we were old friends. One of our party bought a home 6 miles north of Hale Center, later moved to Plainview and died there April, 1948. Mr. Lee and I came on to Dimmitt December 27, bought one section of land each. Mr. Lee left here 8 or 10 years ago. I am still here and hope to stay until they move me out to the Dimmitt Cemetery.
