### Commercial Club Elect Officers.

The Commercial Club met in regular session last Thursday night and elected its staff of officers for the coming year, all the incumbents being re-elected with the exception of the president, J. B. Priddy, who resigned. G. M. Williamson was elected president of the club; J. P. Stone, re-elected vice-president; R. G. Bryant, secretary; A. F. Jones, treasurer.

These paintings are truly works of art and it would be paying a mild tribute to the talent displayed by this excellent lady to say that the hand of an artist is exhibited in the creation and the effect of these old local historic ruins, on canvas. This ancient landmark and its surroundings is fraught with many memories of the early days in Portales Valley when the cowman wielded his scepter over this broad domain.

### Broom Corn Being Shipped Out.

The streets of Portales presented a busy appearance on Friday of last week in the transportation of broom corn, the Herald at one time counting some ten wagon loads of the article which adorns the business end of a woman's weapon. Carl Moss consigned two cars to dealers at Wichita, Kans., and the Joyce-Pruit Co. shipped two cars to Amarillo, Texas. The price of the staple is somewhat lower than when the season opened up, in fact about one-half less.

### Farmers Harvesting Alfalfa.

Portales Valley is all the time adding new acreage to the great crop "King Alfalfa", while only this week several farmers commenced their first harvest of the long green staple. Flue Anderson, H. J. Farnham, J. T. Elliott and the Livingstone brothers are using the mowers and rakes to good advantage in this line of endeavor and many more will take off one or more cuttings before the season rolls around for the seeding of more ground. The John Hopper patch close to town has been cut once with a heavy yield and the second crop is to be left to seed which will be cut in time for a third crop this year. There is no item of news which the Herald can produce in its columns which will be of more interest and more importance in the development of the Valley than such as recorded above. There will be no better assurance of the prosperity of this agricultural section than to be able to spread one's vision over countless acres of this great native legume of the Southwest.

### Elida Man Badly Man-Handled.

Sheriff R. A. Bain was called to Elida Tuesday night by long distance to arrest Dee Harkey who is charged with having frightfully mangled Dr. J. W. Cutler, a man of some 60 years of age, with an axe handle. The sheriff returned to Portales early yesterday morning, having in his custody the accused man, being accompanied by Editor Darnell of Elida. Harkey has been refused bail by the justice of the peace of Elida precinct and is committed to jail here pending action of the grand jury. It will be remembered that Harkey is the person who appeared as witness in the Zumbalt Bros. case for the murder of the Hall brothers, being one of the two parties who were eye witnesses of the tragedy. The assault with which he is now charged is said to have grown out of a heated argument between the two men on some frivolous matter.

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## Editorial Flashes

### Two Birds With One Stone

While the Herald has no desire whatever to quench the joy tanks of the truly patriotic citizen of mature years, nor to cast sinister designs upon the proposed pyrotechnic display of the small boy as regards the celebration of the great National Independence Day yet we would like to postpone the demonstration to some later date say, the latter part of August, when we could utilize the enthusiasm of our citizenship for one supreme annual boost for the Valley and what we will have to show in the nature of a harvest of its products at that particular time of the year. Some of the boosters about the town who have ideas which revolve and emanate like a Fairbanks-Morse engine could no doubt hit upon some pleasing title for the demonstration such as "The Portales Valley Irrigation Carnival and Agricultural Exhibit," or something to that effect.

The Valley will have on its dress parade clothes at this time of the year and it will be an opportune season for inviting the stranger from abroad into our midst. The visitors will have the contrast of climate forcibly brought to his mind by a visit here at that time of the year, to the infinite advantage of the Portales Valley and its interests, of course. He will be enabled to snatch a brief respite from the swelter of a less favored clime and meantime behold the fruits which will be multiplied at this, the second anniversary of irrigation era which has been ushered into this section. To see the some 70 odd wells under this project belching forth their thousands of gallons of the sparkling liquid every minute, and what is more, to see the indisputable wealth of all this rich virgin Valley shaking proudly in its broad fields of alfalfa, maize, kafir and Indian corn and other field crops and the sugar beets, Irish potatoes and other countless staples which will at that time be drawing their nourishment from the bosom of its fertile acres is a spectacle which should be provided for the denizens of the North and East who are hearing much about us, but who are biding their time when they can visit the field and verify for themselves the reports which have gone out from Portales concerning the resources of this great domain.

If the suggestion of this humble medium is worthy of acceptance why not outline some plan of action looking to the achievement of such purpose? The business people of the town should get busy on this proposition.

### Death to the Weeds!

The city marshal has set about this week to enforce an old ordinance of the town which requires property owners and tenants to clear their premises of noxious weeds and other growth, which, if complied with, will make a material improvement in the appearance of the streets and alleys. The council proposes to do some grading on the streets about the business district, as well as supply some form of crossings to connect with the sidewalks from the moneys derived by the collection of the street tax and this matter will be considered at some length to morrow night.

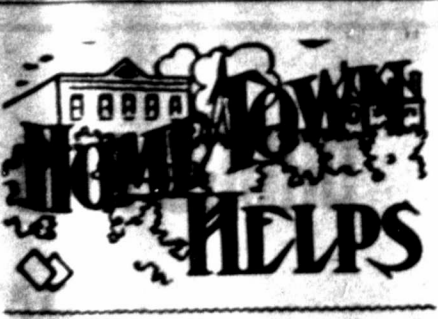

### IDEAL CITY OF THE FUTURE

Model Architect Gives Forecast of What Time May See in City Building.

At the international town planning conference in London Eugene Honard, municipal architect of Paris, gave a forecast of what the ideal city of the future would be like. He said in substance: "Light and energy will be conveyed by electricity. Petrol and oxygen will supply heat. Liquid air will keep up refrigeration in every ladder. In addition to heat radiators there will be cold radiators, which will enable each house to be kept at the required temperature."

"By this power it will be possible to provide in each house one or more health chambers closed by close fitting double windows and doors in which the overworked occupant on his return from town will find all the hygienic conditions which now he can obtain only by taking an annual holiday."

"Glass verandas of various shapes joined together and with covered footpaths, according to standard models, will shelter pedestrians against rain, and the normal height of buildings will be exactly the width of the street. The roofs of houses will be platforms upon which small flower beds and verdant shrubberies could be laid out, as they would be the landing stages for aeroplanes."

"When this progress shall have been accomplished the physiognomy of towns will be changed, all terraces will have become landing stages for flying automobiles. Aviators will be able to fly from one terrace to another, starting and landing as they please. The natural consequence of this new state of things will be that each building will have to be furnished with big elevators capable of raising machines when they are ready to start and taking them back to the garage on their return. Houses of this description will also be used to house motor cars."

"Finally the towns of the future will be traversed by large radiating thoroughfares, occupied partly by raised platforms continually moving, which will insure rapid communication between the different zones. These platforms will be terminated by large revolving crossways at the intersection of the main roads. Large parks and flower gardens as residence and pleasure resorts will be laid out in various parts of the town."

### MODEL VILLAGE OF GERMANY

Construction of Gmindersdorf Brings High Praises From a British Authority.

A model of the workmen's village of Gmindersdorf, belonging to the firm of Ulrich Gminder, Ltd., cotton spinners, near Reutlingen, was the best work of its kind exhibited at the Vienna Housing congress. It was an example of the successful effect of low tones, and judging from the model and from numerous photographs and plans the village itself is very successful in its general design. The village stands on rising ground, and one of the principal streets leads up to an irregular market place with a fountain, in the picturesque style which is so much in vogue in modern German street planning.

The area of the village is 13 acres. The houses are the property of the firm. On April 1, 1919, there were 48 buildings, comprising 151 dwellings, the rents varying from \$11.14 per annum for two rooms and kitchen to \$11.14 per annum for four rooms and kitchen. All the living rooms have a southern exposure. There are in addition two schools, an inn and a store. The plan of the village shows that the works do not form part of the village, as in Bourville and Fort Sunlight, but are situated a short distance away.

In the design of some of the houses there is to be noticed, though not to such a great extent as elsewhere, the German ornamentation of roof lines. Probably the tendency, which is so common in Germany, to make the roof heavy and full of detail is partly explained by the proximity of timber, rendering possible what would be ruled out in this country on the ground of cost, if not of artistic fitness.—The London Builder.

### Planning Cities Beautiful.

The International Town Planning exhibition held in London recently was very illuminating. France, with other exhibits, showed the plans for their recently improved scheme by which Paris is to be made still more magnificent and convenient and healthy, at the cost of \$300,000,000.

Nancy, which boasts of being the most beautifully designed city in the world, sent a characteristic display, showing how its spacious streets in the Renaissance style have been created out of the old inherited mediaeval Berlin, which is to be largely replanned, if a pending scheme is proceeded with, and Chicago, whose replanning has been a subject of art competition, showed some of their programs and devices. Boston took 700 feet of space, and Washington also had an exhibit. It is curious to notice that among the large exhibitors were such small or new countries as Turkey, Sweden, Belgium and Finland.

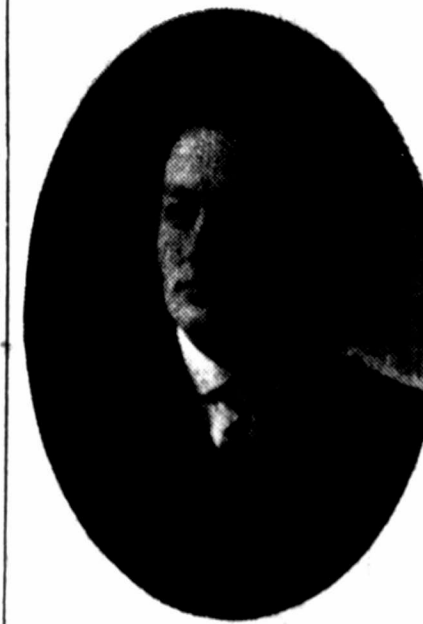

**In the Sewing Room.**  
Never darn knitted underwear in wool. It will shrink and make a larger than the original one. Instead loosely twisted knitting. Darn loosely, and when washed new texture will be almost the same as the knitted goods themselves.  
A good way to transfer designs is to lay right side of material down on a board and place design on top of material. Then secure it with pins, so it will not slip. Place transfer paper over the material, so that the right side of material will be on top of transfer paper. Take pencil and go over design, moving transfer paper as necessary. You will find this a good way to transfer without the least trouble.  
It is often difficult to sew any thin material, such as any of the modish silk materials, or silk or muslin, in the machine without puckering it. This can be avoided by placing a sheet of tissue paper under the material and stitching through the material and the paper. When finished, the paper can easily be torn away, and you will find that your work is quite flat and smooth.

**The Stem Stitch.** Stem stitch may be embroidered on the machine as well as by hand. Here is the method followed:

Sew with rather a short stitch along the stamped lines. Be sure to follow pattern directly. Then thread a needle with embroidery silk and pass the needle and thread, eye first, under each stitch. Keep on the upper side of the material. If it is thin fabric, put paper underneath before working.

This method results in a well-raised cord that is obtained in much quicker time than by hand embroidery, and is, besides, quite as effective.

**Home-Made Frogs.** Frogs for coats are in such vogue this winter that the merchants can scarcely supply the demand. Many women, therefore, buy either plain or fancy braid and make their own frogs, using medium-sized cord for the loops and crochet buttons according to the width of the frogs.
