In fact they say they are going to sell anything and everything. The auction lot on Highway 51 North is stacked full of farm equipment and just plain equipment. They're the sellingest people you ever saw, and if you've got anything you don't want sold you had better not take it to the sales arena (or whatever they call that pasture where they do their merchandising), they'll sell it and find out who it belonged to later. 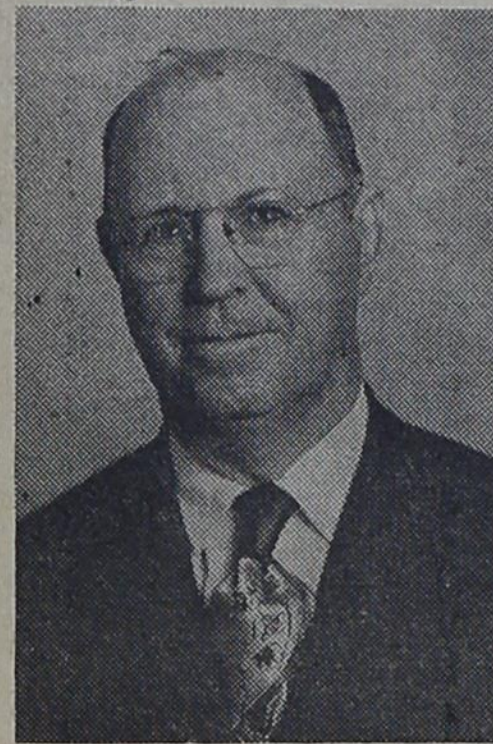
Revival Meeting At Baptist Church Begins April 4th

Plans Being Made to Enlarge Boys Ranch Capacity

Visions of a Boys Ranch for 1,000 to 1,500 youngsters with a fighting chance to grow into worthwhile American citizens has been put into words by Cal Farley, founder and president of the famous Boys' Ranch near Amarillo, Texas.

"We must expand," Cal said. "It is forced upon us by torn homes. Every day requests come to our office asking us to take boys."

A recent case cited by Farley was that of a woman who came to him, pleading for the Ranch to take her 14-year-old son. The father was gone, the older child married, and the youngster was "beginning to get into trouble." The mother had been told she had cancer and had six months to live. She wanted her "What can we do?" Farley asked. "We have five boys sleeping in the gymnasium now, but you can tell a woman like that there isn't a place for her son? The only answer was to make a place for him."

The future plans call for permanent "24-boy" homes of the unit type, situated in the area just east of the present buildings. Long-range planning includes 20 of such units. Each of the buildings, furnished, will cost approximately \$30,000, but the Ranch founder pointed out that they probably could be built for less because of donations of labor and materials, such as have been given in the past.

Under the new program, the expansion area would be dedicated to the use of the older boys, and would house the high school and vocational school, leaving the present area for handling the

Large Group Of Fans Witnessed Championship Tilt

The Dimmitt Bobbies retained their Inter-state Championship Saturday night in Des Moines, Iowa by defeating Hansell 38-30 before the 5,000 fans in Drake University Gymnasium.

An exchange of flags preceded the game, with Supt. R. S. Vestal representing Dimmitt and receiving the Iowa state flag.

The game got underway and immediately the scoring began as Lometa Odom poured in a quick field goal. The guards showed the corn-fed misses something new in defensive play as they practically controlled the ball from the backboard and supplied the forwards with plenty of shots, while holding the Hansellites to a scant three points the first period. A time-out was called early in the game by Hansell, which resulted in the double-guarding of Lometa Odom. The tall Hansell guards kept Odom bottled up the remainder of the half, only to have Mary Nelson start pouring in set shots from the court as Johnny Godfrey turned in a good exhibition of ball-handling and faking to clear Nelson for shots. The Hansell girls barely got the feel of the ball during the first half because of Dimmitt's marvelous offensive and defensive attack. Guards Mitzi Wilson and Decima Dennis, turned in a marvelous exhibition of tight defensive play as Maurine Smithson, playing her last game, succeeded in making Iowa's all-state pivot, Alberta Van Dyke, fade into the corners in order to be in position for passes, of which very few were completed.

The halftime score was 26-9 and it looked like a runaway game as the stunned Iowa fans were coming to their senses. But such was not the case. Although Texas rules were played in the game, Iowa officials were used, resulting in different fouling rules. By intermission Mitzi Wilson and Maurine Smithson were each playing with three fouls, giving the Blaine-coached crew plenty of reason to hold the ball (continued on back page)

Our Track Prospects—

Basketball season has ended gloriously for DHS, leaving only one major sport this year—track. The Bobcats started out the year knowing that their best prospects were track first, football second, and basketball third. They came through with the best football season in the history of the school, a very successful basketball season, proving that they didn't discredit these two sports, but proving that the track season should be a great one for DHS. But the same thing holds true in track as in any other sport—you've got to do it and then you can talk about it. What a boy does in track he does by himself, not by the help of the team. Naturally, some track team could beat another track team 10 points in a dual meet and be beaten by that same track team in a meet where the points are divided around, but we believe the Bobcats have enough all-around strength and balance to take a large meet such as the Panhandle Relays. Wouldn't it be something for a Class B track team to prove itself superior to all Class A teams in the Panhandle, and wouldn't it be something for that track team to be Dimmitt? It could happen.

Geniuses Are In The Making In DHS!

Some ambitious boys in Mr. Braly's fifth period Geometry class are learning to be geniuses the hard way. With this rule it is possible to find the square and cube root of a number, to multiply more than two numbers together, and other combinations of multiplications and division. All these things can be accomplished with just a few twist of the wrist, but the trick is to know which twist. That is what the boys are trying to master now. There are infinite things that can be done with a slide rule, when once you get the hang of it. It makes solving problems much faster. Instead of dividing or multiplying a long number, you just take to your slide rule and have it done in a second. Then for the more complicated problems, you don't have to worry about figuring out the square root of this number, or the cube root of that number, you just jump to the slide rule and have your answer in a few seconds.

Superb Cheese Cake

Crust:
 8 oz. package zwieback
 2 tablespoons sugar
 1/2 cup softened butter or margarine

1/4 cup finely chopped walnut meats

Crush zwieback with rolling pin into fine crumbs; thoroughly blend together with sugar and softened butter or margarine and chopped walnut meats.

Firmly press on bottom and sides of a 9-inch spring form pan.

Filling:
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 tablespoons flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 lb. cream cheese

1 teaspoon vanilla
 4 eggs, separated
 1 cup light cream

Combine sugar, flour and salt. Add to softened cream cheese; blend well. Add vanilla; stir in 4 egg yolks, one at a time. Add light cream, blending thoroughly. Beat egg whites stiff, but not dry; fold into cheese mixture. Carefully pour into zwieback crumb crust. Bake in moderate oven (325° F.) 1 hour and 20 minutes. Cool before removing from pan.

NOTE: An 8-inch spring form pan may be used. If so, increase baking time to 1 hour and 45 minutes.

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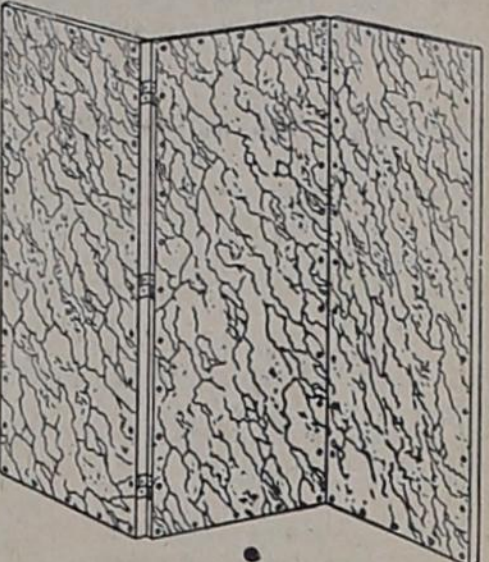

Re-Covering a Folding Screen

FOLDING screens which have had their coverings torn or broken may be re-covered with an all-wood fiber panel which is smooth, splinter free and dent-resistant. It will take any kind of finish, from paint to wallpaper. The panel is Masonite one-eighth inch Presdwood.

In preparation for renovating a folding screen, remove the old covering and any remaining adhesive or nails. It is wise also to tighten up the framework with corrugated fasteners and check the



hinges. Both sides of each screen section should be covered with the Presdwood. For a striking effect, use Masonite Leatherwood, which has an embossed surface similar to Spanish grain leather. This may be given a tone-on-tone finish. Further dress up these panels by attaching some decorative tacks. If you prefer a perfectly smooth panel, use the standard Presdwood and decorate it with paint, enamel, lacquer, wax, stain, varnish, wallpaper or decalcomanias.

After cutting the panel to the exact size of the framework, bevel the edges slightly with a file, plane or sandblock. Fasten the panels by using a good grade of adhesive used for attaching hard-board panels over old plaster walls. Clamps will assure a good bond.

If the renewed screen is to be papered, be sure to size the Presdwood panels first.

Following the suggestions made here, the average handyman can construct folding screens from scratch. Framework is made of 1" x 2" lumber, and the cross supports should be placed 16 inches on center.

★ Blessed are those who feel their spiritual need, for the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to them! Blessed are the mourners, for they will be consoled! Blessed are the humble, for they will possess the land! Blessed are those who are hungry and thirsty for uprightness, for they will be satisfied! *Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy!* Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will be called God's sons! Blessed are those who have endured persecution for their uprightness, for the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to them! Blessed are you when people abuse you, and persecute you, and falsely say everything bad of you, on my account. Be glad and exult over it, for you will be richly rewarded in heaven, for that is the way they persecuted the prophets who went before you!



★ You are the salt of the earth! But if salt loses its strength, how can it be made salt again? It is good for nothing but to be thrown away and trodden underfoot. You are the light of the world! Anyone, therefore, who weakens one of the slightest of these commands, and teaches others to do so, will be ranked lowest in the Kingdom of Heaven, but anyone who observes them and teaches others to do so will be ranked high in the Kingdom of Heaven. For I tell you that unless your uprightness is far superior to that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never even enter the Kingdom of Heaven!



★ You have heard that the men of old were told, "You shall not murder," and "Whoever murders will have to answer to the court." But I tell you that anyone who gets angry with his brother will have to answer to the court, and anyone who speaks contemptuously to his brother will have to answer to the great council, and anyone who says to his brother, "You cursed fool!" will have to answer for it in the fiery pit! So when you are presenting your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother has any

grievance against you, leave your gift right there before the altar and go and make up with your brother; then come back and present your gift. *Be quick and come to terms with your opponent while you are on the way to court with him, or he may*



hand you over to the judge, and the judge may hand you over to the officer, and you will be thrown into prison. I tell you, you will never get out again until you have paid the last penny!

★ You have heard that men were told "You shall not commit adultery." But I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman with desire has already committed adultery with her in his heart. But if your right eye makes you fall, tear it out and throw it away, for you might better lose one part of your body than have it all thrown into the pit! If your right hand makes you fall, cut it off and throw it away! For you might better lose one part of your body than have it all go down to the pit!

★ They were told, "Anyone who divorces his wife must give her a certificate of divorce." But I tell you that anyone who divorces his wife on any ground, except unfaithfulness, makes her commit adultery, and anyone who marries her after she is divorced commits adultery.

★ Again, you have heard that the men of old were told, "You shall not swear falsely, but you must fulfill your oaths to the Lord." But I tell you not to swear at all, either by heaven, for it is God's throne, or by the earth, for it is his foot-stool; or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great king. You must not swear by your own head, for you cannot make one single

hair white or black. But your way of speaking must be "Yes" or "No." Anything that goes beyond that comes from the evil one.

★ You have heard that they were told, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." But I tell you not to resist injury, but if anyone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other to him too; and if anyone wants to sue you for your shirt, let him have your



coat too. *And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go two miles with him. If anyone begs from you, give to him, and when anyone wants to borrow from you, do not turn away.*

★ You have heard that they were told, "You must love your neighbor and hate your enemy." But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for your persecutors, so that you may show yourselves true sons of your Father in heaven, for he makes his sun rise on bad and good alike, and makes the rain fall on the upright and the wrongdoers. For if you love only those who love you, what reward can you expect? Do not the very tax-collectors do that? And if you are polite to your brothers and no one else, what is there remarkable in that? Do not the very heathen do that? So you are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is.

★ But take care not to do your good deeds in public for people to see, for, if you do, you will get no reward from your Father in heaven. *So when you are going to give to charity, do not blow a trumpet*



before yourself, as the hypocrites do, in places of worship and the streets, to make people praise them. I tell you, that is all the reward they will get! But when you give to charity, your own left hand must not know what your right hand is doing, so that your charity may be secret, and your Father who sees what is secret will reward you.

★ When you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites, for they like to pray standing in places of worship and in the corners of the squares, to let people see them. I tell you, that is the only reward they will get! But when you pray, go into your own room, and shut the door, and pray to your Father who is unseen, and your Father who sees what is secret will reward you. And when you pray, do not repeat empty phrases as the heathen do, for they imagine that their prayers will be heard if they use words enough. You must not be like them. For God, who is your



Father, knows what you need before you ask him. This, therefore, is the way you are to pray:

"Our Father in heaven, Your name be revered! Your kingdom come! Your will be done on earth as it is done in heaven! Give us today bread for the day, And forgive us our debts, as we have forgiven our debtors. And do not subject us to temptation, But save us from the evil one."

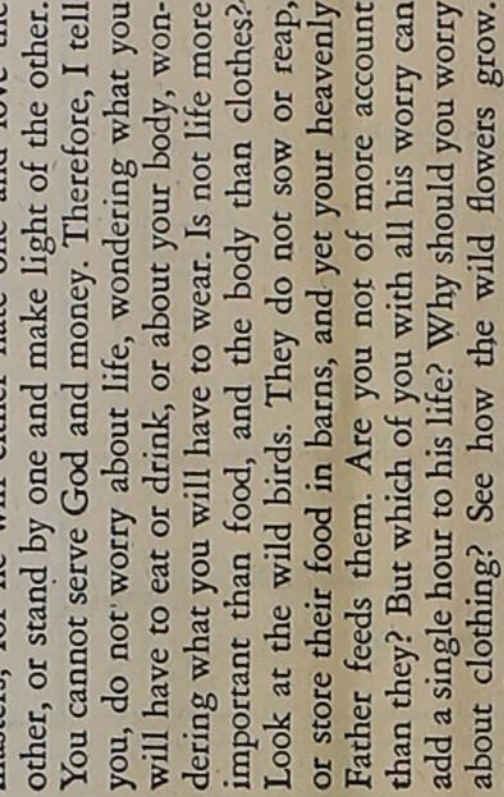

★ When you fast, do not put on a gloomy look, like the hypocrites, for they neglect their personal appearance to let people see that they are fasting. I tell you, that is all the reward they will get. But when you fast, perfume your hair and wash your face, so that no one may see that you are fasting, except your Father who is unseen, and your Father who sees what is secret, will reward you.

★ Do not store up your riches on earth, where moths and rust destroy them, and where thieves break in and steal them, and where moths and rust cannot destroy them, and where thieves cannot break in and steal them. For wherever your treasure is, your heart will be also.



The eye is the lamp of the body. If then your eye is sound, your whole body will be light, but if your eye is unsound, your whole body will be dark. If, therefore, your very light is darkness, how deep the darkness will be! No slave can belong to two masters, for he will either hate one and love the other, or stand by one and make light of the other. You cannot serve God and money. Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about life, wondering what you will have to eat or drink, or about your body, wondering what you will have to wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body than clothes? Look at the wild birds. They do not sow or reap, or store their food in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more account than they? But which of you will add all this to his worry about clothing? See how the wild flowers grow. They do not toil or spin, and yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his splendor was never dressed like one of them. *But if God so beautifully dresses the*

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Weekly News Letter

From Washington by Congressman Rogers

GOVERNMENT ECONOMY: The uprising in the House of Representatives this past week is a mere mild reminder of what is to come. The Appropriations Committee and sub-committees are working day and night to cut every possible dollar off of the non-defense appropriations. Last week the Full House decided that the Committees had not reduced appropriations enough and pared them further. Congressman Gene Cox of Georgia told the House that this action was notice to the bureaucrats that the "honeymoon" was over. To fully appreciate what these cuts mean, we must understand that they are reductions in the appropriations for basic departments of the Government—Treasury, Post Office, and so forth. This action of cutting these basic departments is a good indication that the many departments that have been established in the last few years can get ready for a good trimming when the appropriations bills get to the floor. One of the sub-committees is doing an excellent job of cutting down the expenses of the military, and I can assure you that the military is not going to get all they are asking for. They had better get their shop in order to see that every dollar spent shows a full dollar's return. This is not a temporary situation. It is a definite recognition of the need for reduced Government expenditures on a permanent basis. The moving force is the solid bloc of Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats. Our weight is beginning to be felt. We are getting up a full head of steam and you can expect some drastic results.

DEFENSE CONTRACT DISCREPANCIES: The Congress is already uncovering some bad, if not dishonest, practices in carrying out construction work under defense contracts. There could be a repetition of many things that happened during World War II. For example, on a New York project it was discovered that one man on the payroll was shown to have worked ten hours a day straight for four days, 23 hours and a half each day for the next three days, and then ten hours a day for the following days. The 23 and a half days are time and a half and double-time days. Anyone knows that it would be physically impossible for a human being to do this, and this Congress is going to stop that sort of dishonesty regardless of whose

head has to fall. This is just one example and there are a number of others. This sordid type of Treasury robbing is being fully investigated and will be fully aired.

SENATE CRIME INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE: Lots of publicity—no prosecutions. If this crime investigation is going to be successfully carried out, there must be some prosecutions and some deportations, and these must come before the investigations of the Committee have been forgotten. It is reliably rumored that some of those on the Government payroll who are conducting and helping conduct these investigations are planning on using the material gathered to write a book. This out these threats, they are going a tremendous expense to the taxpayers and if it is used by any of these Government people for personal gain purposes, the profits should all go to the Government to help repay the taxpayers for the expense. If this information is used for private gain by the investigators, those investigators should be investigated.

CEILING PRICES: The city-born and bred officials of the OPS appear dead set on fixing controls on raw cotton and livestock on the hoof. If they carry material has all been gathered at to find that such procedure will amount to production control, rather than price control. What this country needs is a few good sound level-headed farmers and ranchers in some of those official positions.

PERSONAL: Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn appointed me as Speaker Pro Tempore during a part of one of the recent sessions. Needless to say, I was quite overwhelmed by the honor. It would be impossible to express in words the deep emotional feeling and the sense of responsibility one has in presiding over the greatest representative body in the history of the world.

"Those who are in charge of persons suffering from influenza, pneumonia, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, measles, infantile paralysis or any other of the diseases spread by discharges from the nose or throat, are warned that these discharges are sources of great danger, and are urged to have the patient use paper handkerchiefs or soft cheesecloth, that can be disinfected or burned or otherwise safely disposed of.

"The sterilization of dishes and utensils used in the sick room, by boiling after each use of them, and of the patient's clothing, sheets, towels, and pillow cases, are equally necessary. Then, at the close of the illness, a thorough cleaning of the room, bedding and

personal belongings of the patient, scrubbing the floors and woodwork, and opening the place to the fresh air and sunlight, are urged as a final precautionary measure.

"Fortunately, the best disinfectants yet discovered are within reach of everybody. They are plenty of hot water and soap, fresh air and sunshine."

THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW whether oral admissions and confessions made by a Defendant in a criminal case can be used against him?

Oral statements made by a Defendant in a criminal case cannot be used against him, if he is under arrest or in custody at the time they are made. The Statutes require that confessions and statements shall be made freely and voluntarily and be signed by the Defendant. Also he must be properly warned as to the effect of his statement. There are exceptions to this rule, which are, that should the Defendant tell the officers where to locate physical property, such as a gun, stolen property, or other physical matter, that the officers may go find this evidence, and testify that the Defendant directed them to these things and that they were found where he said they would be. These things can also be introduced in evidence against

the Defendant.

However, after a Defendant is released from custody, and is free to go where he pleases, any statement he may make reflecting upon his guilt may be used against him.

**Health Talks . . .**

Complaints of irregularities of the digestive tract are about the most common symptoms of discomfort that are known. For some reason, however, when the irregularities are congestion or lack of elimination, most people think they can handle the matter

by self-doctoring, whereas if the discomfort stems from excessive elimination they will much sooner call the doctor.

The discomforts of congestion may become evident any place along the alimentary canal, that digestive tract that is so important to your health, and could logically be called indigestion any place among the line. The term "indigestion" is usually synonymous with heartburn, belching

and regurgitation, however, being confined to the upper portions of the digestive tract, considered a slow movement of food into the stomach.

When the discomfort of digestion moves into the stomach and intestines, 90% of the people will refer to it as stomach ache, and when there is congestion in the bowel or low in the digestive tract it is usually branded constipation. Since the popular usage of these words may not coincide with the medical usage, your doctor usually will ask for detailed information as to where you feel uncomfortable and how uncomfortable you feel.

Indigestion, stomach ache and constipation probably lead the field in ailments that everyone thinks he can treat himself. They are among the leaders in the field of ailments as far as number of possible causes, too (and the treatment for one cause may be the wrongest kind of treatment when the discomfort stems from some other origin. In hit or miss home doctoring, you might hit upon the right remedy; but if you miss, you can make matters worse. Occasional attacks of congestion may mean little beyond the fact that you ate too fast or too much or were under a strain at the time of eating; persistent attacks may have a much more serious meaning and should always prompt you to seek medical advice.

Your eating habits play an important part in your digestive habits; when you change your diet drastically, you can normally expect some change in the way the digestive tract reacts to the new routine. As you grow older you probably eat less food and take less exercise and can expect a change in the process of elimination of waste materials. If you eat more food or the same amount, and still take less exercise as you go from youth to middle age, you can still expect a change in the regularity of your digestive tract.

The discomfort of excessive elimination such as nausea, vomiting and diarrhea are more dramatic than congestion ailments usually and are more inclined to send you seeking medical attention.

Constipation may not mean the same to you as it does to your doctor. Since most people develop a habit of a daily bowel movement, they may consider any change from that as constipation, start worrying about it, and decide it's making them uncomfortable. A great many normal people do not have daily emptying of the waste materials of the body from the bowels but do

have a certain regularity in elimination, though it may be every two days or so. That is not constipation; air upset in the regularity of bowel movement is not necessarily constipation; constipation is generally considered the passing of hard, dry stools. Diarrhea, at the other extreme, is generally considered the passing of watery stools.

The fluids which aid in the digestion of food in the body are absorbed when the food is in the large intestine. Anything that keeps the food in the intestine too long, and the causes may be many and distinctly different, may lead to hard, dry stools. Anything that speeds the material through the intestine too fast may lead to watery stools, because there is not enough time for the water to be absorbed.

The causes of persistent constipation or diarrhea are many and can be minor or quite serious. Alternate periods of constipation and diarrhea are considered a particularly important symptom of possible serious threat to your health.

Nervousness and fatigue may be one cause of digestive irregularity. Restlessness and a constant feeling of tiredness in themselves may be one of the important symptoms of sickness, either coming together or alone. Like all symptoms that are possible threats to your well-being, it is not the occasional appearance of discomfort from any one cause but the persistent return of a special type of signal that interferes with your comfort that should be investigated by your doctor.
