Dear Loyal American:

Do you know that it is an absolute necessity that more scrap iron and steel than ever before move into dealer channels between now and winter or it will be impossible for many of our munition factories to continue production at the present rate?

We know that you all realize the tremendous importance of our factories running at top speed, but what we don't apparently realize is the fact that we are all responsible for the moving of this scrap iron and steel. Castro Coun-

in the two previous dives, and now we are urging that every Castro Citizen put their shouder to the wheel and see that all our scrap comes to town immediately. This must be done within the next few weeks before another harvest is started and farmers ae entirely too busy in saving another crop.

Talk this over with your neigh-bors, encourage and help each other in any way possible, and lets make a big showing for Castro County.

We have information from the W. P. A. in Amarillo, Texas, that in the event we have some articles that are too heavy for local moving facilities to handle, they will be glad to come into the county and do such hauling. We suggest that you get in touch with them directly in case you have some old tractors or some such scrap that is impossible for you to move.


